Surrenders Restore Quiet At Boston Pen

BOSTON (AP)—Quiet was restored Wednesday at the ancient, rambling state prison where 43 rebellious prisoners, holding three guards as hostages, surrendered after withstanding a tear gas siege for 15 hours. It was the state's worst prison riot.

The guards were released unharmed—one after five hours and the other two 10 hours later when the rioters surrendered unconditionally.

Warden John J. O'Brien, carrying out State Corrections Commissioner Maxwell B. Grossman's order that the trouble-makers be given the maximum penalty, ordered solitary confinement as punishment.

Grossman said the gang, led by two lifers, won no concessions from their uprising.

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Farm Extension Agents on Tour, Dinner Held

Farm extension agents of six Willamette Valley counties were honor guests at dinner last night at the half-way point of a two-day tour sponsored by the agriculture committee of the Salem Chamber of Commerce.

The dinner was at the Senator Hotel, attended by 75 persons.

Speakers, all of whom stressed the growing importance of water conservation and irrigation to Oregon's economy, included Gov. Douglas McKay, long-time chairman of the Willamette River Basin Commission, and Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State College.

Others at the speakers' table included Elmo Chase of Eugene, chairman of the Willamette Basin Project Committee; Dr. F. E. Price, dean of agriculture at Oregon State College; Col. T. H. Lipscomb of Portland, district engineer; Wade Newbegin of Portland, member of the Willamette River Basin Commission, and Ivan Oakes, executive secretary of the Willamette River Basin Commission.

Mayor Alfred Loucks presided.

From county agent offices were William Averill, extension agent of Multnomah County; O. S. Fletcher and William Parker, agent and assistant agent respectively, of Lane County; John J. Inskeep and Lee Gararian, agent and horticulture agent, respectively, of Clackamas County; Oscar Mikesell and Ken Priest, agent and assistant agent, respectively of Linn County; Palmer Torvond, agent of Washington County; and Ben Newell and Hollis Ottaway, agent and field crop representative respectively, of Marion County.

Committee Chairman

Heading the arranging committee was Ted Hobart, chairman of the C. of C. agriculture committee.

The Willamette Basin Project Committee was formed on invitation of the late Gov. Charles H. Martin in 1935. The Willamette River Basin Commission was created by the state legislature in 1939.

Figures given at the county agent's meeting last night showed that \$154 million dollars already had been appropriated for the Willamette Valley Project, with an over-all anticipation of \$400 million before it is completed.

The county agents' party visited power and irrigation projects in the lower valley area Wednesday, and will tour Detroit Dam today.

15 POLIO CASES

ONTARIO, Ore. (AP)—The number of polio cases in Malheur County increased to 15 Tuesday with five new cases reported by Dr. L. A. Maulding, county health officer. Maulding blamed inadequate sewage disposal facilities in part for spread of the disease.

Water Service Improvement at Neskowin Due

Improvement of water service for property owners at Neskowin is planned by Neskowin Water Co., it was disclosed following the filing of incorporation papers for the company this week in Marion County clerk's office.

Incorporators are James J. and Kathryn Walton and Ethel C. Riches. Capital stock is \$20,000, divided into 200 shares. Walton, himself a property owner at the coast community, purchased the water company from his uncle, William S. Walton, who started it at the time he developed the community about 25 years ago.

The water company serves the residential properties, the fire protection and the golf course at Neskowin.

Anti-American Feeling Grows In Iran Areas

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Anti-American feeling rose Wednesday in many parts of Tehran with the easing of domestic crisis that saw Rightist Ahmed Qavam ousted from the premiership and Nationalist Mohammed Mossadegh returned to power with increased prestige.

A belief developed among Iranians that the United States had supported Qavam, advocate of a British-Iranian oil settlement, against Mossadegh, the guiding spirit of Iran's oil nationalization program. Qavam himself was variously reported under arrest or a fugitive.

U. S. Judge

And the vote Tuesday of an American judge on the international court of justice at The Hague against a majority decision disclaiming jurisdiction in Britain's oil suit against Iran angered many Iranians formerly friendly to the

United States. The judge, Green H. Hackworth, and other dissenters were outvoted 9-5.

Visit by Henderson

The growing anti-American sentiment was based mainly on a 90-minute visit made by U. S. Ambassador Loy W. Henderson to Qavam's home Saturday. Nationalists contended this was an indication Henderson backed Qavam.

The Ambassador, however, told newsmen Qavam had summoned him. Since Qavam was premier, Henderson said, he had to make the call.

Demands for the blood of Qavam, like Mossadegh, a wealthy estate owner, were voiced by nationalist leaders before a throng of 50,000 Iranians at a memorial service Wednesday for the 35 or more persons killed in the demonstrations Monday that led to his downfall.
