

Wafdist Party Backs Egyptian Strong Man

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—The Army-backed government of Premier Aly Maher Pasha got the blessing of the powerful Wafdist party Monday for its drive to end corruption and wipe out the last traces of ex-King Farouk's reign.

Former Wafdist Premier Mustapha el Nahas Pasha and party boss Fuad Serag el Din Pasha, returning from a European vacation, quickly jumped on the bandwagon of strong man Maj. Gen. Mohammed Naguib Bey, who's anti-corruption military coup put Maher Pasha in power and ended the 16-year reign of the playboy monarch on Saturday.

Nahas Pasha's joy at seeing Farouk leave Egypt well could be traced to the fact that the ruler had ousted his government after the disastrous Cairo riots in January.

Helped Bribery

Some leaders of the Wafd, the only big, well-organized party in Egypt, have been accused of participation in the bribery and corruption Naguib and Maher Pasha are pledged to wipe out.

But Nahas Pasha was met at the airport and embraced by Naguib himself. The powerful nationalist ex-premier heaped high praise on the general's sweeping reform program and Wafd spokesmen said the party would support Naguib and Maher Pasha.

"I thank God our people now are entrusted to our valiant army commander," said Nahas. "I pray to God to grant success to the task undertaken by General Naguib."

B. — Maher Pasha moved his government from Alexandria, where he and Naguib watched Farouk and the royal family sail off to exile Saturday in the King's fabulous yacht Mahroussa.

Prime task facing the government was that of working out constitutional means of setting up to rule the country for the new infant King Ahmed Fuad II, six-months-old son of Farouk and his teen-age wife Nariman.

The baby boy who may someday rule Egypt—unless further reforms sweep out the monarchy altogether—was with his mother and father aboard the royal yacht. The royal family reportedly was on its way to Italy, but no one knew yet where it would land. There were unconfirmed reports that, after a stay in Italy and possibly France, Farouk hoped to go to the United States.

Logging Group Favors Truck Tax System

PORTLAND (AP)—The Associated Forest Industries of Oregon, whose members handle 80 per cent of the state's forestry business, Monday approved continuation of the weight-mile tax on logging trucks.

Trucking companies and the Teamsters union are opposed to the weight-mile tax and have placed an initiative measure on the November election ballot, which if approved by voters, would do away with it.

Charles E. Ogle, Salem, secretary-manager of the Associated Forest Industries, said the constitutional amendment proposed in the initiative "would result in short haul trucks . . . paying more than their share of taxes."

A resolution, approved at the association's board meeting, said the legislature intended that highway construction and maintenance costs should be paid for by gasoline taxes, license plate fees and a weight-mileage tax on trucks.

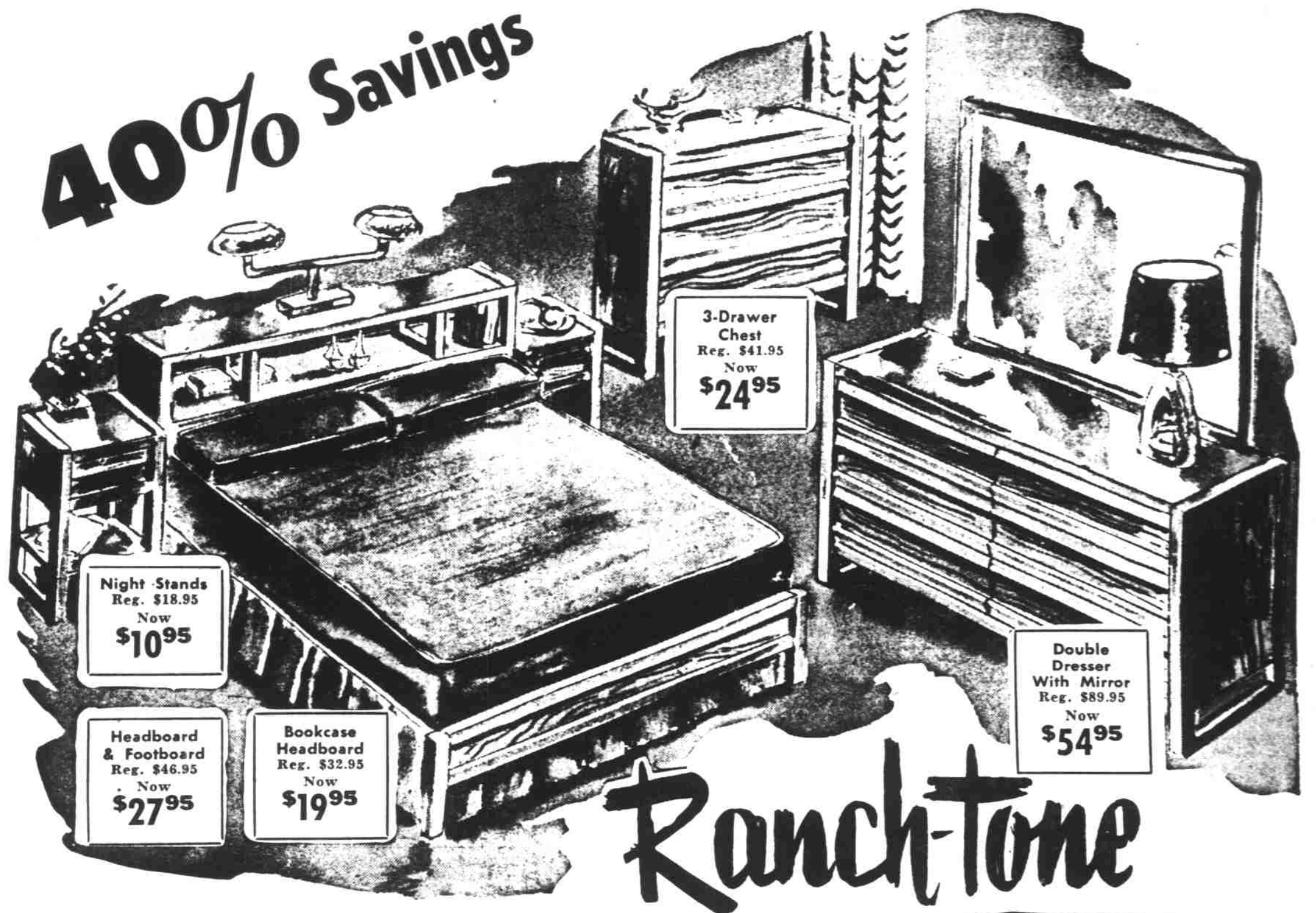

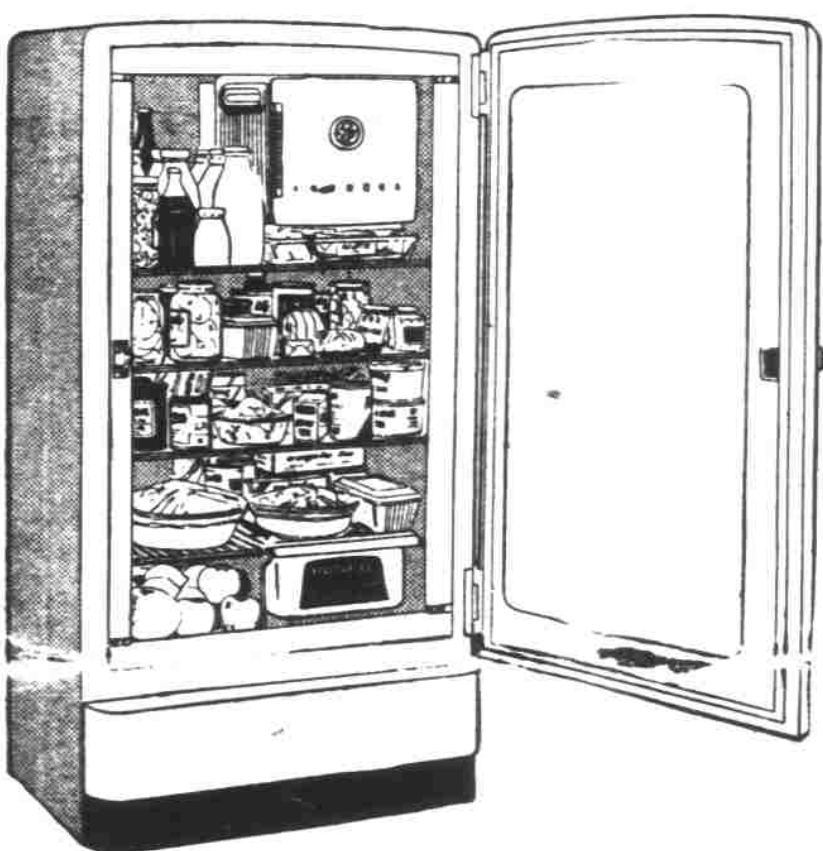
