Buying for Your Home

Here Are Some Tips on Care of Costly Nylons, Launder Often

Stockings are a major budget problem for most women in this country. When nylons were scarce during World War II, they seemed the answer to the stocking problem, but now that they are plentiful many of us fail to realize that we should use more judgment in handling them. Otherwise we cannot get the full value from them.

Two terms should be familiar to every nylon purchaser. "Denier" is your guide to sheerness and 15 is the sheerest, 20 the next and 30 a durable but still attractive sheer. "Gauge" refers to the size of the stitches, 66 being a very small stitched stocking and one that gives good snag resistance, while many stockings

go down to 42 gauge or larger stitches.

When buying stockings check the foot-size chart at your hosiery counter. If the stocking is too long it will snag easier because of the looseness of fit; if too short, your feet will burn and bending and stretching will be uncomfortable. To avoid snagging while putting on your stockings, roll them down to the toes and straighten the foot seam before unrolling on your foot and smoothing the stockings over your legs.

If you sit down when you fasten your nylons you must allow for adequate knee action. Do not fasten a garter on a seam, but on the welt or reinforced part of the stocking.

I have found that stockings last longer if they are laundered as soon as they are removed and hung up to dry. Also, if your chair at the office or in the kitchen is rough, do not be surprised if snags appear frequently in your stockings.

Rosy and Red Tomato Crop Goes Into Oven, or Is Stuffed Raw for Summer Salads

Let's look at tomatoes, that mysterious Love Apple that isn't a romantic enigma anymore at all, but a familiar vegetable very much sought after and extensively grown at home.

Strangely enough, green tomatoes are not used at the first of the season when the ripe ones are not yet available from our own gardens, but rather, after the season is well along and we have become satiated with the ripe ones (if anyone ever does get satiated with tomatoes) and we have to cast about for different uses. The green tomatoes are used when ripening weather is passed and the lady of the house hysterically fears Jack Frost will get a nip at them, forgetting of course, that she has had a good dollar's worth of tomatoes from each 50c a dozen plant and has fed the family with them until they all look slightly red in the face.

But let's look at red tomatoes and let the green ones take care of their own hard little sour selves in the fall.

Looking at Brethren Cookbook from Elgin, Ill., we find that Sister Effie Eugenia Reese of Warrenton, Mo., French fries her tomatoes. She slices firm ripe tomatoes in thick slices, dips them in beaten egg then cracker crumbs and fries in butter.

Sister Luverna Sheets of Mt. Solon, Va., peels solid tomatoes, cuts them in half and dips them in flour. She then fries them on one side, turns them over, adds chopped onion, salt, pepper and some onion and when the other side is fried, puts them in the oven to complete the cooking.

Sister Sarah Miller of Sabatha, Kans., Sister Luanna Smith, South Bend, Ind., and Sister Blanche Lentz of Elgin all stew their tomatoes. Sister Martha E. Lear of Cerro, Ill., is more original; she stuffs hers.

STUFFED TOMATOES
She selects smooth, medium sized tomatoes and cuts off the smooth end carefully. Then she removes the seeds (this she does carefully too, for Sister Martha is a meticulous cook) and she fills the tomatoes with the following dressing: 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 cup ground meat, 1 teaspoon salt and milk to soften. She adds the tomato seeds previously removed from tomatoes and replaces the top piece. She then bakes them in a buttered pan. Onions, she says, may be added if desired.

Sister Maxine Buren of Salem, Ore., likes to serve her stuffed tomatoes as a salad and either uses cucumbers with French dressing as a filler, or tuna and celery, neither of which is new or original but both of which are good. She also has been known to bake tomatoes with a generous amount of tomato catsup and celery and onion inside to make an accompaniment for a roast. This, of course, was in the old days, when roasts were sometimes seen on her table. Since the advent of the more-precious-than gold roast, her tomatoes are usually accompanied by a meat loaf.

Sister Maxine has upon occasion, when all alone with no one to think her barmy, chopped up partially cooked bacon and filled the tomato, then baked the latter and served it (here's the secret) for breakfast—and people say, though we wouldn't want it to come from us, that the old girl eats artichokes and pie for breakfast too. She's a queer old thing, but kind.

Needlecraft Salem Postoffice Records Increase In July Receipts

Postal receipts in Salem climbed during July, barely, to keep up prospects for a million dollar year. Receipts totaled \$68,365, compared to \$67,682 in July, 1951, or a gain of 1 per cent, according to Postmaster Albert C. Gragg. For the first seven months of the year the gain is 12.8 per cent.

An extensive change in rural and mounted service routes was effective Friday, with no serious difficulties encountered. Carriers on the two eliminated rural routes were transferred to mounted delivery—James Newcomb of Route 9 to a south suburban area and Leo Rock of Route 7 to a west suburban area.
