 There isn't a happier group of baseball teen-agers in the land today than Salem's State Champion Capital Post No. 9 American Legion Juniors. And they're confident they'll do some more winning before they call it quits for the 1935 season.

Coach Vince Genna's hustling crew — and you can accept the word — won the state championship Sunday night the hard way. The Salems had lost their first game of the meet and had to come back with four wins in three days in order to gain the coveted title.

That they did by knocking out the pre-tourney favored Portland entry on Friday, The Dalles on Saturday and Eugene twice on Sunday. Eugene had gone into the Sunday finals undefeated and needed only one win over the Genna gang.

Even after losing to the The Dalles the first night, Genna expressed absolute confidence by quoting, "My kids will win it — just wait and see. We've got as good a team as any in the tournament, and we'll outthrust the rest."

The C-P's, the first Salem team ever to win a modern state championship, are sponsored by the Valley Motor Co., which is a right proud organization today. Not even the sponsors figured the Genna team would be much this year, after finishing a strong second in 1931 and losing most of that club via age limit regulations.

The Salems next go to Yakima for northwest regional playoffs with Washington, Idaho, Montana and possibly Hawaii, starting August 17. They don't yet know who they play, but feel as though they're ready for any of 'em.

When the Salems depart for the Yakima games they'll be headed by a solid pitching staff that is made up of Lowell Pearce, two straight times Oregon's "most valuable" in the tournaments, Kenny Pingle, Gary Espe, Danny Feller and Paul Beck, the latter a former Canadian boy whose inspiration has been a big asset on Genna's team.

You'll also not hear any complaints from the team's closest followers on the respective ability of Catcher Wayne Osborn, Infielders Phil Jantz, Chet Schmidt and Tom Pickens and Outfielders Curt Jantz, Mike Campbell, Jerry Gregg and Jerry Waldrop.

U.S. 2nd Team Olympic Victors

Subs and Alternates Major Medal Winners

HELSENKI (AP)—The 1952 Olympics brought America its richest harvest of gold medals, but what would have happened if Uncle Sam's first team had been ready? In the record-shattering games just ended, the U. S. second stringers — lowly subs and alternates — played a dominant role. In track, basketball and boxing particularly — they came through in the clutch to help America rack up 41 gold medals.

The performance of these reserves proved a tribute to the depth and resources of American athletic might.

Topping the list of second-string and surprise victories for the U. S. was that of slender little Lindy Remigio in the 100 meter dash.

America's premier 100 man, Jim Golliday, strained a leg muscle back home and never made the trip. Then the chief American hope on the team, Art Bragg, turned up lame.

Unknown Victor
 When our hopes in the event seemed positively shattered, it was Remigio, who hadn't won a major 100 all spring, who stepped into the breach and scored an upset triumph.

Dick Attlesley, the world record holder in the 110 meter hurdles, also failed to make the team because of a leg injury. Harrison Dillard of Cleveland won the event in the record time of 13.7 seconds.

The world's greatest shot-putter, Jim Fuchs, sprained an ankle and ripped a ligament in his throwing hand several days before the Olympic tests. Parry O'Brien won the title for the U. S. with an Olympic record heave of 57 feet, 1.43 inches.

Favorite Loses Out
 Another world record holder on the U. S. team, discus thrower Fortune Gordien, was not up to form. But America scored on an Olympic record toss of 130 feet, 8.85 inches by Southern California's giant Sim Iness. Gordien was third.

The No. 1 American hope in the broad jump, George Brown of Los Angeles who has done better than 26 feet, fouled out of the finals. Jerome Biffle, Denver's dark horse, won the championship by leaping 24 feet, 3.03 inches.

Another surprise was registered in the javelin which Cy Young of Modesto, Calif., won with a throw of 242 feet, 7.9 inches, also an Olympic record.

Bob McMillen's great race in the 1,500, in which he came in second after running the equivalent of a 4:03 mile, and Horace Ashenfelter's triumph in the steeplechase were performances America had not hoped to achieve.

Kurand Top Man
 Standout player on Uncle Sam's champion basketball team was Bob Kurand, the 27-year-old veteran, whose selection by Coach Warren Womble as an alternate was made largely for sentimental reasons.

Womble, who at first said he didn't plan to bring Kurand, called his work in the Olympic games "terrific."

The two stars of the American boxing team, which swept five titles and took the team championships, were alternates.

Norvel Lee of Washington, D. C., light-heavyweight alternate fighting out of his regular class, was voted the outstanding boxer of the tournament.

Charley Adkins of Gary, Ind., winner of the light welterweight title, gave American supporters their biggest thrill when he batted down the Russian threat, Viktor Mednow, in the only ring face-to-face meeting of the two big nations.

Jim Allen drove Val Barnes home in the fourth to tie the game up at 1-1. Four Corners took the lead when Denny Williams was sent home on a fielder's choice hit by Billy Lange.

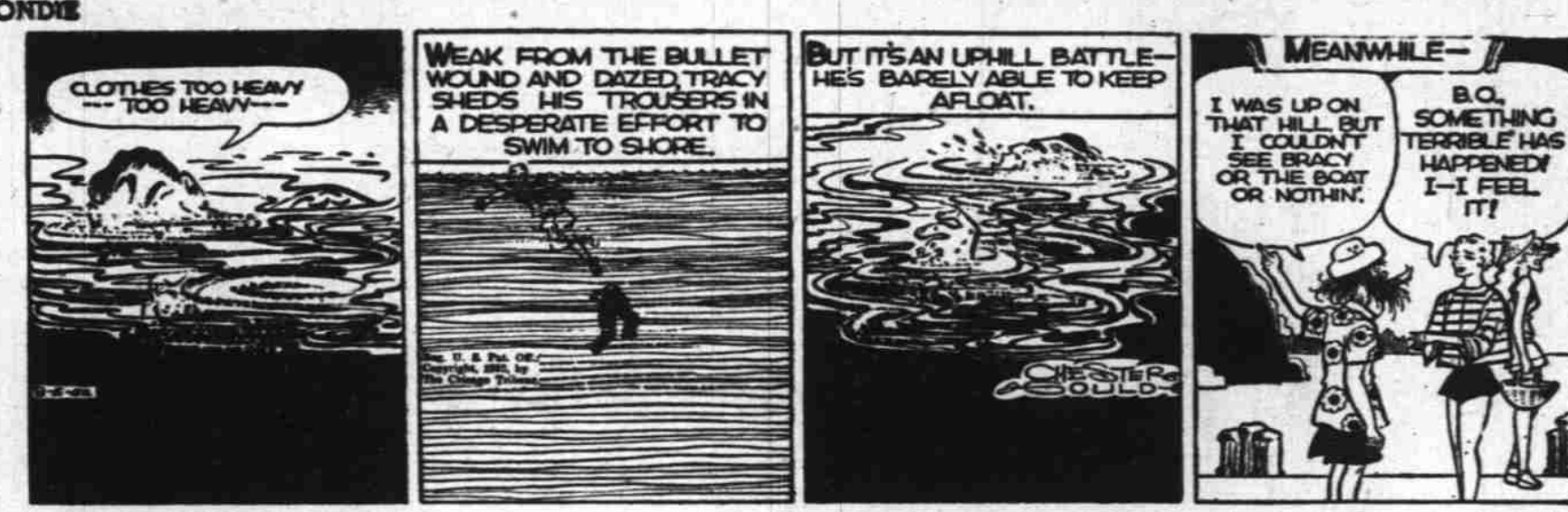
