

Fruit Punch for Whole Family At Best When of Mixed Flavors

Summertime is the big season for chilled fruit juices and other icy beverages that are suited to the whole family for thirsts usually make themselves known around the house about meal-time or on a warm Sunday afternoon.

Though we aren't punching for tea, we are suggesting that many punch bases, especially where a large quantity is wanted, begin with freshly brewed tea.

JUICES ABLENTY

The fruit juices found in several forms in the groceryman's frozen foods counter are the housewife's comfort, too. These juices, frozen when the fruits are plentiful, are usually a money saver and certainly a great conservator of time.

You can get orange, lemon, tangerine and grape juice at almost any store. Check the label for required dilution.

The canned juices, though a more familiar commodity, are certainly none the less valuable for home use. There's wider variety there than in the frozen juices, so almost any flavor can be had in punch.

Here's a variety of punch, some small, some larger recipes:

FRUIT TEA PUNCH

1 cup freshly brewed tea 1 can grapefruit juice
(made using 2 teaspoons of 1 can pineapple juice
tea per cup of boiling wa- 1 quart ginger ale
ter) 1/2 cup sugar
Sliced lemon
Mix sugar with fruit juices and tea. Chill. Just before serving, pour in ginger ale. Garnish with lemon. Serves 6.

GRADUATION PUNCH

1 No. 5 can blended orange 1/2 cup water
and grapefruit juice Ice cubes
1 No. 2 can orange or tan- 1 quart ginger ale
gerine juice Mint sprigs
1/2 cup sugar Lime juice
Chill juices; add sugar syrup made by combining sugar and water and stirring over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Pour into 12 tall glasses over ice. Add ginger ale. Top with mint sprigs and lime slices. Yield: about 12 servings.
Here's one that takes sherbet for glamor:

SHERBET TEA PUNCH

2 cups hot tea infusion 1 cup orange juice
(made using 2 teabags to 1/2 cup lemon juice
each cup boiling water) 1 pint light ginger ale
1 cup sugar 1 pint orange sherbet
Slices of lemon or lime

Pour tea infusion over sugar and when sugar is dissolved add fruit juices. Strain over a large piece of ice. Just before serving add ginger ale and fruit slices. When ready to use, add 1 pint of very well frozen sherbet. Makes enough punch for 12 healthy servings.

TEENTIME TEA PUNCH

3 cups orange juice 3 cups strong hot tea
1 cup lemon juice (made with 6 teaspoons
1 cup pineapple juice tea to three cups boiling
1 cup berry juice water)
1 cup hot water 1 1/4 cups sugar
1 quart charged water

Mix fruit juices with pineapple, berry syrup and tea. Boil sugar and water 5 minutes. Combine. Chill thoroughly. Just before serving add charged water. Serve over block of ice. Serves 20.

If you'd like to get a little dressy, freeze fruit juice in the refrigerator tray and use in the punch. Or make the following sherbet and serve it in your punch:

ORANGE ICE

3/4 cup (6-ounce can) con- 1 1/2 cups water
centrated quick-frozen 1/2 cup sugar
orange-juice Dash of salt
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Combine orange juice and water in saucepan and heat slightly. Remove from heat; add sugar and salt and stir until dissolved. Then add lemon juice. Pour into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator, setting control for coldest freezing temperature. Freeze 1/2 hour. Turn into bowl and beat with rotary beater until light and fluffy. Return to tray and freeze 1 hour longer. Then beat again until smooth, but not melted. Freeze until firm. Freezing time: 3 to 4 hours. Serve on fruit cup, as entree accompaniment, or in punch. Makes 3 cups.

Buying for Your Home

Now You Can Watch Roast in New Glass-Topped Range, Other Features

Have you ever wanted a full view of a roasting turkey or meat in your oven? Well, you can have it in a new model gas range which features an oblong of heat tempered glass on the top of the stove. From a standing position, you can watch the roasting or baking process of your food inside the oven. A push button on the stove edge lights up the oven and the glass window, twelve inches long and three wide. The top window is just beside the right hand gas burners.

Bright red signals show the flame height of burners on this stove. For easy cleaning, the oven vents are in the lower section of the backguard and are slanted downward to carry fumes toward the cooking top. White key plates are easily lifted out for a quick cleaning job. In a new electric range, the oven racks are provided with a hand grip at the front for adjustment to 14 different positions. This model is also equipped with a rotary roaster spit for one of the two ovens in the range.

There has been an increased demand for vanatories, or combination vanity-lavatory units for the bathroom. One of the best styled of the new models is a plastic-top, plywood, ready-to-paint unit. It looks like a modern vanity except for the sink part which is on the right. The left hand side is a smooth top surface for cosmetics, and a slanting portion from the center top to the floor allows for an odd-shaped door to the section that conceals the plumbing. The top left hand section has a drawer and the model comes with a three-legged stool. The tops are available in coral, yellow, lime, pearl gray, and moss green.

New styling is also apparent in other units for the home which have dual purposes. One of these is a sewing machine cabinet that is actually built to the specifications of a pedestal desk. Only by close inspection would you guess there was a sewing machine inside and then you could prove it only by investigating the cut-out under the desk blotter. A handle located at the back of the desk raises the cut-out panel so that it can be removed and the head brought up to working height. The knee control is hidden when the machine is not in use. The machine

is an Italian import, but the cabinet is made in this country. Walnut and mahogany are the wood choices offered. Comfort in sewing machine chairs has been given far too little attention by manufacturers, but this desk-machine is being shown with a dining room type chair with a back support higher than that of the average chair, a height which has been found best for working at a machine. The chair is plastic covered and has a right hand drawer under the seat for sewing accessories.

Among the other new appliances shown at the recent Chicago markets is a dishwasher which rolls out, drawer style, for top loading and rolls back for washing. This leaves the top of the unit free for surface space in the kitchen. The washer also holds more dishes than earlier models.

A new model freezer resembles a refrigerator and can be used in a kitchen where space is a problem since it takes up only two and a half by three feet of floor space. This upright model has large easy-to-use compartments and gives up to eighteen and a half cubic feet of storage space.

A low-priced kitchen sink unit, new on the market, has three drawers, graduating in size to a large bottom one, and a two-door compartment which holds a soap box and towel rack and a compartment with a shelf. It is ideal for a small kitchen where floor space is at a premium since the 54 inch model offers a variety of storage space.

An automatic electric clothes dryer has been designed to eliminate guesswork in operation. Drying is controlled by a thermostat shut-off instead of a time control. As the moisture is reduced the temperature rises with 160 degrees marked for damp dry and 180 for dry. The thermostat shuts off the heating element and when the temperature drops about 20 degrees so the clothes can be handled, the motor shuts off and the dryer stops completely. The appliance also features an overhead, over-size infra-red radiant heating unit to quick-dry clothes, and a large safety by-pass lint trap. The 16-inch front opening is designed for easy access to the interior. The unit will also be available as a gas dryer. (Copyright 1952, General Features Corp.)

Oregon Gas Tax Collection Higher Than Last Year

Gasoline tax collections in Oregon covering the first six months of 1952 were more than \$400,000 in excess of those for the corresponding period in 1951, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry said Thursday.

Newberry said there was an increase in gasoline tax collections every month this year with the exception of June when they dropped \$52,194.

The secretary of state said he had not been able to determine why the tax collections dropped in June when a large number of tourists were reported in Oregon.

Fuels tax revenues for the first half of this year aggregated \$15,672,303 as compared with \$15,252,587 the first six months of the previous year.
