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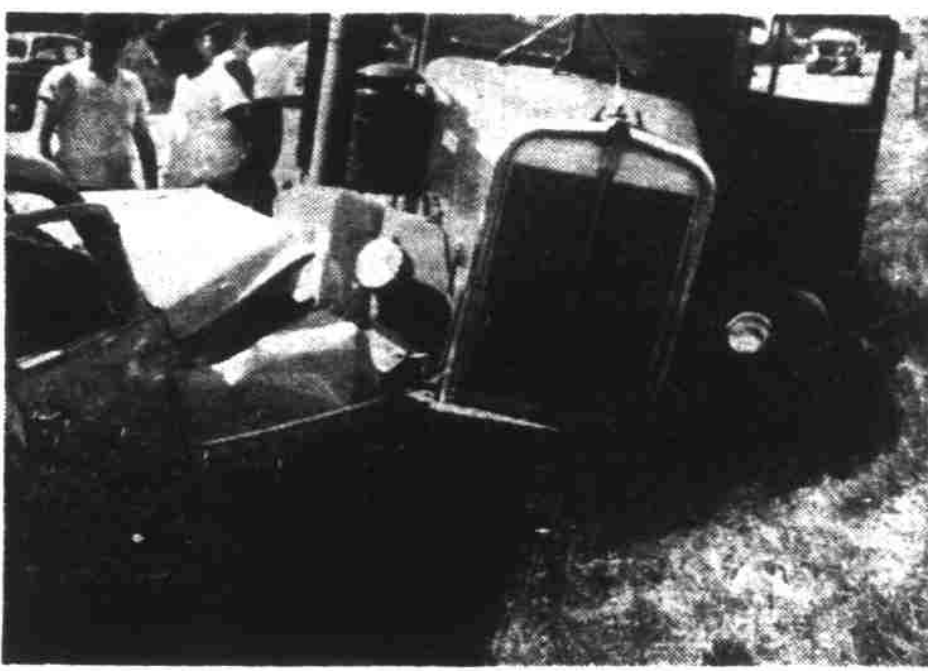
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Truck, Car Hit on Highway

Guilty Plea in Assault Case Nets 2 Years

Augusta Yarber of Portland pleaded guilty to a reduced assault charge Monday in Marion County Circuit Court and was sentenced to two years in the State Penitentiary.

Yarber waived indictment and pleaded to a charge reduced from assault with intent to kill to assault with a dangerous weapon. Complaint in the charge was filed by James P. Glover, Salem, who said Yarber had fired a pistol at him Tuesday night.

Jack Ray Trute, 18, of Portland, was given a suspended two-year penitentiary sentence and placed on three years' probation on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling. He and a 17-year-old companion broke into Salem Home Bakery, 1380 N. Church St., last March 17.

They escaped briefly after their arrest the following day and led police on a foot-chase in downtown Salem. Trute was ordered not to return to Multnomah County without permission of the State Board of Parole and to make restitution within 30 days.

John Henry Schram, Albany, changed his plea from guilty to innocent on a charge of larceny of an auto and was continued for trial.

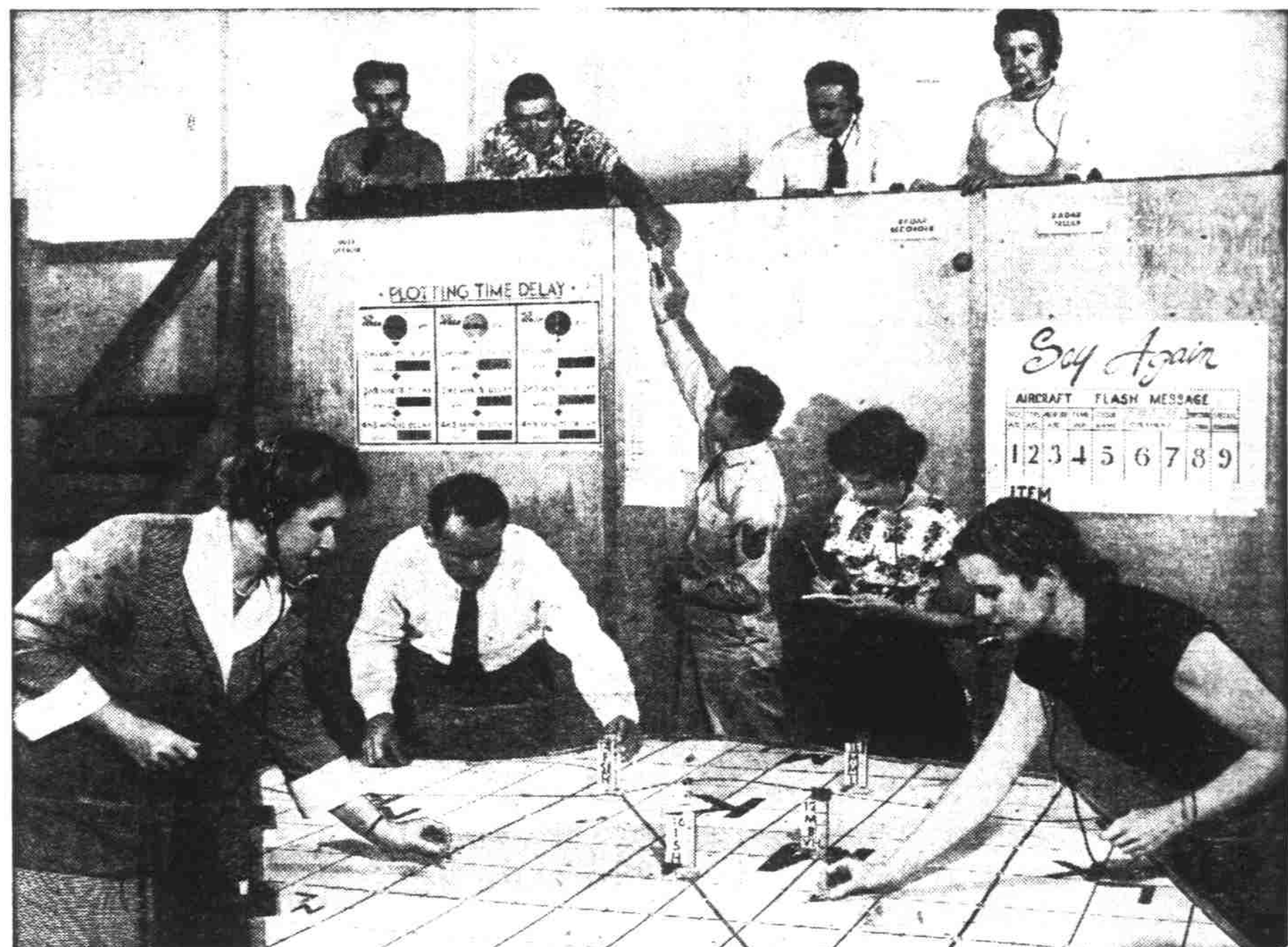
