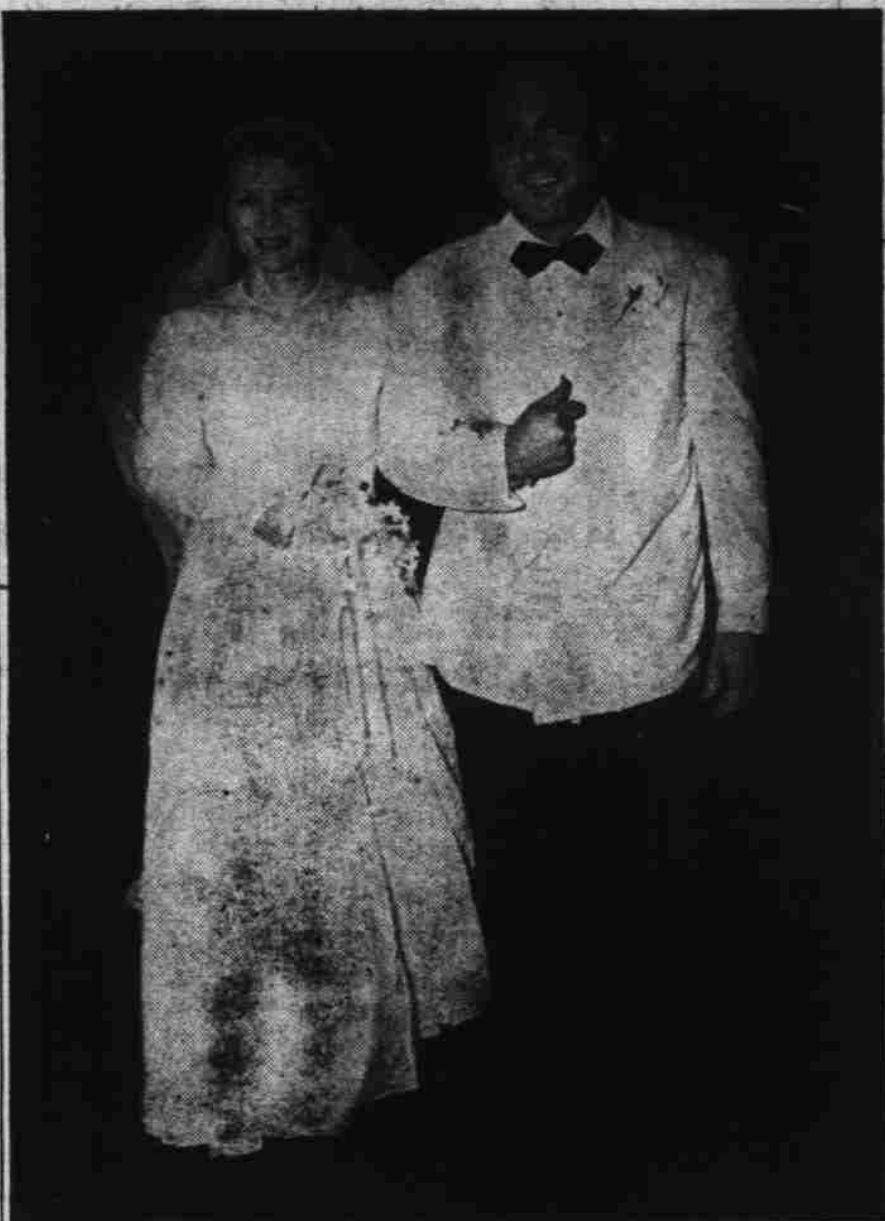
Dr. Byron Woodruff stood with his brother as best man and the usher was Glen Garrett.
