Man Wanted in Suicide Fraud Case Gives Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—One of two men accused of faking a "suicide" drama as a publicity stunt surrendered to police Tuesday. But he still denied that he offered a young mother \$500 to pretend she was going to leap from the sixth floor ledge of a Washington building last Thursday.

Roland Bennett, 27, posted a \$300 bond to insure his appearance in municipal court Wednesday. He and Maynard H. (Snuffy) Smith, 41, a congressional Medal of Honor winner, are charged with making false reports to police and firemen—an offense punishable by a \$300 fine or 10 days in jail.

Smith crawled out on the ledge, seized the young woman and pulled her back inside the building while firemen spread nets and crowds gaped on the street six stories below.

It looked like another act of heroism until Mrs. Ernestine Lucille Whombe, 21, told the authorities that Bennett and Smith got her to pull the stunt to further Smith's political ambitions. She said he wanted to be governor of Virginia.

Union Dispute Closes Mill

PORTLAND (AP)—The Inman Poulsen Lumber Company mill here shut down Tuesday because of a union squabble. About 270 members of the CIO Woodworkers Union met during the lunch hour to discuss their health and welfare program.

When the discussion continued past the lunch hour, company officials closed the mill for the day and let the workers continue their discussion in the lunch room.

A spokesman said some union members were dissatisfied with the union's health and welfare program, financed by deductions from paychecks.

Father Slain by Boy as Result Of Argument

BELLINGHAM (AP)—A youth who said he and his father "haven't got along for a long time" confessed that he shot and killed the father early Tuesday.

The boy, Paul Gorne, 16, signed a statement admitting he killed Emil Gorne, 46, in the Gorne home on the Mt. Baker Highway. Paul was arrested and bound over to the Whatcom County Superior Court. No charges have been filed.

The youth's confession said his father had lectured him and used swear words Monday night when the father had difficulty finding some tools.

"I made up my mind then that I would kill him," the statement read. "I have thought about it before at different times. We haven't got along for a long time."

"About 6 a.m. this morning my mother was out in the barn, getting the cows in to milk. My father was in bed. I got up and got the 30-30 rifle which was in my bedroom. Went to his bedroom, took aim at his head and fired. "I knew I had killed him. I then went outdoors and told mother. Then I went and told my uncle. I asked him to come over to our house which he did. And he called the sheriff and I waited for the sheriff to come."

The youth's uncle is Don W. Ginter who lived near the Gorne farm.

Services for Crash Victim Set Thursday

Funeral services for Anne Louise Woodmansee, 18, who was killed in a highway accident Monday afternoon on 99E north of Albany, will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday in St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

The Rev. George Swift will officiate and interment will be in Belcrest Memorial Park.

The youth she was riding with, Jack R. Wikoff, also 18, was reported in improved condition at Salem Memorial Hospital, where he was taken suffering from severe shock and cuts and bruises about the face.

The two 1952 graduates of Salem High School were en route for a swim in Colorado Lake near Corvallis when their car struck loose gravel at the edge of the highway and overturned down an embankment.

Sweden Renews Protests to Russia

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Sweden fired two more strong protests at Russia Tuesday and said she would send to the United Nations a full account of her quarrel with the Soviets over the shooting down of two unarmed Swedish planes last June.

Swedish Foreign Minister Olof Udden summoned the Soviet Ambassador, Rear Adm. Constantine Rodionov, and handed him two notes, one of which asked Moscow to order its diplomats here to stop spying on Swedish military establishments.

Fatal Accidents to Approach Record High

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Board of Health said Tuesday Oregon may have more fatal accidents this year than in 1951. The board predicted that more than 1,200 persons will die from accidents this year if the present rate continues. Last year there were 1,234 fatal accidents in the state.

Sailor Dies in Newberg Crash

NEWBERG, Ore. (AP)—One merchant seaman was fatally injured and another was in a critical condition in a hospital as a result of an auto crash near here Monday.

Dan A. Griffin, 41, Seattle, died in a hospital Monday night. His companion, Stacy Bryant Jackson, 28, was treated for critical injuries.

The rented car bearing Washington license plates, which Griffin was driving, went out of control on a curve on Highway 99W and slammed into a bridge support.

Relatives of both men were being sought. Griffin's mother was believed to live in Portland. Jackson's home had not been determined.

Like Asks Earnings Protected From High Prices, High Taxes

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower declared Tuesday night that the earnings of the people must be protected from "a double toll of high prices and high taxes."

In a speech billed in advance as non-political, Eisenhower also touched on the civil rights issue with a pledge to make "America's promise of equality a living fact for every American."

Addressing the annual encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Los Angeles, Eisenhower set forth a 10-point program aimed at lasting peace, honesty in government and loyalty in federal service.

The objective, he said, is "to build a prosperity not based on war."

Seek to Woo South

Behind the scenes in both political camps, tense jockeying went forward as Stevenson and Eisenhower forces sought to woo the traditionally Democratic "Solid South" without offending advocates of civil rights legislation.

Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, the Democratic presidential nominee, conferred for 90 minutes with Mississippi's Gov. Hugh White and White later told newsmen he was sure Stevenson would "satisfy the South" wherever he appears in the forthcoming campaign.

Refuses Comment

White refused to say, however, whether he thought Stevenson would get the support of Virginia, South Carolina and Louisiana. He said there was some sentiment against Stevenson in Mississippi but not "too strong."

White indicated he was satisfied that Stevenson would take a "moderate" stand on civil rights. He said Stevenson is "all right" on FEPC — creation of a Federal Fair Employment Practices Commission — if Stevenson's views have been published correctly.

Stevenson has said he thinks the states should handle the problem of job discrimination, with the federal government stepping in only if the states fail to handle the job.

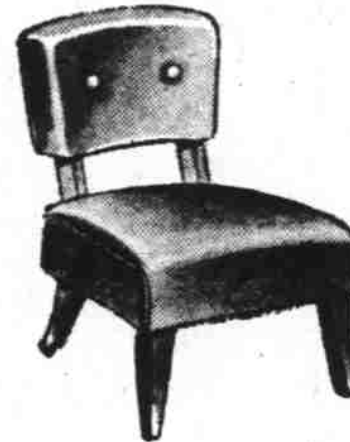
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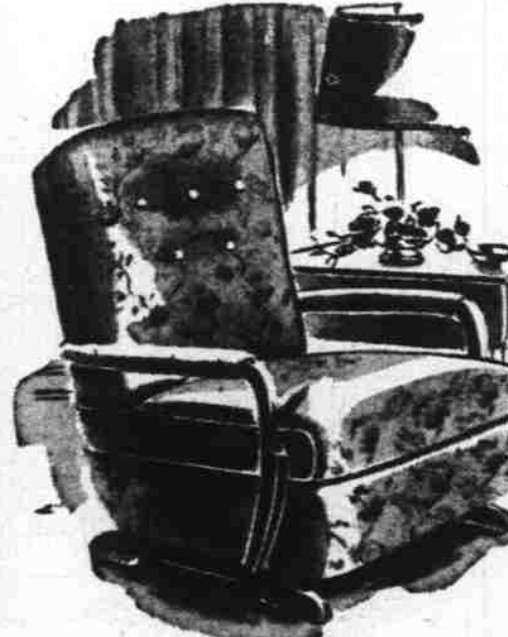
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
