Oregon Grows Hardwood, But Market Slim

CORVALLIS—Oregon forest products do not run to a majority of hardwood, but there is sufficient hardwood here to develop a good market if rules for a standard product were followed in grading and selling. An increased Oregon market has failed to develop because of a general "lack-of-appreciation" attitude.

These statements were made by A. C. Wollin of the U. S. forest products laboratory, Madison, Wis., Monday, after completing his work as advisor for an Oregon hardwood grading study. Jack Pfeiffer of the Oregon forest products laboratory was field director and Clyde Randall assistant for the three-week summer field study.

Alder Major Hardwood
Alder, one of 10 major Oregon hardwoods, and one which grows predominantly west of the Oregon Cascades, was chosen for the initial study. The laboratory plans to make a thorough study of the other nine Oregon hardwoods in the near future.

More than 500 alder logs at the L. R. Smith Hardwood Company, Longview, Wash., and the Veal and Son Furniture Company, Albany, were checked for exterior defects. Overgrown knots, limbs, bark distortions, splits, mechanical injuries and other defects were recorded.

From the information gathered on the field study, Pfeiffer will be able to determine the percentage of various lumber grades that can be expected from specific alder logs.

Oregon Alder Good
In Oregon, alder has been considered an inferior species because the logs have been judged poor by their external appearance. Lumber grades from these logs have compared favorably with lumber obtained from second growth stands of eastern species, Pfeiffer stated.

National Hardwood Lumber Association grading rules are well adapted to Pacific Coast hardwoods used for factory lumber, Wollin explained. About 18,000,000 board feet of alder are cut in Oregon each year, mainly for furniture use.

Lack of rules for a standard product and an irregular source of supply have hindered the hardwood business here.

Long and lumber grading rules would benefit loggers, millmen and consumers in buying and selling. Such a system would insure a uniform product for particular uses, and it would eliminate guesswork in estimating log worth, Wollin said as he prepared to leave for his Wisconsin laboratory.

Students at OSC From 33 Nations

CORVALLIS — Every Oregon county, 36 of the 48 states and 33 foreign countries were represented at Oregon State College last year, according to the registrar's office.

Benton county, as expected, was the Oregon county leader with 1088 students. Multnomah was next with 898; Marion, 288; and Lane, 216. Total Oregon enrollment at OSC was 4373.

Neighboring states supplied the big part of the 794 out-of-state students. From California came 412; Washington, 184; and Idaho, 51. The representation from U. S. territories included 30 students from Alaska, 41 from Hawaii and 2 from Oklahoma.

Countries ranging from Argentina to West Africa were on the foreign list. There were 17 students from Canada; 9 each from India and China; 6 from Japan, Germany and Malaya and 4 from Egypt and Iceland.

The state, national and foreign groups combined to make the total registration of 5,335.

METHOD OF NOSE-COUNTING
PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Two young men working in the Pasadena City Planning Department have discovered that it is no longer necessary to stop and knock on doors to see how many families are living in a certain neighborhood. In their hurry-up survey they've found that counting television antennas, mail boxes and gas meters is a lot quicker and almost as accurate as a door-to-door campaign.

OSC Issues Filbert Moth Control Notice

The second filbert moth control notice has been announced by Dr. B. G. Thompson, entomologist at Oregon State College.

Growers can use the same materials they used for the first spray or dust several weeks ago. One of the following will give satisfactory control if thoroughly applied: A spray containing three pounds lead arsenate plus spreader in 100 gallons water; 40 percent lead arsenate dust at a rate of 40-50 pounds per acre; DDT spray containing two pounds 50 percent wettable DDT to 100 gallons of water; or 5 percent DDT dust applied at the rate of 40-50 pounds per acre.

Dr. Thompson and Dr. P. W. Miller, USDA plant pathologist stationed at OSC, recommend a combination spray or dust for filbert worm and filbert blight control be applied wherever necessary. Use of the combination spray or dust depends upon the amount of bud and twig blight in the orchard.

"The combination spray mixture consists of 6-3-100 Bordeaux plus 3 pounds of lead arsenate in 100 gallons, plus an efficient and compatible spreader-sticker mixed in that order. In preparing this mixture, the Bordeaux should be made up first of 6 pounds of copper sulphate, 3 pounds of hydrated lime, and 100 gallons of water. Then to the Bordeaux, add 3 pounds of lead arsenate per 100 gallons. The addition of an efficient wetting agent such as B 1958 Spreader or Grasselli spreader-sticker, is advised to increase the efficiency of the spray," Dr. Miller explains.

"The combination dust mixture consists of 25% monohydrated copper sulphate, 33.5% hydrated lime, 40% lead arsenate and 1.5% light mineral oil. As an alternate dust, a mixture consisting of 10% yellow cuprous oxide, 40% lead arsenate, 48.5% talc and 1.5% light mineral oil may be used," he adds.

Dr. Miller reminds growers that blight control dusts have reduced the disease under mild conditions. However, it is not known whether a dust program will control filbert blight under epidemic conditions.

Britain Fetes Queen Mother

LONDON (AP)—Royal salutes boomed out from London Tower, Hyde Park and all British naval bases Monday in honor of Queen Mother Elizabeth's 52nd birthday.

Ships of the Royal Navy were gay with flags, and flags fluttered over public buildings throughout the empire.

But little of the demonstration she spent this first birthday of her widowhood quietly at the royal lodge at Windsor. The lodge, smallest of the royal homes, is not far from the chapel at Windsor castle where lie the remains of her husband, King George VI, who died last fall.

With her were her two daughters, Queen Elizabeth II and Princess Margaret, and her grandchildren, Prince Charles and Princess Anne.

B-36 Explodes, Burns in Texas

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—A parked B-36 bomber exploded and burned on the flight line at Carswell Air Force Base Monday during a thunderstorm.

Thirteen men were taken from the blast scene to the base hospital, but only seven were hospitalized. Their injuries were said to be minor.

The Air Force said there were no fatalities.

The big ship was destroyed. The Carswell public information office said the fire started when an auxiliary engine not attached to the B-36 ignited leaking gasoline.

The seven hospitalized men were aboard the ship at the time of the explosion but managed to jump to safety.

Army Rations Ammo Due to Steel Strike

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army announced tight rationing of ammunition Monday, but said troops in Korea will get supplies "to meet any possible increased tempo of enemy attacks."

Troops training for active duty will also be favored, Assistant Army Secretary Karl R. Bendetsen said.

The pinch, Bendetsen indicated, came from the recently concluded steel strike.

He said this had cost the Army about 37 per cent of its scheduled ammunition production for the current year. He said all ammunition larger than .50 calibre would be affected.

Bendetsen's statement said a "strict austerity basis" where ammunition was concerned would apply to training activities of the National Guard, Reserve and ROTC units, in the United States, and to training in Europe and military assistance to the nation's allies.

He indicated ammunition will be parceled out on a Korea-first basis.

Rain Clouds Move Toward Parched Maine

Rain clouds moved toward parched Maine Monday night, but virtually no relief was sighted for the drought-seared Southeast.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Chicago said that fairly generous amounts of rain may fall in northern New England Tuesday from a storm which soaked Michigan and portions of surrounding states.

It dropped 2.25 inches on Milwaukee. There was a possibility that the storm might veer northward and deprive Maine's tinder-dry fields and forests of a badly needed wetting.

Light showers were predicted for Massachusetts, which like Maine has been declared by the government a drought-disaster area. And very light rain was a possibility in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Kentucky and Tennessee, together with parts of Missouri and Arkansas, and all of Georgia, Mississippi, Alabama and South Carolina have also been classed as drought-disaster zones.

The Department of Agriculture has announced a 10-state conference will be held in Atlanta Wednesday and Thursday to plan quick disaster loans for farmers hit by the severe drought.

The heat and lack of rain have hit the corn, tobacco and cotton crops of the Southern states. Losses were estimated in the hundreds of millions.

Chest Group Starts Forming Campaign Plan

Salem Community Chest's labor-management committee Monday started organizing its work in connection with the chest fund campaign which opens next month.

The committee was formed under chairmanship of William E. Kimsey to get information to industry about the chest campaign and the activities of chest-supporting agencies.

The labor-management program is considered especially important to this year's Chest because the house-to-house canvass has been eliminated so emphasis can be placed on giving at the place of employment.

The committee's program includes formation of labor-management committees in plants, encouragement of management support, arrange payroll deduction giving, encourage labor to establish "a fair scale of giving," recommend donations amounting to five hours' pay, with one hour's pay deducted from each of five pay periods.

Fire Disables 1,250 Phones In Pendleton

PENDLETON (AP)—Fire so hot it melted lead in the telephone cables cut 1,250 Pendleton phones out of order Sunday night and repairmen said it would be late Tuesday before all were back in use.

The fire was in the Oregon Motor Service garage. The telephone cables were across the street.

Phone Manager D. A. Short said that crews brought in from as far away as Portland would still have some 650 lines to splice Tuesday.

The interior of the garage was badly burned and a number of cars were scorched. The blaze was thought to have started in the battery department.
