Pie-Eating Contest

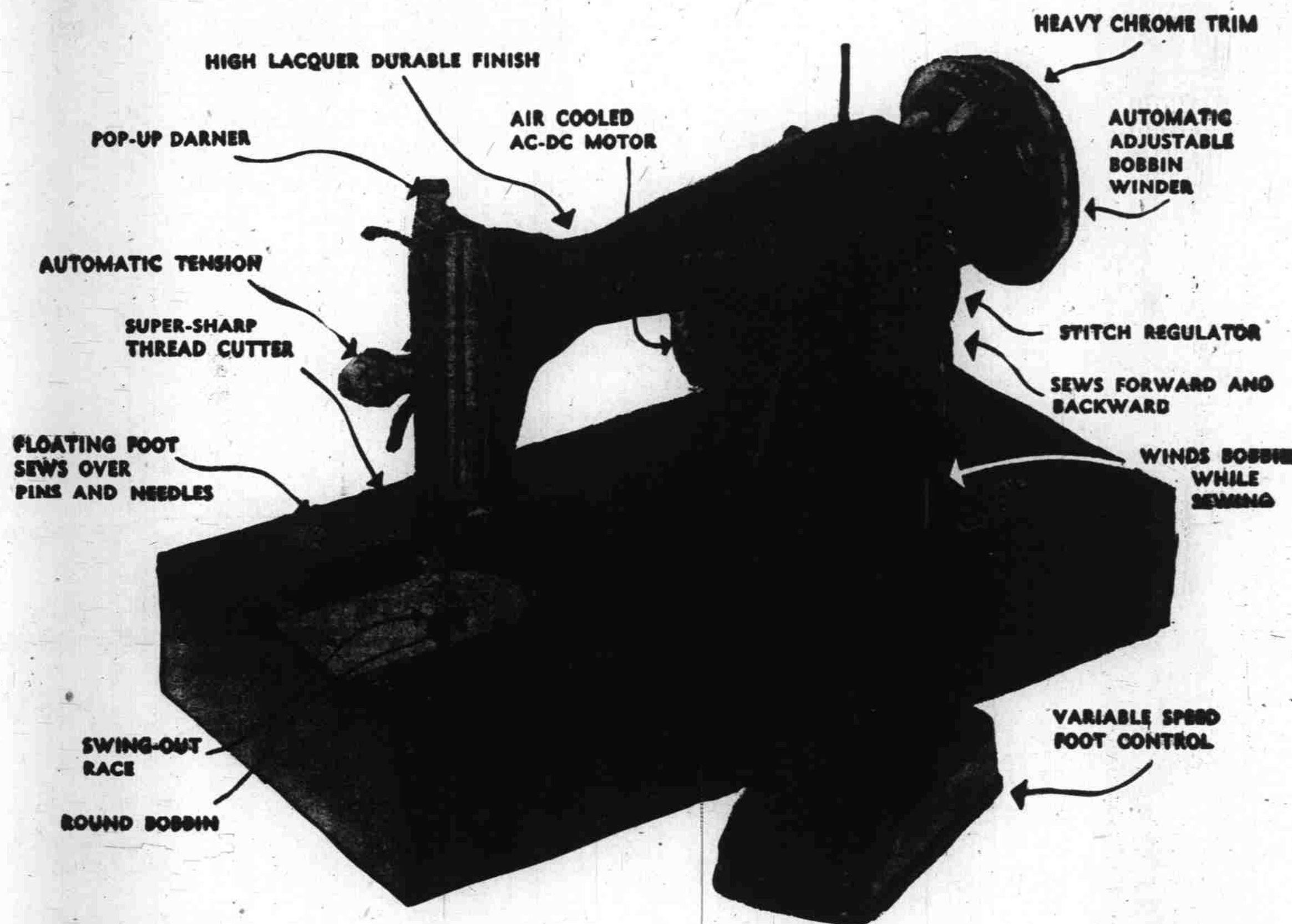
