## Busy Days

## Watermelon Pickle, Preserves in Top Favor with Statesman Readers

Last year we published watermelon pickle and preserve recipes for which we have had numerous calls. They say they are wonderful and they should be—for this we pay taxes. Here then are the U. S. Department of Agriculture recipes for:

**WATERMELON PICKLES**

|                                                  |                              |
|--------------------------------------------------|------------------------------|
| 4 pounds watermelon rind                         | 2 tablespoons whole allspice |
| 2 quarts cold water                              | 2 tablespoons whole cloves   |
| 1 tablespoon lime (calcium oxide from drugstore) | 10 two-inch sticks cinnamon  |
| 4 pounds sugar                                   | 1 quart vinegar              |

Select thick rind from a firm watermelon. Trim off green and pink. Weigh the remaining white portion and cut into one inch cubes. Soak for an hour in the mixture of lime and 2 quarts of water. Drain, cover with fresh water and cook for 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Add more water as needed, drain.

The spices loosely in a bag or piece of cheesecloth. Bring to a boil with the vinegar, 1 quart more water, and the sugar. Add melon rind and boil gently for two hours. Remove spice bag, pack in cream hot jars that have been boiled 15 to 20 minutes. Fill to top of jar with the hot syrup, put on lids and seal tightly. Makes about 6 pints.

If preferred, allow spice bag to remain in syrup overnight. Remove spice bag, boil 1 minute then pack in jars.

Preserves were equally popular and the recipe similar except for vinegar and spices.

**WATERMELON PRESERVES**

|                                   |                       |
|-----------------------------------|-----------------------|
| 4 pounds watermelon rind          | 4 pounds sugar        |
| 2 quarts water                    | 4 quarts water        |
| 1 tablespoon lime (calcium oxide) | 2 lemons, sliced thin |

Trim green and pink from watermelon, weigh remaining white portion. Cut in cubes and let stand in lime combined with the 2 quarts water for an hour to make crisp. Drain and place in clear water for 1 hour. Drain and boil 1 1/2 hours in fresh water. Drain again.

Boil lemon for 5 minutes in 1/2 cup of the water. Boil rest of the 4 quart water with the sugar for 5 minutes to make a syrup. Add watermelon to the syrup and boil about an hour. When syrup thickens, add lemon and the water in which it was cooked. Continue to boil, stirring constantly until the syrup is thick and the melon clear. Pack at once in hot, sterilized jars and seal.

Here is one using brown sugar we published two years ago and which also has been in demand:

**WATERMELON PICKLES**

|                    |                            |
|--------------------|----------------------------|
| 1 quart vinegar    | 1/4 ounce whole cloves     |
| 4 cups brown sugar | 2 quarts watermelon pieces |

Remove green and pink from melon rind, cut up in small cubes. Sprinkle well with salt and let stand overnight. Rinse, steam until nearly done and drain. Make syrup of above ingredients and add melon rind. Boil until clear. Put melon in jars and boil syrup down until thick, pour over melon and seal. White sugar may be used, and some green or red coloring added for appearance.

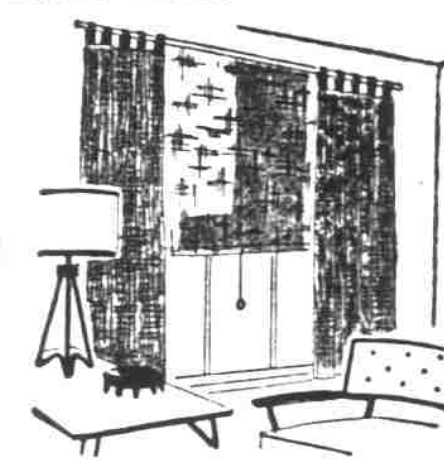
