

Quarantine on Marion County Hogs Removed

The U. S. Department of Agriculture Friday lifted the hog quarantine in Marion County, according to press dispatches from Washington, D.C.

Socialist Party Leader Here For Assembly

The candidate, who served three terms in the Pennsylvania legislature during the early thirties, said our present foreign policy is a mockery and "the people of the United States have been sold a bill of goods by politicians here at home, too."

Late Returns Give Gore Wide Margin

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (P)—Late returns from scattered precincts Friday rolled up a wider margin of defeat for veteran Sen. K. D. McKellar in Thursday's Tennessee Democratic senatorial primary.

With unofficial returns complete from all but a few of the state's 2,300-odd precincts, hard-hitting Rep. Albert Gore had a lead of more than 75,000 votes over the 83-year-old dean of the U. S. Senate. McKellar was seeking an unprecedented seventh term.

The tabulation of ballots from 2,273 precincts gave Gore 301,346 votes and McKellar 222,929. McKellar's defeat was only a part of the political upheaval that swept Tennessee.

The Democratic voters rudely ended the four-year reign of Gordon Browning as governor of Tennessee.

Another young man, Frank G. Clement, 32, swept to victory over Browning, who was seeking his third straight two-year term. Clement's victory brought E. H. Crump, Memphis political leader, back into the picture as a potent factor in state-wide Tennessee politics.

At the same time, quarantine was placed on Marion County, it was placed on Multnomah County, on all of California and parts of 14 other states in the midwest. Multnomah's quarantine was brought about also by two lots of infected hogs being received. One of these has been disposed of and the other is held under "lock and key" in North Portland for disposal. The premises where these hogs are now kept will have to be completely depopulated from any swine, and the premises cleaned up completely before the quarantine order will be lifted from Multnomah, Peterson explained Friday.

"There is no reason for getting unduly excited about this situation," the director went on. "It is being taken care of promptly. There has been no outbreak of the disease in any of our Oregon herds. The infected lots have come from the Dakotas, from Omaha and from St. Joseph, Mo."

In the meantime, Peterson ordered a 30-day emergency quarantine on hog shipments into the state. This will ban shipments of hogs into Oregon from all areas under federal quarantine so that there will be no further outbreak of the swine disease in this state.

While many midwestern hog-producing districts are under federal quarantine, the federal regulations permit marketing of hogs from quarantined areas if they go through "clean" stockyards, Peterson said. It is for this reason that Oregon has placed her own emergency quarantine on hogs from quarantined areas.

The only hogs which are being permitted to be brought into the state during the ban will be those from clean areas and only for immediate slaughter. It will mean, the director added, that no swine will be brought in for exhibit at the state fair, but this should have no effect on the exhibiting of swine growers within the state.

"We just aren't taking any chances," the director continued. "At the moment there is no reason to restrict exhibiting of Oregon swine at any of our fairs. We have no reports of any infected swine in any state herds. We want to keep it that way if possible."

Peterson did not expect the quarantine to curtail the state's pork supply. There are many areas in the midwest which are free of the disease and these will supply Oregon, he said.

"The public should understand," Peterson continued, "that our objection to the use for human consumption of pork effected by this disease, is purely aesthetic. And while that is very important to all of us, the meat is still perfectly safe to use for food. However, we advise the public that every precaution is being taken and we feel quite certain that the matter is now under control for the time being."

Vesicular exanthema of swine is not a new disease. It was first brought to the attention of the public through the 12th International Veterinary Congress, 18 years ago this month, following an outbreak of it in garbage-fed swine in Southern California.

While it has been referred to as a "relative" of the foot and mouth disease, veterinarians said Friday it was quite a "distant relative," not nearly so severe and as a rule spread much more slowly.

The quick action of Governor Douglas McKay and of the state director of agriculture, veterinarians believed had saved Oregon from a serious outbreak.

'China Lobby' General Gets New Position

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Chinese Embassy announced Friday that Brig Gen. Peter T. K. Pee, named by Sen. Morse (R-Ore) in his "China Lobby" charges, is being replaced as military attaché. The change was described as routine. Military attaches usually serve for two years, an Embassy spokesman said, whereas Pee has served for four.

Pee's successor, according to word from the Nationalist government on Formosa, will be Maj. Gen. Sin-Ju Pu Hsiao. Hsiao served in Washington as assistant military attaché before the last war.

Sen. Morse had published in the Congressional Record last April 10 a series of 23 cablegrams which he said had been sent in 1946 and 1949 from Washington to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek. He charged they provided evidence of efforts to influence American officials in favor of the Nationalists.

Fluoridation Opponents Hit By Speaker

Opponents to fluoridation have been misquoting statistics to mislead the public, the Marion County Health Council was told Friday by Dr. David M. Witter, DDS, and director of the dental health section of the Oregon State Board of Health.

Dr. Witter, in his address before the monthly luncheon meeting of the Council at the Senator Hotel, presented colored slides showing degrees of fluorosis caused by extreme concentrations of fluoride. "Such concentrations would be impossible under artificial conditions," he said. Normal use in water supplies is one part fluoride to every million parts of water.

He pointed out that Oregon ranks the fifth worst state in the nation for dental decay and "fluoridation has been proved to help such a condition," he continued.

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Drouth Relief Seen for Two More States

Government forecasters said the week end should bring relief to tinder dry Arkansas and Missouri, ending the widespread drought there. Earlier relief reached much of the 10-state disaster area.

Hard hit Kentucky and Tennessee continued critically dry, with mounting damage to pasture, tobacco and truck crops. Farmers reassessed drought damage in the Southeast as generous rains continued to fall in the Southeast and New England.

Some estimates had put potential crop damage from the dry, hot weather as high as one billion dollars.

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Nerve Gases Described in Medical Story

LONDON (P)—Britain's Supply Ministry Friday described new "nerve gases" which can strike without warning and kill within seconds.

Its article, published in two principle medical publications—Lancet and the British Medical Journal—did not say who has the new gases. Neither did it say whether they are practical for modern warfare.

"These gases are rapidly absorbed by inhalation of the vapor, absorption of the liquid through the skin and mucous membrane, or by ingestion consumption of contaminated food and water," the article said.

"A drop of the liquid in the eye or the inhalation of a high concentration of the vapor for a few seconds may cause incapacity or death within a few seconds."

The article was prepared at the request of Britain's Chemical Defence Advisory Board by Sir Harry Garner, chief scientist of the Supply Ministry. Garner said non-medical personnel can provide first aid treatment for victims of the gas, including an injection of atropine and artificial respiration. A standard gas mask will provide protection against inhaling the gases, he added.

Profit Taking Balances Off Stock Prices

NEW YORK (P)—Week-end profit-taking coupled with highly selective buying and selling turned the stock market Friday into a fairly evenly balanced jumble of gains and losses.

Railroads started out leading the market into higher ground, but they were unable to keep up their strength. In the home stretch the carriers as a group went to pieces.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks lost 10 cents at \$109.70 with the industrial component unchanged.

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Post Changes Now Certainty

WASHINGTON (P)—A major shakeup in high Senate posts is certain next January, no matter which party has control of the chamber.

If the Republicans get control, all committee chairmanships will pass from Democratic to Republican hands.

The defeat of 83-year-old Sen. Kenneth D. McKellar in Tennessee's Democratic primary Thursday by Rep. Albert Gore will cause the biggest shift in Democratic plums within the Senate for many years.

McKellar was chairman of the potent Appropriations Committee, which controls the nation's purse-strings, president pro tempore of the Senate, and top-ranking Democrat of other Senate committees and congressional commissions.

The death of Sen. Brien McMahon (D-Conn.) has vacated the chairmanship of the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee as well as places on the Foreign Relations and Commerce Committees.

The decision of veteran Sen. Tom Connally (D-Tex.) not to seek re-election will leave vacant chairmanship of the influential Foreign Relations Committee and seats on the tax-writing Finance Committee and Atomic Committee.
