HELSINKI (P)—The United States athletes, their position as the world's best in jeopardy, grabbed 111 points Saturday to hurl back the challenge of the Russians and win the unofficial title of the 1952 Olympics, 610 to 5531/2.

Nothing the Russians can do in Sunday's equestrian events, which will bring an end to competition in these games, can alter the outcome. For 12 days the Soviets, appearing in their first Olympic games, were in the lead. They started Saturday, the second last day, with an edge of 24½ tallies, 523½ to 499.

But the U. S. basketball team won the title 36-25, to cut into the margin, Ford Konno shortened it even further by winning the 1,500 meter swim and then a trio of Uncle Sam's nieces swept the women's platform diving to pass the Rus-
