Ike Denounces Bigotry Appeal In Campaigns

DENVER (P)—Gen Dwight D. Eisenhower Thursday denounced appeals to prejudice and bigotry in political campaigns. He said "those are the tactics of the Communists."

The Republican presidential nominee made the statement in expressing wholehearted approval of a resolution calling on all GOP candidates for public office to:

1. Reject political arguments and appeals based on religious or racial prejudices.

2. Censure attempts "to subvert the American tradition" through such appeals.

The resolution was adopted by the Minnesota GOP State Executive Committee, which also urged Eisenhower to endorse it. A copy of the resolution was presented to the general Thursday by Mrs. Elizabeth Heffelfinger, Republican national committeewoman from Minnesota.

After conferring with Eisenhower, Mrs. Heffelfinger told reporters her state has been "flooded" with anti-Semitic literature attacking both Eisenhower and President Truman. She called it un-American.

Mrs. Heffelfinger also said she told Eisenhower he will have to speak out on farm problems during the campaign if he wants to carry the farm belt states in the November election.

The general replied, she added, that he intends to devote much attention to such problems, and to discuss them with the farmers. Meanwhile, Eisenhower conferred with two Republican leaders who supported Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio for the presidential nomination.

Gov. Len B. Jordan of Idaho and George T. Hansen, the party's national committeeman from Utah, both told reporters they had pledged support to Eisenhower. Jordan said he discussed development of natural resources with Eisenhower, and that they agreed that "while there must be more or less decentralization" in development of such projects, "the states must sit in as equal partners with the federal government in the planning of projects."

Myers, Kirwan Considered for Demo Position

WASHINGTON (P)—Former Sen. Francis J. Myers of Pennsylvania and Rep. Michael Kirwan of Ohio were under consideration Wednesday night for appointment as chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, the Democratic presidential nominee, was reported ready to replace National Chairman Frank E. McKinney. McKinney was asked to stay on temporarily by Stevenson after the latter's nomination at the party convention in Chicago last month.

Stevenson was reported to be leaning toward Myers as McKinney's successor. But the Illinois governor also was said to be considering Kirwan, chairman of the Democratic House Campaign Committee, for the post.

Myers served as floor manager for the "Draft Stevenson" movement in the convention before Stevenson himself would admit he was available for the nomination.

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Unemployment Rises Slightly

More unemployment was noted August 1 than since late in May, due largely to cannery layoffs, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported Thursday.

The number of persons actually seeking work climbed from 17,078 two months ago to 18,236 last week, the largest summer increase since the end of the war. A year ago 13,233 jobseekers were reported.

Benefits paid cannery workers advanced sharply in recent weeks. Only 383 employees of food processing plants received checks early in July but 1,342 were listed last week—nearly a fourth of all claimants.

Drivers License Suspensions Rise

Traffic violation convictions in Oregon decreased slightly in July, but driver license suspensions increased, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Thursday.

Drivers were convicted of 2,983 traffic violations as compared with 3,941 in June and 3,689 in July of last year.

Suspensions during the month increased with 455 drivers losing their licenses. A total of 227 of these suspensions were ordered following drunk driving convictions.

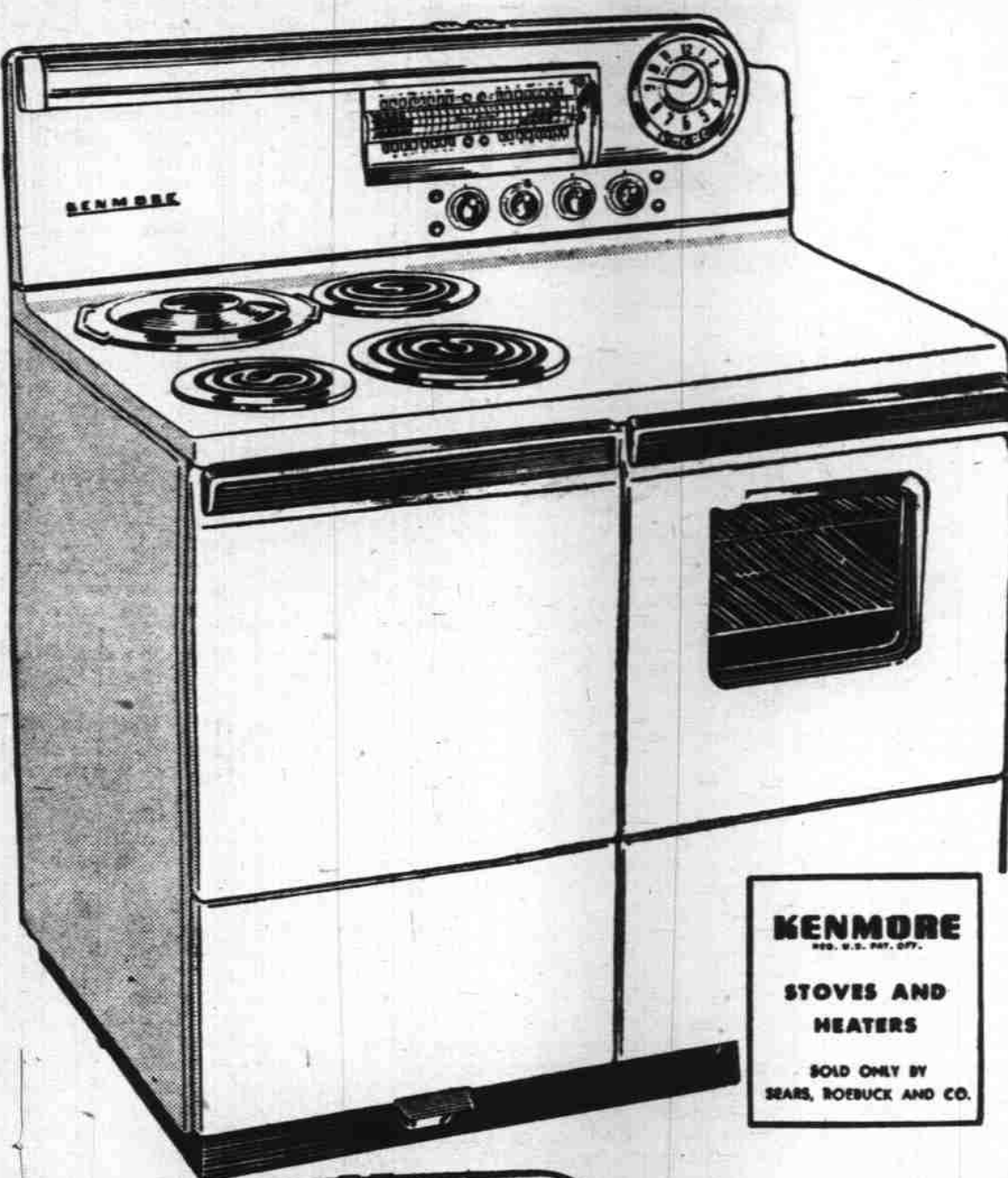
TEETOTALER AT BREWERY
