

Sen. Sparkman 'Proud' to Stand Behind Adlai

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP)—Sen. John J. Sparkman forecast Monday "the South will be proud to stand behind Gov. Adlai Stevenson" in November's election.

The Alabama senator, nominated for vice president on the Democratic ticket with Stevenson, spoke at a homecoming celebration here where he has lived for 27 years.

His brief address, lasting only eight minutes, was hailed by Democrats as marking the opening of their drive to keep the South solidly behind their ticket despite determined Republican campaigns for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Sparkman said he had just ended a two-day stay with Stevenson, and knew the South would back him.

"Let me say the East, the West, the North and the South," he continued, "will all join behind him. I am proud to be on the same team."

Initial Speech

It was Sparkman's first speech since his nomination last month at the Democratic National Convention at Chicago. He said he was "down here to see my folks, and not to make campaign speeches," and aside from the prediction of a Democratic victory in November made little reference to the political situation.

Earlier, Sparkman told reporters he welcomed the GOP's "sudden, new interest in the South," but wondered "whether it will last." He was referring to plans for a Southern campaign tour next month by Eisenhower.

Steel Case Mishandled

Meanwhile, the U. S. News & World Report quoted Sparkman in a copyrighted interview as describing the steel case as "badly mishandled."

The weekly news magazine quoted the senator as saying: "I think it was mishandled, first, by both sides finding it too easy to come to the government, to pass the buck more or less—and it offers a buck-passing possibility so far as stockholders are concerned and so far as labor unions are concerned."

"In that case, if things go wrong then the loser can blame the government."

The steel case, a major labor-management issue through the first seven months of 1952, was ended with a compromise agreement July 24 after a 53-day strike. During the long controversy President Truman seized the mills. The Supreme Court overruled him, saying he lacked power.

Sparkman said if he were writing the law, he would make it "difficult for them to get to the government."

When sitting on a fence, her shorts were covered with white streaks and, after posing as a painter one blouse is now mottled green.

With Portland Agency

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Keightley of Amity, Miss Keightley has been modeling with the Maria Easterly agency in Portland for about two years. Before that she spent several years in schools at Hillsboro and Rockville, Mo., where she had a year of college.

The blonde model spent a year teaching school in Missouri before her family brought her back to Oregon. She worked for a while in Hillsboro and then moved on to Portland where she worked as secretary for five men in an advertising agency. She doesn't take shorthand.

She got her start in modeling by helping out at the advertising agen-

cy. From there she went to agency work.

Exciting Work
"You meet a lot of nice people in this business and a lot of characters too," she says. She calls her work "exciting" and "glamorous" and recommends it for any girl who needs poise and self assurance.

There are, of course, she says, disadvantages to the business. For instance, in winter it's time to take bathing suit pictures for summer and in the summer it's time to take pictures of winter clothing. She says it's no cinch to stand on a beach in freezing weather acting as though you're having a marvelous time "in your new 'marvelous' bathing suit."

And, says Miss Keightley, though it is fun to see your pictures in the paper, the only time she ever made the front page was when she had her picture taken with a famous cow.

Nevada Prison Convict Killed

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP)—Guard Harvey Hand shot a 32-year-old convict to death Sunday night when the prisoner tried to escape for the second time within a month from the state penitentiary. Warden Arthur Bernard announced.

John Paul Wilhelm, serving a 1-15 year burglary sentence from Las Vegas, was slain after attacking Hand and another guard, Roy Burchett, Bernard said.

Wilhelm got Burchett to open the door to his solitary confinement cell on a pretext of needing water. The convict knocked Burchett's head into a wall and lunged for Hand. Hand shot him with a .38 caliber pistol.

Wilhelm was returned to the prison from Idaho only about a week ago.

Portland Employees Ask Release From Retirement Plan

PORTLAND (AP)—City employees Monday reported a move to withdraw from the state retirement system.

Vincent Sherer, chairman of a city employees' committee, said 1,550 have signed petitions to withdraw, and that there probably would be 1,650 by Aug. 25, when they will take the matter before the City Council.

"Our plan is to withdraw from the state pension system and then be governed by social security. Under social security we will receive more benefits, have more take-home pay, and an ultimate saving to the taxpayer," Sherer said.

He said city employees at Astoria and Salem, and county employees of Clackamas and Tillamook Counties already have withdrawn.

Clackamas Suit to Get O&C Funds Hits Roadblock

PORTLAND (AP)—A suit brought by Clackamas County in an effort to force payment of money by the Interior and Agriculture Departments to the 18 Oregon and California revested land counties, has run into a major block here.

The government made a motion to dismiss the suit. A hearing on that was scheduled for Monday, but it was indefinitely postponed, putting a halt to continuance of the action until the hearing is reset.

A. W. Lafferty, as special attorney for Clackamas County, filed the suit.

Check Passer Pleads Guilty

Arnold Shelton, Lebanon, pleaded guilty Monday in Marion County Circuit Court to passing a worthless \$15 check in Salem last June.

Shelton, who is to be sentenced Sept. 10, was indicted earlier this month by the grand jury on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses.

Maurice Hamersky, Salem, who had been indicted at the same time on a similar charge, asked the court to appoint an attorney and was continued to Aug. 20 for arraignment.

Convicted Reds Denied Bail

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Fourteen convicted California Communists were again denied bail Monday pending their appeal.

Federal Judge William C. Mathes, who presided at the six-months trial, declared:

"I am denying this motion for bail pending appeal on the sole and exclusive ground that, in the opinion of this court, there does not appear to be involved in this case a substantial question to be determined by the appellate court."

The 14 were convicted Aug. 5 of conspiracy to teach and advocate violent overthrow of the U.S. government. Judge Mathes sentenced each to five years in prison and \$10,000 fine, the maximum, and he denied bail. They had been at liberty on \$5,000 or \$10,000 bail during the trial.

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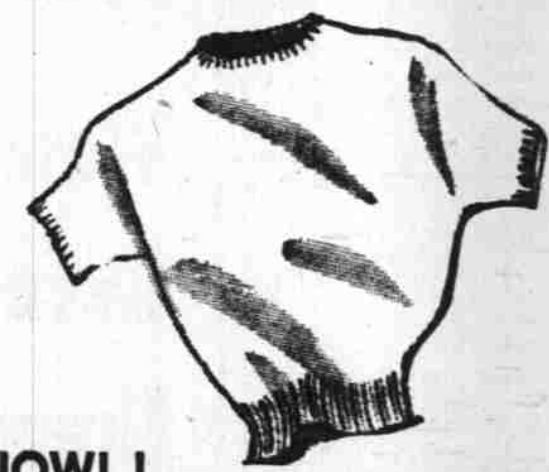
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
