

Liberty Street Truck Ban Proposal Revised

A compromise measure of banning objectionable truck traffic from South Liberty Street is in the mill, Mayor Alfred W. Loucks reported to the City Council and the affected citizens Monday night.

The Council at a meeting in City Hall introduced a bill to ban truck traffic on South Liberty, but this is subject to amendment at the next meeting Aug. 25 so that some local truck traffic is permitted.

Burglar Makes Tour of Salem Office Buildings

Pry marks were found on several office doors Monday by Salem businessmen and two offices reported a total of \$120 stolen sometime over the weekend by a prowler making the rounds of several downtown office buildings.

Entrance was gained to the law offices of John Lee, attorney, and Merrill D. Olson, insurance, and \$36 taken from a desk drawer. Approximately \$84 was taken from the law offices of Lawrence and Kenneth Brown in the Masonic Building by intruders who forced the front door with a bar large enough to trip the latch.

The door of the Marion County Health Department yielded to pressure by prowlers but nothing was discovered missing. Several drawers were said rifled.

In the Pacific Building the office of the Catholic Charities was entered. Nothing was reported missing. Also pry marks were discovered on the door to Painless Parker, dentist, 125 N. Liberty St. Entrance was not gained.

Police reports indicated that the pry marks on all the doors were made by the same instrument.

Anthony Eden To Wed Niece Of Churchill

LONDON (AP)—Britain's urban foreign secretary, Anthony Eden, will be married soon to a niece of Prime Minister Winston Churchill, Clarissa Spencer-Churchill, a vivacious blonde with periwinkle blue eyes, it was officially announced Monday.

He is 55, she is 32. He was married once before, to Beatrice Helen Beckett, whom he divorced in 1950 on grounds of desertion. The former Mrs. Eden now lives in New York.

Colleagues of the foreign secretary expect the marriage will take place "in a matter of weeks."

Miss Clarissa Spencer-Churchill was the daughter of the late Maj. John Spencer-Churchill, who died in 1947.

The prime minister and Mrs. Churchill have taken a warm personal interest in their orphaned niece, and she was their guest last week-end at Chartwell, the Churchill country home.

Miss Spencer-Churchill was hailed in London society as 1938 as the most beautiful debutant of the year.

Millions regard Eden as the embodiment of the more charming attributes of the ideal English gentleman.

Eden has two sons by his first marriage. The elder, Simon, was lost in Burma in 1945. He was navigator of a bombing plane which failed to return from a mission. His younger son, Nicholas, is an aide to the Governor General of Canada, Vincent Massey.

Wreck Blocks Bridge Traffic

Automobile traffic traveling both east and west was blocked for almost 40 minutes Monday night when an auto accident on the Center Street bridge over the Willamette River blocked passage.

One car, driven by Jesse Woodrow Schreiner of Salem Route 1, Box 506-A, skidded and crashed into the side of the bridge. The car stopped at the top of the bridge at right angles to the lane of traffic and had to eventually be towed away. Another car, driven by R. H. Stone, 1483 N. Summer St., and stopped for a passing train, received minor damage to a rear fender.

Wooden sheeting along the bridge prevented damage to the bridge guard rail, but lights on the bridge were extinguished apparently from a severed electric line.

Earl T. Hay Rites Today

SILVERTON—Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. for Earl Thomas Hay, 44, who died Saturday at the Portland veterans' hospital. Burial will be in the Silverton cemetery with services at the Ekman Funeral home.

Hay was born at Seio, July 30, 1908. He was the son of the late James Henry and Kate L. Hay, and had lived in Silverton for 39 years.

He was the last member of triplet brothers, Verle, who died in Silverton in 1925, and Merle in Aberdeen, Wash., in 1947.

Survivors are the widow, Lillian, brothers and sisters including David, Hay, Salem; George Hay and Alice Young both of Grants Pass; Grace Beck of Tokeland, Wash.; Frances Richards and Hilda Martin of Silverton.

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Protection Money Not Eligible for Tax Deductions

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U. S. Tax Court had Monday you cannot deduct protection money from your income tax, even if the payments are made in a cozy, semi-official arrangement with a city.

The court made the ruling in the case of Charles A. Clark, of Tracy, Calif.

Clark told the court he used to have an arrangement with the City of Tracy under which he was allowed to operate illegal slot machines in his cafe and in other places in the city, so long as he paid the city \$25 a month for each machine.

Ping Pong Ball Raft Carries 4 Men, Woman

LYONS, France (AP)—Four men and a girl—three of them Americans and two Britons—set off Monday on the first leg of a voyage of adventure aboard a Robinson Crusoe-like raft floated by 75,000 ping pong balls.

The raft—called the "Ken-Tooiki"—will float down the Rhone to Marseilles, and then drift through the Mediterranean.

The four men and woman have no more specific goal than to study their own reactions while at sea. Unlike the epic Pacific voyage of the "Kon-Tiki," piloted by daring Sandinians, it seeks to prove no anthropological point such as the migration of humans from one continent to another.

The ping pong balls fill the metal barrels which float the square adventure craft. A cabin provides the only shelter.

The expedition is headed by 27-year-old Richard Miller of Chicago. His companions are slim, brunette Murial Grand, 20, of Hull, England; Philadelphia-born Don Kindler, 26, of Jessup, Md.; Spanish-born Jose De Tajada, 29, of Princeton University, and Michael Jones, a former RAF pilot from London.

Miller met Jones in a left-bank bar and talked him into the voyage. The other volunteers followed.

The cargo: English books, camera, a guitar, several decks of cards, two barrels of water and a typewriter.

Drunk Driving Case Results In Fine, Jail

SILVERTON—James Vessel, giving his address as Brooks, P. O. Box 23, was fined \$1,000 and 10 days in jail Monday morning in Justice Court at Silverton when he was charged with drunk driving. He pleaded guilty to the charge. Two other charges were filed against Vessel also, one driving without an operator's license, for which he was charged \$50 and 10 days, and running through stop signs, which cost him \$25 and 10 days.

Arrest was made by Al Shannon, Silverton police, who gave chase from Silverton to Chemawa before Vessel was apprehended.

Alf O. Nelson, justice of the peace, also fined Betrom Harrison Ramsey, P. O. Box 7, Marquam, \$100 and a 10-day jail sentence on a hit and run charge.

Vernon Wolfard of Scotts Mills began serving a 60-day jail sentence which had been suspended some months ago on condition he obey all laws for a period of two years. Since then, Judge Nelson stated, he has been up on a number of counts, including trespassing and larceny, the charge which caught him originally.

"We try to give a man every break," Judge Nelson commented, "but when he continues to disobey laws and he has a suspended jail sentence hanging over him, we will make him serve it. Too much leniency does neither the victim nor the town any good."

Woman Dies After Beating

PENDLETON (AP)—The district attorney's office Monday investigated the death of Mrs. Ellen Downs, 35, who died in an ambulance en route to a hospital Sunday.

John Victor Montour, 46, Pendleton cook who had been keeping company with Mrs. Downs, was held for questioning. District Attorney George H. Corey said he was awaiting the outcome of an autopsy.

Assistant District Attorney Rex Hardy said Mrs. Downs apparently died as a result of a beating. She was found at her home after a neighbor called police.

117-DEGREE HEAT MEXICO CITY

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The Defense Ministry reported Monday 30 persons have died in the last five days during a 117-degree heat wave in Mexico, on the U. S. Mexican border.

Stevenson, Truman to Confer Today

WASHINGTON (AP)—Harry S. Truman and Adlai E. Stevenson meet Tuesday for Democratic strategy talks that may consign the president to a secondary role in the 1952 political campaign.

Stevenson, the Illinois governor and Democratic presidential nominee, flies in from his Springfield, Ill., headquarters for:

1. A White House briefing on the "international and defense situation." Around the table with him will be the President; Gen. Omar N. Bradley, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, Director of the Central Intelligence Agency; Secretary of State Acheson; Mutual Security Director Averell Harriman; Dr. John R. Steelman, Acting Director of Defense Mobilization; and Chairman Jack Gorrie of the National Security Resources Board.

2. A luncheon with the President and cabinet in the state dining room at the White House. Harriman, Steelman, and Sen. John J. Sparkman of Alabama, Stevenson's vice-presidential running mate, will be there, too.

3. A private talk with Truman.

From these huddles may come a decision on whether Congress should be called into special session to tackle the issue of soaring prices. From them also is expected to emerge an understanding, whether or not it is to be announced publicly, as to just what parts the retiring chief executive and the man who hopes to succeed him will take in the political wars.

New Hampshire is the 11th entire state to be put on the disaster area list and the third in New England.

Seven counties in Southern Illinois were put on the disaster list. Twenty Oklahoma counties were designated.

Firemen Fail To Gain Spot on Portland Ballot

PORTLAND (AP)—Firemen lost a move Monday to get a charter amendment on the ballot to allow them to bargain collectively on their wages and working conditions and to go to arbitration on disagreements.

The City Council voted 4-1 against the proposal. Mayor Dorothy McCullough Let cast the only vote for it. Commissioners William Bowes and N. A. Boody spoke against it.

Bowes said that if passed, "through the ignorance of the voters of all ramifications of city finances, it would put a hangman's noose around the City Council."

Boody said he was in favor of collective bargaining in private industry—he left a business executive position to accept appointment to the council this year—but pointed out that governments have virtually no flexibility in meeting added money demands.

Bank Robber Shot to Death

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—A convicted bank robber was shot to death in a gun battle on Lewiston's main street early Monday as he attempted to escape a police trap.

Turner Hudson, 43, was struck in the eye and killed as he exchanged fire with Police Officer Edward Lucas. A man with Hudson slipped away in the darkness.

Police were called after prowlers were reported near a used car lot. Police Chief Robert Flood said Officer Lucas fired after a shot from Hudson struck the sidewalk in front of him. Police found a set of burglar tools, Flood said. The police chief said Hudson had been convicted of robbing a Los Angeles bank.

Loyola Coach Yale Possible

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Times says that Jordan Olivar, former grid coach at Loyola University here, has been appointed head football coach at Yale University, succeeding Herman Hickman, who resigned Monday to enter private business.

Yale made Olivar an assistant coach March 19.

He was said by the hospital Monday night to be in a "good" condition. Driver of the other car, Marjorie Mae Francis of Salem, Route 4, Box 634, was uninjured.

No citations were made by state police.

Judge Refuses To Send Ex-GI To Italy Trial

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—A federal judge refused to order an ex-GI back to Italy to face a murder charge in the slaying of a wartime cloak and dagger major.

District Judge John Knight refused Italy's request for extradition of Carl G. Lo Dolce on the ground that Italy was not in control of the place where the crime was committed.

A short time later, an attorney representing the Italian government indicated he expected Italy to drop the case. "I don't believe the Italian government will want to take any further steps," Francis Di Bartolo told newsmen.

Lo Dolce, a 30-year-old former Army sergeant from Rochester, was accused of shooting Maj. William V. Holohan during a secret OSS mission in Northern Italy in December, 1944.

Judge Knight held that the treaty of 1868 providing for extradition was not effective inasmuch as the place where the crime was committed was occupied then by German armies.

Also accused in the slaying was former Lt. Aldo Icardi of Pittsburgh, a third OSS man on the mission. Italy has made no move to extradite Icardi since a move in federal court in Pittsburgh was dismissed in April.

State Cannot Hold Stock for Scholarships

The state board of higher education must dispose of \$50,000 holdings now in its possession, according to ruling made Monday by Attorney General George Neuner.

Many donors of scholarships have deeded stock to the state, the income from which was to finance student fees.

Neuner advised that donors or their trustees sell the stock and invest the money in types of securities which the board is permitted to hold.

Neuner stated that a state agency, under the Oregon constitution, cannot subscribe to or be interested in the stock of any company, association or corporation.

The ruling came on request of H. A. Bork, controller of the board, who said that dividends from the stocks go for scholarships and awards for hospitalization of needy children in the Doernbecher Memorial Hospital of the University of Oregon Medical School.

EUGENE (AP)—Oregon's state system of higher education, told Monday by the attorney general it would have to get rid of stocks given to it as security for scholarships, has only a small amount on hand.

Total value was estimated by University of Oregon officials at around \$50,000. That is about 5 per cent of the entire endowment fund.

The stocks held by the education system are all well known, such as AT&T, Standard of Indiana and soundly established insurance firms.

Temperature High In Dallas, Texas

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—It was the 10th consecutive day of 100-degree or higher temperatures here Monday. That's only one day short of the all-time record set last summer when it got that hot for 11 straight days. Five persons have collapsed from heat strokes the past three days and one died Sunday.

Rail Unions Oppose Truck Tax Change

The Legislative League of the Railroad Unions announced its opposition Monday to the trucking industry's proposal to abolish the weight-mile tax voted by the legislature. The measure will be on the November ballot.

The chairman of the Oregon League, W. C. Hefner, said railroad men were joining the lumber industry in protesting the plan which would "shift an estimated six million dollars annually onto Oregon's private automobiles and local trucks."
