Mustering Out Pay Application Blanks Ready

Veterans of service since the start of the Korean conflict may now obtain forms on which to apply for mustering out payments under the Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952, the State Department of Veterans Affairs announced Thursday.

The Veterans Department has reproduced a supply of the application blanks and is distributing them to Oregon's county service officers. The department also will furnish them to veterans on request.

Mustering-out pay is provided in the new "GI Bill," for personnel discharged from active duty in the armed services since June 27, 1950, whether they had received mustering-out pay for World War II services or not.

The payments amount to \$100 for veterans with less than 60 days active service, \$200 for those with 60 days or more of active service in the United States only, and \$300 for veterans with 60 days or more active service, some of which was outside the United States or in Alaska.

Payments to discharged veterans will be in a lump sum. Those still on active duty will receive \$100 at discharge and the remainder, if any, in \$100 monthly installments.

It is paid to enlisted men and to officers below the grade of major or lieutenant commander.

Oregon's New Gas Chamber Ready for Use

Completion of Oregon's new execution chamber at the State Penitentiary here was announced Thursday by Prison Warden Virgil O'Malley.

The gas chamber is located northwest of the prison garage outside of the prison walls.

First execution in the new chamber is slated for Friday, August 8, when Wayne Leroy Long, will go to his death for the slaying of Albert Rucker in Clackamas County. He was convicted of first-degree murder in the Clackamas County Circuit Court. Testimony at the trial showed that Long killed Rucker to obtain his truck for use in a bank holdup and robbery in Portland.

Long was wounded by officers following the bank holdup. Prison officials said Long is being closely guarded and has requested no special favors.
