can get the ball over the plate and if Francis can perform regularly as he did Sunday night, things may turn out well for the Senators in the next eight outings.

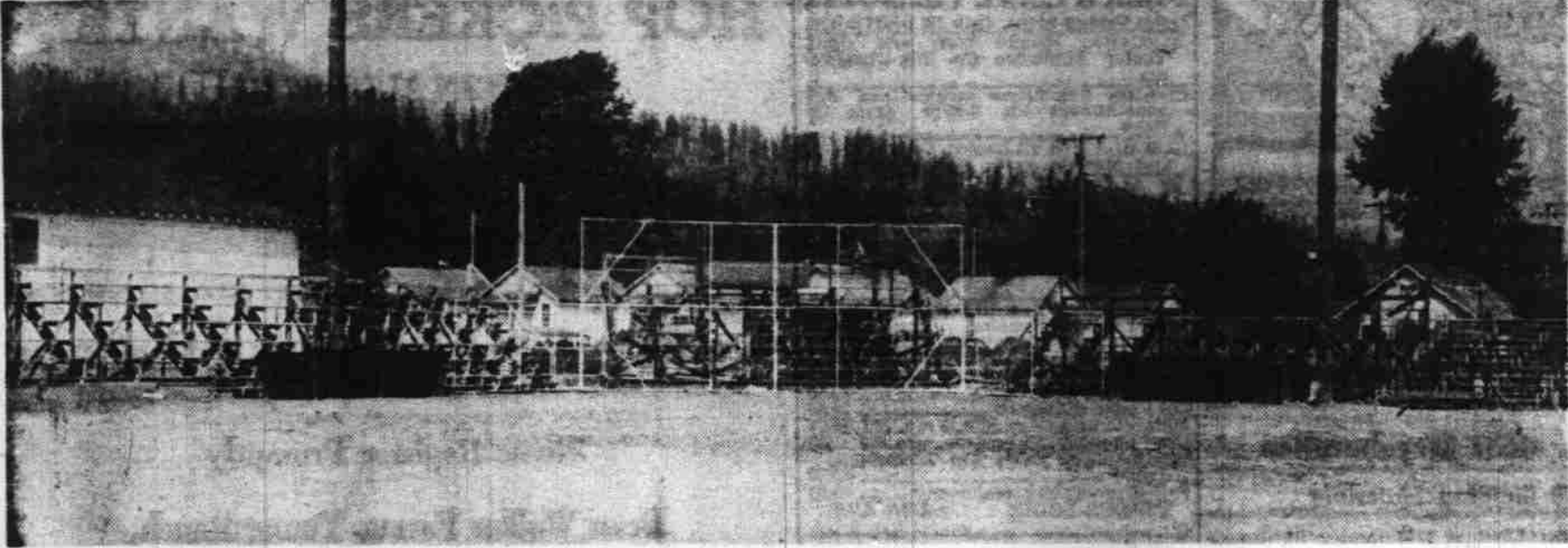

Musial, Fain Lead Batters

NEW YORK (P)—With the 1952 season two-thirds gone, Philadelphia's Ferris Fain and Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals are well on the way to a repeat performance as major league batting champions.

If they can keep up the pace, it will mean three straight National League titles for Stan the man and two in a row for Fain in the American League.

Fain picked up one point last week to .346 and leads Gene Woodling, New York outfielder, by 21 points. Woodling, who moved up from the fourth slot, showed a gain of six points to .325 with a 7-for-16 effort. Averages include Sunday's games.

Musial, at .325, holds a 17-point advantage over his closest pursuers, first baseman Whitey Lockman of New York and Cincinnati's Ted Kluszewski, each with .308 marks.

Stan collected only eight hits in 35 times at bat last week and lost nine points. Both Lockman and Kluszewski also lost ground. Whitey, fifth last week, had six hits in 22 tries for a two point deficit while Kluszewski jumped two notches from fourth although he dropped three points with a 7-for-26 showing.

George Kell, the 1949 American League batting king, is third on the current list. The Red Sox third baseman tacked one point onto his average with five safeties in 14 trips and stands at the .324 mark.

Larry Doby of Cleveland, with 26 home runs and 83 runs batted in, is the American League leader in those departments.

Hank Sauer of the Chicago Cubs continues to lead the National League in home runs with 28 and in runs batted in with 92.

Vic Raschi, burly New York Yankee right-hander, is the American League's leading hurler with a 13-2 record while Brooklyn's Preacher Roe is the top National League pitcher with eight victories and only one setback.

Olympic Group Returns to NY

NEW YORK (P)—Another plane load of American Olympic athletes, including gold medal winners in track and field, checked in at Idlewild Airport Monday and the biggest kisses were reserved for little Lindy Remigino.

As Remigino, surprise victor of the 100-meter dash at Helsinki, stepped from the customs room, he was kissed heartily by his mother, Rose, of Hartford, Conn. Then he drew a kiss from his fiancée, June Haverly, of West Hartford, Conn., who said she and the speedster plan to be married next spring.

Sixty eight athletes and officials, including trackmen who competed in the British Empire games at London after the Olympics, were in the latest delegation which arrived from London.

85 Million, See, Hear All-Stars

CHICAGO (P)—The College All-Star vs. Los Angeles Rams football game at Soldiers Field Friday night will be televised and broadcast over the largest hookup ever arranged for a sports contest, the Admiral Corporation announced Monday.

The company sponsoring the airing of the game said 55 TV stations will handle a coast-to-coast telecast and the broadcast will be fed to 400 Mutual radio stations.

Admiral estimated 35,000,000 persons will see and hear the game at home.

LA's Stan Hack Gets \$100 Fine

LOS ANGELES —Stan Hack, manager of the Los Angeles Angels baseball team, was fined \$100 by President Clarence Rowland of the Pacific Coast League Monday as a result of Sunday's near riot at Wrigley Field.

Team managers are held responsible for the conduct of their players. Involved in the dispute with plate umpire Ed Runge were Leon Brinkopf, Les Peden and Max West.

Hack was ejected from the game with Hollywood after Runge ruled Hollywood catcher Jim Mangan safe at home in the 10th inning of the first game.

Several Angels fans rushed onto the field and one of them wrestled Runge to the ground. Hack's fine was for "violent, profane language and conduct which could easily have created a very serious riot."

Boyd Leading Coast Hitters

SAN FRANCISCO (P)—Bob Boyd of Seattle, hitting .323 for 11 games paced Pacific Coast League batters through last Sunday. It was the fourth consecutive week the Rainiers' southpaw first sacker topped the regulars of the loop.

The fourth place Seattle club, which knocked over Sacramento seven straight contests last week, also had the next two highest batting averages in Bob Wilson, catcher, with .318 for 113 games, and Infielder Artie Wilson, with .311 for 109 games.

Oakland First Baseman Cookie Gilbert led the circuit in runs batted in with 90 and was tied with Los Angeles Outfielder Max West for home run leadership with 23.

Joe Brovia led the Portland team with a .303 average in 130 games. He has hit 14 homers.
