

It's 'Pay Portland Night' Monday; Legions Set

The town Senators will not merely be playing the Portland Beavers in their annual Waters Field biggie next Monday night—they'll also be trying to pay 'em off.

Monday's game is to be officially called "Play and Pay Portland Night," according to Senators officials who hope to be able to draw enough fans for the game to pay off the yearly installment owned the Portland franchise and ball park.

Last year's game with Portland here attracted 5,540 admissions, the single game high for the season and second largest gathering in Waters Field history. After government taxes and actual expenses were deducted, both the Senators and Beavers divided up slightly less than \$3,500.

"We'll have to draw about that many again this year if we're to be able to make our full payment to the Beavers," General Manager Hugh Luby has assured. Luby and the club's board of directors, headed by Don Young, are determined to draw enough for the one game Monday to make the big payment and get it out of the way for this year.

The annual payments amount to \$2,500, plus interest.

Tickets for the game with the Beavers are now on sale at Wicklund's Sporting Goods store, and at the ball park, at no hike in prices. Fans are urged to secure theirs as early as possible.

Luby stopped in Portland Monday, en route to Lewiston, to emphasize to the Beavers management that such stars as home-run hitting Joe Brown, shortstop Frankie Austin, Eric Tipton, Hank Art, etc., must make an appearance in the local game.

Meanwhile the annual American Legion Junior Baseball Tournament opens its four-day run at Waters Field Thursday with a 6:30 doubleheader. The Portland Boulevard Lumber team (Lincoln High School) faces Eugene in the opening game, and then Salem's Capital Posters go against The Dailies Baker in the nightcap.

QUESTION: How does an insurance Company settle a claim for a damaged tire? Do they replace it with a new one?

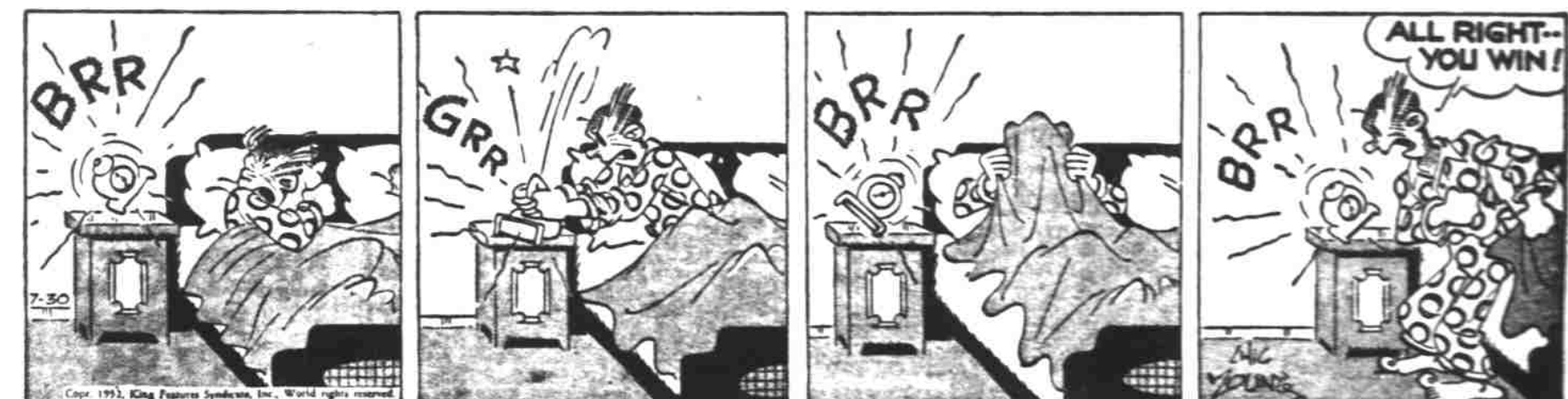
ANSWER: The Company adjuster and the insured usually work it out on a mutually satisfactory basis. For instance if a tire had cost \$25.00 new and had 80% of its wear left, the adjuster would allow \$20.00 and if it had run half of the miles expected of it he would allow \$12.50 and so forth.

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
