

# Barkley Claims Labor Leaders Control Party

CHICAGO (AP)—Vice President Alben W. Barkley pulled out of the Democratic presidential contest Monday night with an angry blast at "self-appointed political labor leaders" who consider him too old for the race.  
High officials in the AFL and CIO had turned thumbs down on the 74-year-old Barkley.  
His withdrawal from the race was considered likely to throw more strength to Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, for whom a boom was gathering swift momentum despite his insistence he doesn't want the nomination.  
Barkley, in a statement showing he was deeply hurt, declared he had never believed that a single group should dominate a great political party.  
But now, he said, "certain self-appointed political labor leaders have taken upon themselves to announce their opposition to me as the Democratic nominee for President."  
He said these labor leaders had committed themselves "to a program and to candidates other than myself, which would give them greater control of the machinery and policies of the Democratic Party."  
Simultaneously, he said, leaders of certain large delegations who had been encouraging him to announce their opposition to me as the Democratic nominee for President.

And so the old, but vigorous warrior for the Democratic Party, bowed out and relinquished the ambition which he had hoped to crown his 40 years of public service with the highest office in the land.  
His old friends in the Kentucky delegation voiced "keenest disappointment." They felt that Barkley would not be vice presidential candidate again. They also felt that Kentucky's support would be swung to Stevenson.  
Ludwig Caminita, Barkley's press representative who read the statement to newsmen packed in a sweltering mass in a corridor outside the vice president's hotel room, said Barkley would answer no questions about his decision.

# City Employees Air Retirement Plan Switch

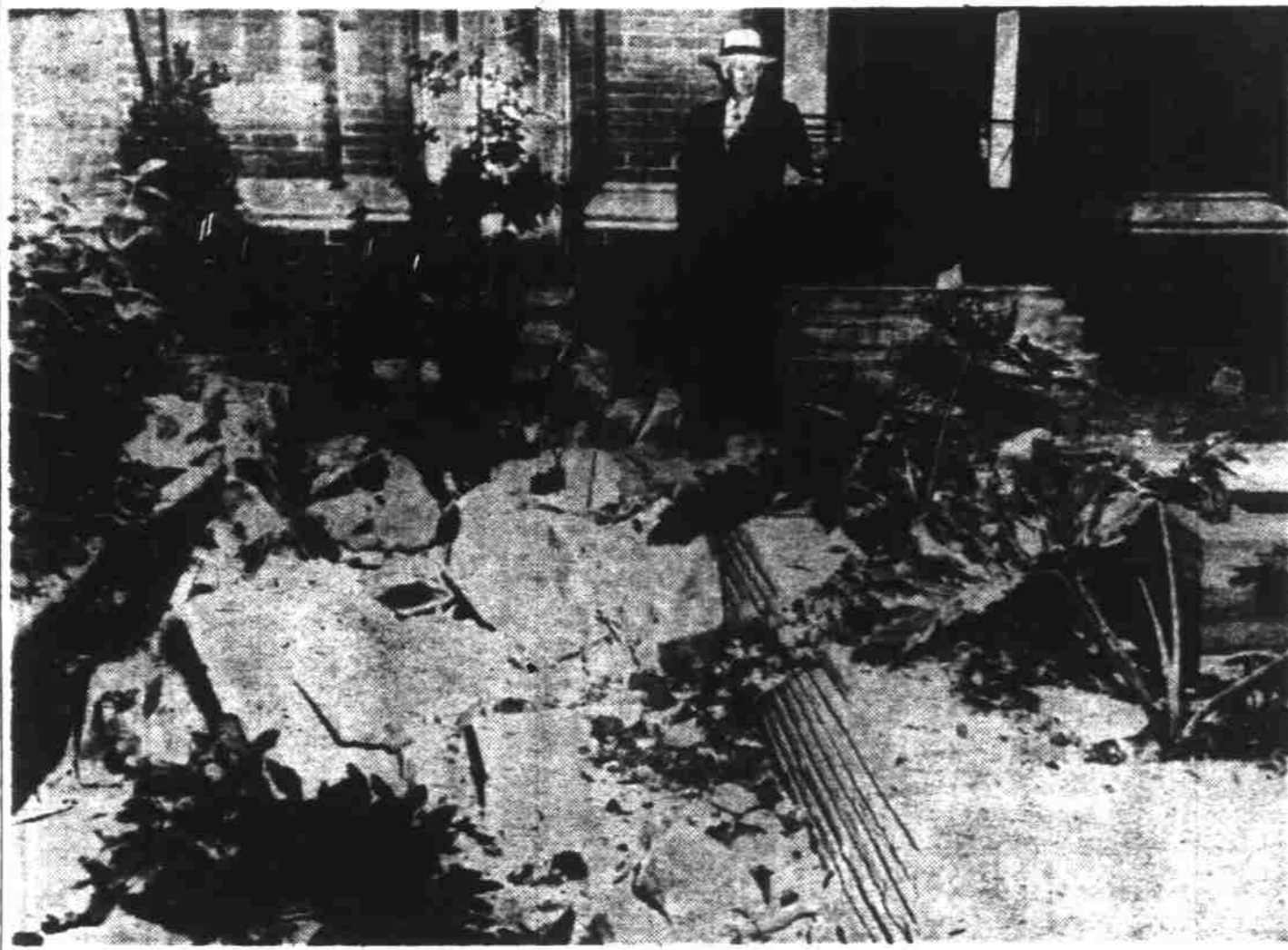
Withdrawal from the present State public employees retirement plan and switch to Federal Social Security should be completed by all city employees "about Aug. 3," Richard C. Stillwell, federal representative, reported.  
At a meeting Monday evening of about 75 city employees, Assistant City Attorney Thomas Churchill reviewed the current status of withdrawal from the Public Employees Retirement Board and switch to Social Security. A petition for withdrawal must now be sent to the Retirement Board at which time the Social Security will become effective "retroactive to Jan. 1, 1951," Stillwell announced.  
This change does not effect firemen as they are protected by a retirement plan of their own.

# Firemen Quell Two Blazes

Two fires, one at the old courthouse site and another in a parked automobile, were put out Monday by Salem firemen.  
Debris, consisting of wrecked lumber, caught fire from smoldering embers at the old courthouse site Monday evening. No damage was reported by firemen and the blaze was hurriedly extinguished.  
A short circuit in the wiring of his car was blamed for a fire in an auto owned by Clarence Hunt, 1040 N. 14th St. Damage to the wiring was reported by Hunt.

# 700 Tehachapi Families Feel Quake Effects

TEHACHAPI, Calif. (AP)—A tremor which "moved mountains" here Monday and killed 11 persons affected 700 families in the Tehachapi area, Richard Gordon, Red Cross Pacific Area disaster director, reported.  
Gordon said 15 homes were completely destroyed, 53 suffered major damage and 75 to 100 suffered minor damage. Thirty-one business houses were severely damaged, he said, with 25 per cent of them a total loss.  
He reported 25 persons were injured badly enough to require hospitalization. Twenty-four were hospitalized in Mojave and one was sent to Bakersfield, he said.

Dr. Hugo Benhoff of California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, told reporters that another earthquake, possibly as strong or stronger than Monday's could follow.  
He said that about one time in 20 in a quake of such magnitude, that is the case. Meanwhile, the area continued to rock periodically from what seismologists call settling aftershocks.  
It was California's most severe—but not disastrous—quake since the San Francisco shock of 1906. Only the fact that it hit in this sparsely-settled mountain country, seismologists agreed, kept the death and damage toll from being much worse.

Millions of Californians, from San Francisco to the Mexican border were awakened as the first shock hit at 4:52 a.m.  
San Francisco escaped damage but damage in Los Angeles was extensive although minor in nature.

Northwesterners named to the All-Star squad are All-America back Hugh McElhenry of the University of Washington and Guard Jim Clark of Oregon State.

# Iran Premier Resigns Due to Bloody Rioting

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Two days of bloody pitched battles between government troops and Nationalist mobs, supported by Communists, ended in the resignation Monday night of Iran's new premier, Ahmed Qavam.  
Qavam's pledge to seek a settlement of the Iranian quarrel with Britain over oil touched off the mobs' fury. Wild disorder erupted throughout the capital and in other parts of the country.  
The most violent clash and most casualties occurred when screaming demonstrators tried to storm parliament building and were fired on. Twenty persons reportedly were killed in Tehran.  
No London unconfirmed reports to British government officials said Prince Ali Reza, brother of the Shah, had been seriously wounded when he appeared near parliament building.  
Shouts of "Death to Qavam" rang out on every side. Troops and police resisted with rifle fire, bayonets and tear gas. In many cases, police reported rioters dragged corpses through the streets to arouse other followers to violence bordering on outright revolution.  
No official reason was given for Qavam's resignation, but presumably he acted to stop the bloodshed. Qavam had been in office four days, succeeding the aged Nationalist Party leader, Mohammed Mossadegh.

NEW YORK (AP)—Both Harry Matthews and Rocky Marciano were found in perfect condition Monday by New York Athletic Commission doctors for their heavyweight bout in Yankee Stadium a week hence.  
"Matthews is in even better shape than he was two years ago when he fought Bob Murphy," Dr. Vincent Nardiello said in response to a question from a reporter.  
After the examinations Jack Hurley, manager of Matthews, protested to Chairman Robert Christenberry about "certain unintentional fouls in Marciano's fighting style."  
Hurley said the New Englander has a "habit of holding and hitting, not breaking cleanly and of pushing a foe into the ropes and then hitting."  
Christenberry said he would alert all officials to look for all fouls.
