Summer Dressings

Salad Dressings Take on Lighter Form for Crisp Summertime Mixtures

We wrote recently about the simplicity of salads as served in the days of my mother's first housekeeping efforts and also gave a recipe or two for salad dressing, which by the way, were usually of the boiled variety.

Now-a-days, though cabbage slaw and often potato salad call for cooked dressings, most of the combinations are uncooked. Mayonnaise, the homemade variety, has given way almost completely to commercially prepared, though a bit of home made mayonnaise is a welcome change.

A honey dressing that's taken an important place in many home salads is, extra good for fruit combinations, though excellent for most vegetable mixtures too if made a bit less sweet.

HONEY DRESSING

- | | |
|------------------------|--------------------------|
| 2 1/2 cup sugar | 5 tablespoons vinegar |
| 1 teaspoon dry mustard | 1/2 cup honey |
| 1 teaspoon paprika | 1 tablespoon lemon juice |
| 1/4 teaspoon salt | 1 teaspoon grated onion |
| 1 teaspoon celery seed | 1 cup oil |

Garlic clove

Mix dry ingredients, add honey, vinegar and lemon juice and onion. Pour oil into mixture slowly, beating constantly. Makes 2 cups.

Here's another dressing in my note book labeled Pi Phi Dressing. Though no Pi Phi myself, I'm pretty well surrounded by them both at home and at work, so though there is no further designation of its source, we aren't surprised.

PI PHI DRESSING

- | | |
|-----------------|--------------------|
| 3/4 cup sugar | 1 teaspoon mustard |
| 1/2 cup vinegar | 1 cup salad oil |
| 1 teaspoon salt | 1 teaspoon onion |

Cook all but oil and onion for about a minute. Cook and add other ingredients, stirring until thick.

Then in our notebook is another dressing designated as coming from "Mabel" whoever Mabel may be.

MABEL'S FRUIT DRESSING

- | | |
|---------------------|-------|
| 6 sweet red peppers | Sugar |
| 6 lemons | |

Grind peppers and lemons and measure, adding an equal quantity of sugar. Cook, but do not overcook as dressing thickens when cooled.

A rather interesting recipe for cream dressing for slaw is another old one, source unknown other than it is among mother's recipes.

CREAM DRESSING FOR SLAW

- | | |
|-----------------------|-----------------|
| 1 cup cream | 1/2 cup vinegar |
| 1 dessert spoon sugar | Pepper and salt |

Whip cream until foamy but not stiff. Add sugar, salt and pepper to taste. Lastly add the vinegar which cuts the cream and keep it foamy.

Then, of course, no story on salad dressings could be complete without my own favorite, the one I know by heart and keep on hand summer and winter:

FRENCH DRESSING

| 1 cup salad oil | 1/2 cup sugar |
| 1/2 cup catsup | Salt, pepper |
| 1/2 cup vinegar | Celery salt |

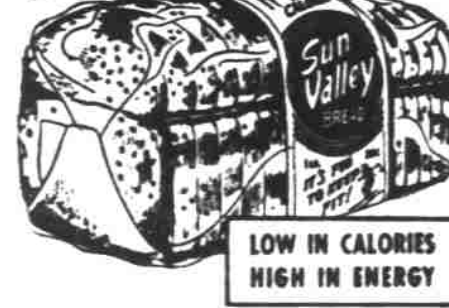
