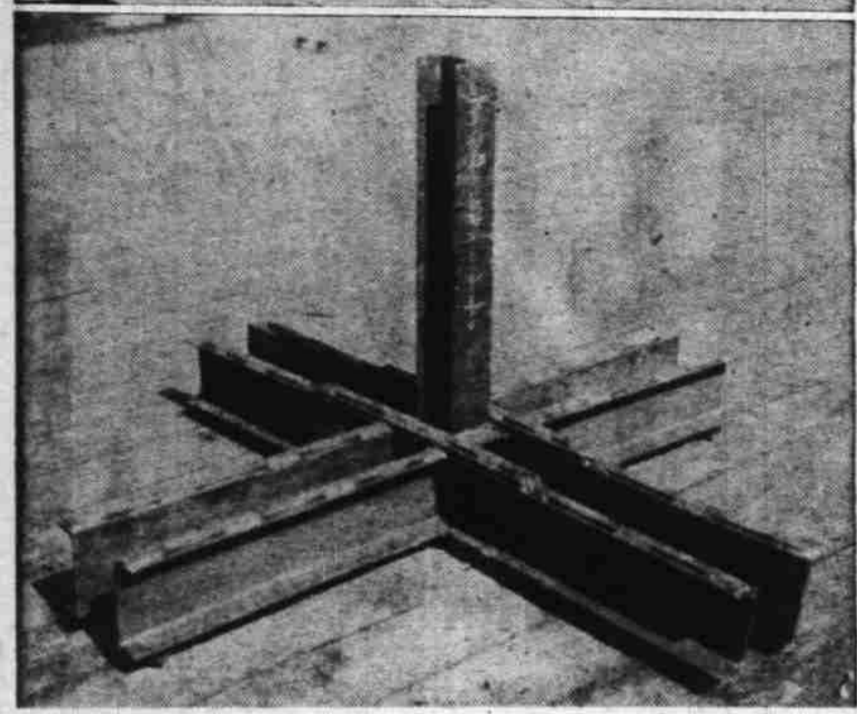
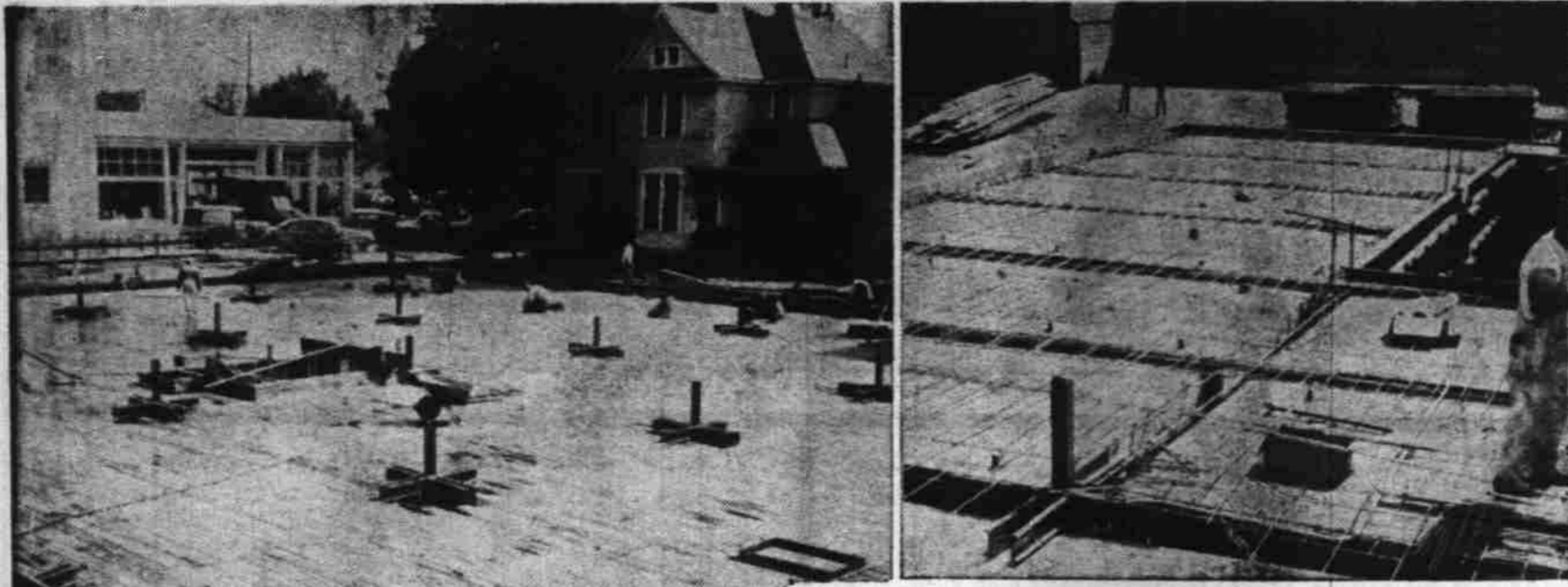


New Type of Construction in Statesman Building



The Statesman is first with a lot of things—including the use of the so-called Wheeler system of flat-slab construction in its new building now being erected at North Church and Chemeketa Streets in Salem.

The five-pointed structural steel "prongs", called column caps, are shown on the roughed-in first floor of the structure. A sixth prong is imbedded in concrete pillars, which will be extended upwards another floor as construction progresses.

The column caps are used in lieu of steel girders between pillars. They have a cantilever effect and help spread the weight of the 9½-inch concrete floor which is to be poured within the next few days after a network of reinforcing steel is laid (shown partially in photo above).

The Wheeler system has the advantage of economical construction and permits using the full height of the basement with no girders in the way. The Statesman building is the first to be so designed by the architectural firm of Bellusch and Skidmore, Owings and Merrill, and marks the first time such construction has been used in this area.

Contractors for the new \$300,000 Statesman plant are Viesko & Post.

Six Western States Plan to Trade Students

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Ore. (AP) —The Western Regional Commission for Higher Education Monday announced a program to enable six Western States to exchange students next year in the fields of medicine, dentistry and veterinary medicine.

The program suggested at a recent Western States Governors' Conference, must be approved by the legislature of each state before it can become effective.

Medical education is available in Oregon, Colorado and Utah; dentistry in Oregon, and veterinary medicine in Colorado.

Observers were on hand from California, Washington and Wyoming. These three states have not yet joined the regional pact.

Dr. O Meredith, dean of the University of Utah, was re-elected commission chairman and Tom L. Popejoy, University of New Mexico, vice chairman.

Salt Lake City was selected as permanent headquarters for the commission. Glacier Park in Washington was selected as the 1953 meeting site.

Thief Steals Burglar Trap

Applications Requested for State Positions

State Civil Service Commission officials are now accepting applications for supervisor of industries for the blind. There is no written test but applicants will be personally interviewed.

The position involves a variety of supervisory activities in connection with industrial projects for blind persons. This includes production, home industry programs and sale of materials produced.

The starting pay is \$336 a month. Applicants should have three years of production experience, preferably in a field which could be adapted to physically handicapped labor. Preference will be given to applicants who are physically handicapped, but this handicap shall not be a complete one, such as total blindness.

Applications for psychologist examinations also are being received. There are three levels of psychologist with starting salaries of \$272, \$322 and \$379. Varying degrees of experience and training on a graduate level are required. The last filing date for applications is Sept. 6.

For Accounting Clerk
A continuous examination is being conducted for accounting clerk positions. The beginning pay is \$250 a month and applicants must be high school graduates with at least one year of bookkeeping experience or equivalency.

Immediate openings in state service include graduate nurse positions in Salem, Portland, Pendleton and The Dalles and hospital aide positions in Salem and Pendleton. There are two openings at the state tuberculosis hospital in Salem for physicians.

Position at Prison
Warden Virgil O'Malley is seeking a highly trained applicant for the position of prison food manager at the state penitentiary.

This position carries a starting salary of \$4,828 a year and applicants must have experience in large scale food management. Requirements include a thorough knowledge of cooking and ability to handle both inmate and paid help.

Some college training is preferred. The applicant must live in Salem and devote full-time to the position. Application may be filed at the penitentiary or at the Portland or Salem office of the State Civil Service Commission.

Brawl Fatal to Indian Artist, Charges Filed

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) —Murder charges late Tuesday were filed against Cruz Simbola, 52, in the fatal beating of Gerald Nailor, 36, noted Indian artist whose murals decorate the Interior Building in Washington.

U. S. Dist. Atty. Maurice Sanchez filed the charges against Simbola, Nailor's brother-in-law. Nailor died Tuesday in a Taos, N. M., hospital following injuries he received when he was kicked in the stomach during a brawl at Picuris Pueblo Sunday.

Nailor, a Navajo, was most widely known for his paintings of horses. He painted murals at the Interior Building and the Navajo Tribal Council building at Window Rock, Ariz. He lived at Picuris Pueblo near Taos.

Four Indicted By Grand Jury

Two men were indicted by a Marion County grand jury Tuesday on bad check charges and two more were indicted on non-support charges.

Arnold Shelton, Lebanon, was indicted on a charge of passing a \$15 check at a local drugstore last month. Maurice Hemersky, Salem, was indicted on a similar charge involving a \$10 check at a local hotel recently.

Marion Wilbur Jones, now held by Los Angeles, Calif., authorities, was indicted on a non-support charge. LeRoy E. Friedrick, Portland, was indicted on a similar charge. He appeared in Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell's court Tuesday and pleaded guilty to the charge. He will be sentenced Thursday.

Infantrymen To Wear Blue

SEATTLE, Wash. —The Army infantrymen will soon wear more distinctive uniform touches which will make this service more readily recognizable, Army officials explained today.

The new insignia, featuring the distinguishing light shade of blue, should be in the hands of troops by Sept. 1 or shortly thereafter. Included are blue scarf, blue-trimmed cap, collar insignia, blue shoulder cord and blue piping for the garrison cap.

These items will be issued at different stages of training. As long as a man is a member of a combat ready unit he will be permitted to wear a blue shoulder cord.

The deceased is the grandson of Joseph Anderson of Salem. He also is survived by parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Anderson of Corvallis, and by five sisters and three brothers.

Young Anderson was born Jan. 9, 1934, at Silverton and lived for a time in Washington and Independence. He graduated from Corvallis High School. Death came when a log rolled on Anderson while he was working in the woods. Interment will be at the Odd Fellows Cemetery in Independence.

Mustering-Out Checks Ready

SEATTLE, Wash. —First mustering-out paychecks will be mailed from the Army Finance Center in St. Louis about Aug. 15, it was announced by Army officials.

A new mustering-out Pay Branch has been set up at the Center to pay the approximate 500,000 Army veterans eligible under the Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952. It is expected to pay approximately 180,000 men a month. The bill provides for mustering-out pay for members of the Armed Forces who served on or after June 27, 1950.

Army veterans should mail their applications to MOP Branch, Finance Center, U. S. Army, St. Louis, 20, Mo. Permanent addresses should be included. At least 90 days should be allowed before writing letters of inquiry.

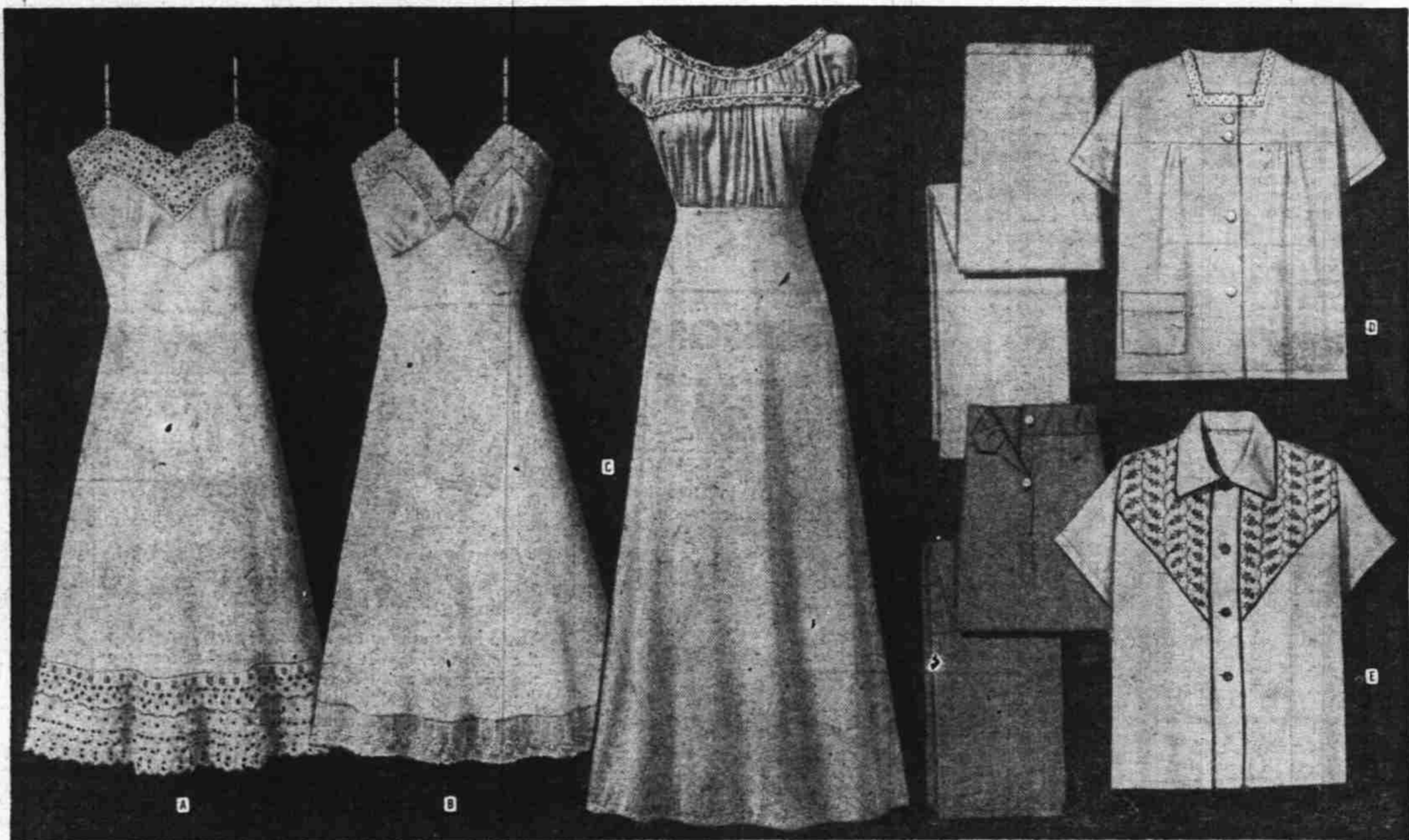

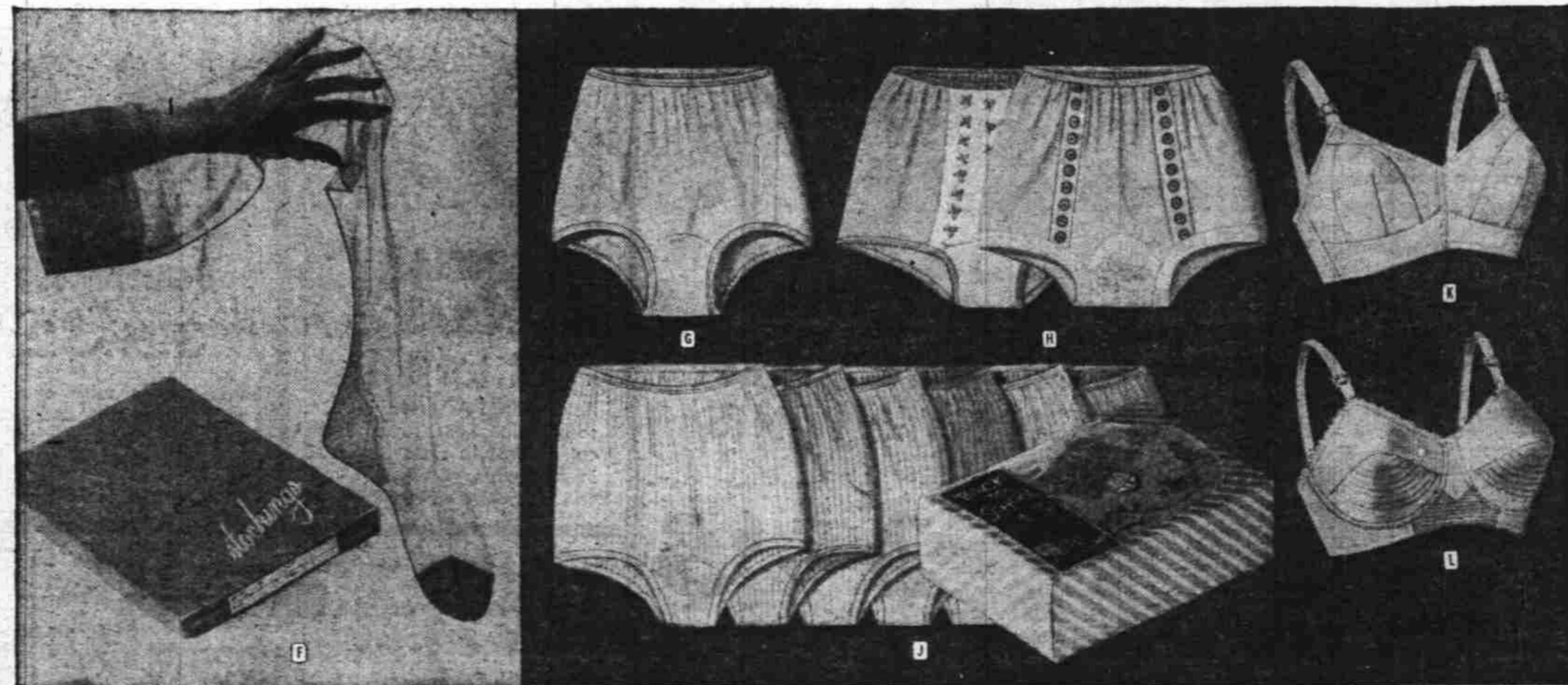
