Buying for Your Home

Simple Care for Rubber Flooring, Electric Lawn Mower for Women

Q. "We have just bought a home with rubber flooring in several areas and I would like to know the best way to care for this type of material."

(A) Rubber flooring manufacturers suggest you resist the impulse to scrub their products. For ordinary cleaning, simply brush up loose dirt with a vacuum, broom, or non-oily mop, and buff it to maintain a glossy sheen. If the floor becomes very dirty you can give it a quick once-over with a mop dampened in cold water. For a thorough cleaning once or twice a year, use a cleaning solution recommended for rubber flooring. Rinse with a mop wrung out in clear, cold water, and let it dry. Then buff and apply a thin coat of water-emulsion flooring wax. Buff, apply a second coat of wax and then buff again. You need not clean the whole floor if one spot is very dirty; just go over that spot and re-wax it. Do the



same with an area that gets a good deal of traffic, to offset the extra wear.

(Q) "Do you know of a good electric lawn mower for a woman to use? I'd like to take over the job of cutting lawns at our house—to make sure it is done regularly—but am a little hesitant about using a powered mower."

(A) There is a new lawn mower on the market, designed especially for homemakers who feel the way you do about powered models. It is impossible to cut the cord of the mower, thanks to a cord control handle which slides easily into either side of the mower. The cord is kept out of line of the mower's operation. A twist-release cord hook eliminates the need to unwind the cord. The complete coil lifts off in a single operation and the mower is ready for use. The mower is light weight and cuts forward or backward. Retractable blades avoid trouble from hidden obstacles. It runs with little noise, and since it goes within half an inch of bushes, trees and walls, it saves you trimming work after the mowing job is done.

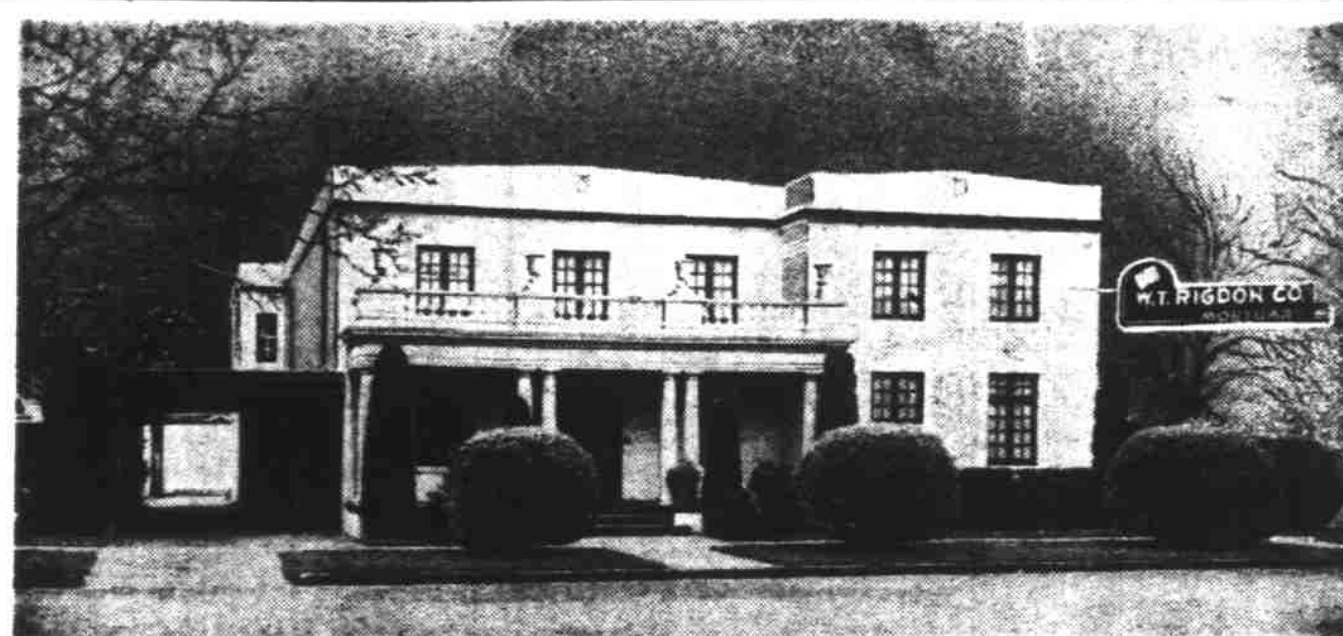
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Couple Wed

Mrs. Barry, 79, Dies; Arrived In Oregon by Wagon Train

Mrs. Della E. Barry, 79, a member of one of the last wagon trains to cross over the Blue Mountains, died Sunday morning in a local hospital.

Mrs. Barry came to Oregon over the Blue Mountains in 1916. The wagon train in which she traveled with her husband and family was one of the last sizable ones to make the journey.

Born in Nebraska in 1872, Mrs. Barry spent most of her early life in close connection with the development of the mining industry in the West.

Shortly after her marriage in 1892 to Patrick John Barry, she lived in Cripple Creek, Colo., an early-settled town in the mountains west of Colorado Springs. Later she and her husband lived in Butte, Mont. during the development of the copper mines there. They also lived in various Idaho settlements.

For several years before the turn of the century, Mrs. Barry's husband was a stage driver along the historic route from Walla Walla, Wash. to Laramie, Wyo. They came to Oregon because of her husband's ill health and he died here in 1924.

Mrs. Barry was a lifelong member of the Baptist Church, although failing health for the past 15 years had prevented regular attendance.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Mildred Radcliff and Mrs. Mary Church, both of Salem; three sons, John of Oswego, Lawrence of Ada, Ore.; and Patrick of Salem; two brothers, Elmer Boyer of Brockway and Sidney Boyer of Oroville, Calif.; six grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Private graveside services will be held at City View Cemetery at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday under the direction of the Howell-Edwards Co.
