

Penitentiary Guard Suspended, Investigated for Hitting Convict

Investigation of charges against Ray R. Howell of Silverton, a guard at the Oregon State Penitentiary, presumably for striking a convict, are being made at the penitentiary, Howell revealed Friday.

Howell, who reported the incident after he had been given a two-day layoff, was ruffled by the implication of a charge. The investigation is being made by Deputy Warden Lawrence O'Brien.

But Warden Virgil O'Malley refused to name either the substance of the charges or the persons involved. "I'd rather not say that these charges have anything to do with the recent convict

"pruno" party at the penitentiary," O'Malley reported Friday. "I believe in giving my men a fair investigation before any charges are filed against them. Howell has been a good guard. If a hearing is in order I want a fair investigation to precede it," he emphasized.

Marion County District Attorney E. O. Stadler Jr., reported Friday that "no such charge has been processed" through his office.

Howell in Silverton explained that he had struck inmate James Quentin Anderson while two other guards held the "prunoed" convict Wednesday. He explained that he had tried to take the knife away from the intoxicated Anderson and had been kicked in the groin. "I was in a lot of pain from that, but I hauled off and slugged him on the chin. He was cold for a minute and I took the knife."

Howell admitted he wasn't supposed to hit a man while he was held but said he had done so to disarm Anderson who was in no condition to be reasoned with.

Howell said he wasn't sure whether he had been suspended or fired but did say that a hearing had been promised him by Warden O'Malley.

A check of the prison is being made to determine possible places where fruits, foods or anything else used in making "pruno" are stored by the convicts. Warden O'Malley said this probe is being hampered by construction within the institution walls.

Grand Parade Tops Stayton Fete Events

STAYTON — Three divisional first prizes were awarded Friday in the grand parade for the Stayton Bean Festival in which 35 entries vied for top honors.

In the commercial division, first place went to Raleigh Harold, florist, whose float showed two girls in a garden scene. The First National Bank float, with a small girl putting large shiny pennies in a huge piggy-bank, took second place honors in this division. Third place was taken by the Stayton Mail.

First-place honors in the non-commercial division went to the North Santiam Chamber of Commerce, with a float showing a forestry setting of the Santiam area. Second place went to the Santiam Memorial Hospital Women's Auxiliary whose float showed several children in a boat. The Catholic Daughters of America won third place.

In the organizations division, the first place ribbon was won by the Rainbow Girls whose float portrayed a large rainbow and carried pretty girls in pastel formal. The Knights of Columbus dressed in period costumes and with a boatload of pirates won second place and the Santiam Grange was awarded third spot honors.

The parade, which was led by a mounted color guard, included several bands and marching groups. Judges of the floats were James Nightingale, Sublimity; S. H. Wright, Aumsville, and Carl R. Warren, Seilo.

"This was one of the best parades ever held in Stayton with a good enthusiastic crowd and favorable weather on our side," M. J. Martin, general chairman said after the parade had ended.

Saturday's events are to be touched off by a horse parade beginning at 1 p.m. and followed by a horse show at the festival grounds arena under the direction of Gene Teague. A bean feed at a nominal charge will be held at the conclusion of the horse show. A fire, built Friday, has been maintained and the beans will be cooked on the hot coals.

The Santiam Bean Festival will be concluded with the Bean Hoppers Ball beginning at 9:30 p.m. in the civic building on the festival grounds.

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market ended the week on a quiet note Friday after establishing three successive new 1952 high marks.

Volume came to 1,050,000 shares. Steels backed down somewhat on the heels of the Bethlehem Steel report showing a sharp drop in earnings as a result of the long steel strike.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks held unchanged at \$109.20 with the industrial component of the average up 10 cents, the railroads down 20 cents, and the utilities down 10 cents.

Harvest Labor Supply Ample

Unemployment in Oregon is running from 15 to 30 per cent higher than a year ago and no serious shortage of harvest workers is expected for at least another week or two, the State Unemployment Compensation reported Friday.

Claims for compensation filed since the beginning of the 1952-53 benefit year July 1 have reached 14,787 as compared with 12,603 a year ago, while payments to insured workers last month totaled \$469,156, an increase of 31 per cent over the same period in 1951.

Only one area, McMinnville, now has an actual shortage of harvest workers, although Salem, Eugene and other valley offices anticipate heavy demands by mid-August.

It was understood here that the hogs in Marion County had been killed at a federally inspected slaughter house.

Some 620 of the diseased hogs were reported in Multnomah County. A Columbia slough hog feeder owns 500 and the remainder are owned by a South Dakota shipper.
