

Salem Legions Clinch Newberg Series

Pingle Tosses 8-0 Decision

Genna's Ballers Ice Title in District 2

NEWBERG—(Special)—Salem's Capital Post American Legion junior baseball club captured the district 2 crown and advanced another big step toward a spot in the coming State Tournament as it Friday whipped Newberg's legion crew 8-0 on the wings of Ken Pingle's one-hit pitching. It was the second straight victory for the Salems in the district playoff with Newberg.

Vince Genna's Capital City gang next face the winner of district 1 at a time and site to be announced later. The winner in this playoff goes to the State Tourney.

Salem banged over its first run in the Friday game in the third inning as Pingle singled, moved up on an error and tallied via Jerry Waldrop's single. The Genna club fattened its margin in the fifth with a rousing four-run exposition built on four errors by the Newberg infield, singles by Waldrop and Chet Schmidt and a triple by Larry Springer. Pingle walked and scored the sixth Salem run in the sixth via another error and Phil Jantze. Curt Jantze and Wayne Osborn coupled singles with an error in the seventh for two more markers.

Newberg's best scoring chance came in the sixth when Pitcher Emil Toedtle reached first on an error and got to third on a passed ball with none out. Pingle then tightened up and retired three men in a row.

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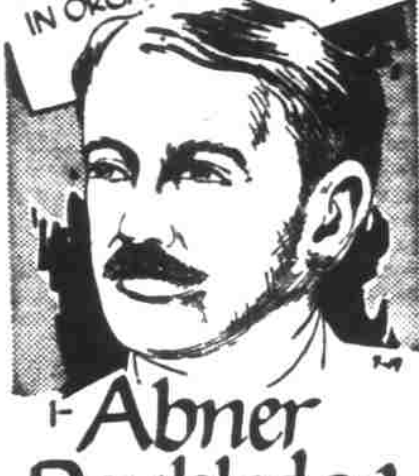

Layne Thinks Matthews Punching'll Stop Rocky

OGDEN, Utah (AP)—Heavyweight Rex Layne, only man who has fought both Rocky Marciano and Harry Matthews, said Friday "Matthews will counterpunch Marciano silly" when the two meet July 28 in New York.

"Matthews is sure to beat him," Rex said at his training camp. "He's too fast and too clever for Rocky."

NEW YORK (AP)—Harry Matthews, who boxes Rocky Marciano in Yankee Stadium a week from Monday, rested Friday because Manager Jack Hurley decided he was fit and "could fight tonight if the promoter wanted to put the show on early." Matthews will not box again till Monday.

Temperature in the gym where Matthews is working out was an unofficial 98 and Hurley said that "if he worked out much in this heat he soon would be a lightweight." Matthews weighed 182 pounds.

Gong to Play Big Part In Olympic Cage Tilts

The resulting sound whangs through the tennis palast like a 21 gun salute.

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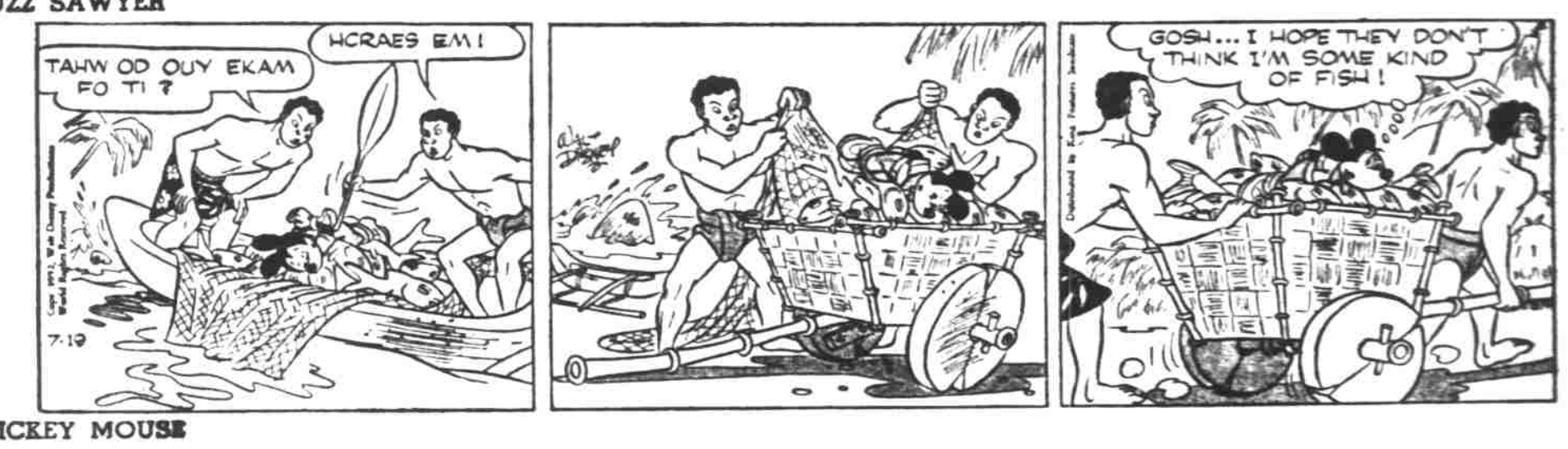
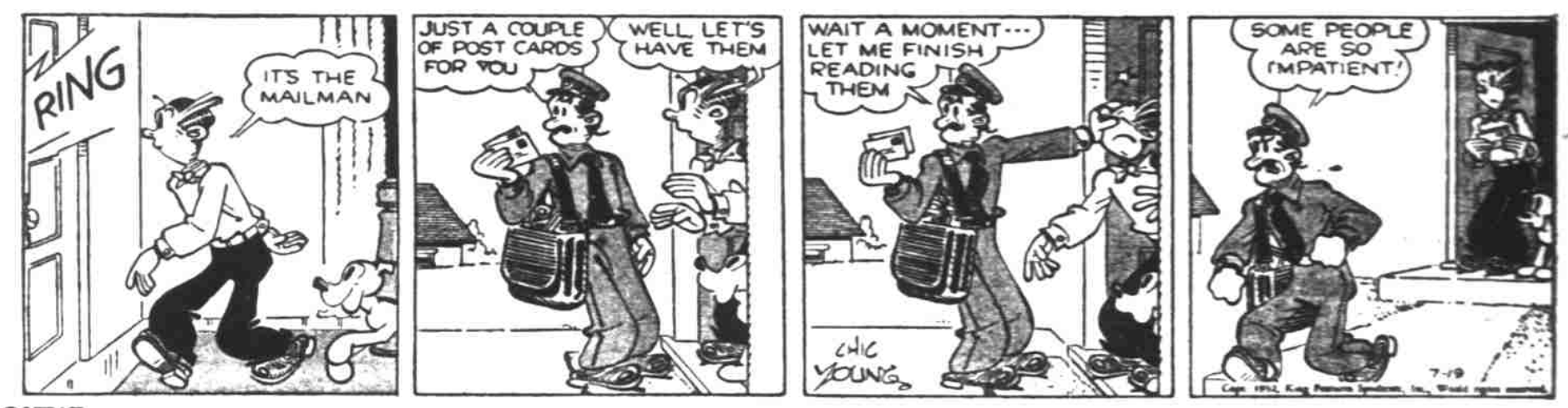
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
