

Tribe Trims Yanks 4-2, Moves Back In Flag Chase; Dodgers Split Up Two

The Cleveland Indians moved back into the American League pennant race Thursday as big Mike Garcia turned back the front-running New York Yankees, 4-2. Garcia's strong performance enabled the Indians to divide their four-game series with the Yankees. The Yankees opened the series with a double triumph on Tuesday and it appeared Cleveland's hopes were ended as they dropped 7½ games behind. But Bob Lemon got them back on the track Wednesday with a victory and Garcia's seven hitter Thursday closed the gap to 5½ games once again.

The victory also moved the Indians within one percentage point of the third place Washington Senators and within 1½ games of the second place Boston Red Sox. The Senators bowed, 4-2, to Detroit and Boston dropped a 3-0 decision to Chicago. The Red Sox trail the Yanks by four games.

Meanwhile, in the National League, Brooklyn's pace-setting Dodgers split a doubleheader with Cincinnati, winning the second game, 2-1, in 11-innings after the Reds took the opener, 3-2. The second place New York Giants trimmed the St. Louis Cardinals, 9-5, to pull within 6½ games of Brooklyn. Boston downed Philadelphia, 3-1. Pittsburgh and Philadelphia were idle.

Duke Snider's 100th major league homer enabled the Dodgers to shade Cincinnati in the second game of their twin bill. Snider connected with one out in the 11th inning off relief pitcher Frank Smith. The loss was Smith's eighth and fifth at the hands of Brooklyn. Ben Wade went all the way for Brooklyn, allowing only four hits.

Home Runs Feature

Home runs featured the Giants' triumph over the Cards. Homers by Bobby Thomson, Dave Williams, Sal Yvars and Dusty Rhodes enabled former Card Max Lanier to breeze to his first victory over his former mates. Lanier checked the Cards on six hits in besting Harry Brecheen, who was removed in the second inning.

Four-baggers also provided Boston with its margin of victory over Chicago. Rookie Ed Mathews clouted his 16th in the first inning and Sid Gordon homered in the third to put Boston ahead for keeps. Jim Wilson, with help in the ninth from Lew Burdette, gained his tenth victory.

The St. Louis Browns nipped the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-3, in the only major night game. Bob Young decided the issue with a sixth inning homer off Sam Zoladak. The blow broke a 3-3 tie.

A "Powder Puff" race is to be held just before the Class A main event, same featuring six female pilots in an 8-lap sortie.

In landing the "Powder Puffs" for the Saturday show here,

Valley Sports officials announced that the women drivers usually steal all the shows they appear in. "They get excited while racing and anything is apt to happen," is the way the sponsors put it.

The female pilots are usually the wives of the regular racing gang, and plenty of competition exists whenever they take to the wheels of the buzz buggies. One

Weekend Angling 'Cast Listed by Game Commish

PORTLAND (AP)—The weekly fishing report from the State Game Commission:

Northwest—Angling in the Mt. Hood and Clackamas River areas is fair to good. Bass fishing has been excellent in the past week in sloughs connected with the Willamette River. Surface lure is the preferred lure. Pan fishing with dry flies has produced good catches. Fishing is good to excellent in the upper stretches of the Alsea and the Siletz Rivers. Fishing is fair for sea-run cutthroats in tidalwater. A few chinooks have been caught at the mouth of Yaquina. All streams are low and clear. Fishing on the McKenzie is good but the tributaries have slowed down to some extent. Willamette and tributaries have been good. Clear Lake is improved over last week. Big Lake is poor. Linton Lake has been fair. Fish have been reported in Linton Meadows above Linton Lake. Dorena reservoir is slow and South Santiam is fair. Fishing is slow and a few chinooks are showing in Nehalem Bay. Warm water fishing is good in Sunset and Cullaby Lakes. Tillamook area streams are poor to fair. The tide is fair to good. Lakes are good for trout and spring-rays. Salmon angling is good offshore and the tidewater is improving.

Southwest—Trout fishing in upper Rogue River is good to excellent, but fair to poor in Grants Pass area. Water is low and best catches are made on flies. Fishing at Winchester Bay is good provided weather conditions are satisfactory for crossing the bar. Trout fishing in the coastal lakes is fair. Good catches of trout are being made in the North Umpqua River from Winchester to Eagle Rock and in the South Umpqua from Milo to Camp Comfort. Some salmon trout are being taken in the vicinity of Umpqua and the forks. Summer steelhead fishing is good at Steamboat, but only a few have been caught at Winchester. Conditions are very good with moderately low level clear water.

Central—Angling prospects for the weekend are picking up. The road is open into Three Creeks Lake and fishing is good. Angling on trolling spinner and worms and bait fishing with single eggs are best. Blue Lake is good on troll and fly fishing in the evening continues good. Sparks Lake is producing some beauties late in the evening on caddis and coachman flies. East and Pauline Lakes are picking up on trolling and bait. Crane Prairie has been good on trolling and worms. Metolius River fly fishing is good. Upper Deschutes is still producing some very nice catches. Fly fishing late in the evening has been good in the vicinity of Bend and Camp Abbott. Mid-Deschutes is at its best; low and clear with the best fishing of the year in this area. Cove on Crooked River is very good. Few steelhead are reported taken in the Maupin area on the Deschutes. Odell Lake continues to produce the big ones with 16 mackinaw taken this week from 11½ to 21 pounds. Trout fishing is also good in Odell. Crescent Lake is good on trolling. Summit Lake is also good. Little Deschutes and Crescent Creek are fair. Elk Lake is good and Davis Lake is fair.

Besselink Has Tourney Lead

SIoux CITY, Ia. (AP) — Al Besselink, a big, handsome New Jersey native, fired a 7-under-par 65 Thursday in the first round of the 72-hole, \$15,000 Sioux City Open golf tournament.

The 28-year-old Besselink, who registers from Escondido, Calif., but calls Merchantville, N. J., "home," had a one-stroke lead over Doug Ford, of Harrison, N. Y., with nearly half of the field of 114 starters reported.

Besselink had a two-under par 34 for his first nine and then blistered the back nine for a 31, getting birdies on the first four holes.

Al Zimmerman, Portland, Ore., was one of five tied for fourth with 68.

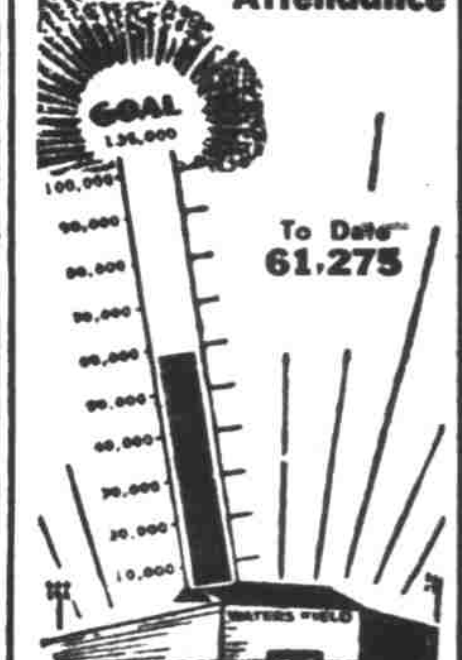
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
