

Iran Resents U.S. Military Mission

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Demands for the withdrawal of U. S. military missions erupted in Parliament Tuesday and the nationalist newspaper ASR said Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's government has decided to end the mission's services.

The newspaper, which occasionally gets tips from sources close to the government, said Iranian officials reasoned they did not need a strengthened army since they "have no intention of attacking anybody."



Mrs. A. Gen. Wayne Zimmerman, head of the Army mission, called on Mossadegh Tuesday and U. S. Ambassador Loy W. Henderson made his second visit to the premier in three days.

Zimmerman said in an interview he did not discuss current anti-American manifestations with Mossadegh, but "paid my respects to him as Minister of National Defense and told him the Army mission was ready to give any assistance necessary to the Ministry of Defense."

The Army mission trains the Iranian Army. A gendarmerie mission trains and advises the gaudily-uniformed National Police. A Military Assistance Advisory Group (MAAG) advises and supplies the Army.

Corn Prices Rise Slightly

CHICAGO (AP)—Grains milled around the previous close Monday most of Tuesday's board of trade sessions, with wheat and oats easing off at the close and corn putting a slight advance.

There was little export business in wheat and corn.

Austria was credited with a cargo of wheat and Holland with a cargo of corn.

Aside from that traders were confronted with guessing what the weather will do, and what damage may result from an infestation of army worms in Wisconsin, announced the Department of Agriculture.

At the finish wheat was 1/4 to 1/2 lower, corn was unchanged to 1/4 higher, rye was 1 cent to 1 1/2 lower, oats were 1/4 to 1/2 lower, soybeans were unchanged to 1/4 lower and lard was 8 to 12 cents a hundred pounds lower.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman Nathan P. Feinsinger of the Wage Stabilization Board stepped out of office Tuesday with a prediction that the nation "cannot have a stabilization program without a disputes program."

The 18-man board which Feinsinger heads was abolished by Congress last month, largely as the result of criticism of its action in the steel strike. Congress ordered a new board set up to take office Wednesday with no authority to make any recommendations for settling nationwide labor disputes.

England Exporting Monocles to Africa

LONDON (AP)—Britain has found a new outlet for her export drive—sending monocles to Africa. A box containing 200 monocles left London airport for Freetown, Sierra Leone, Tuesday night. Commented a bewildered official:
