

Pringle Road Residents Protest Being 'Moved' to New Road

Who put the overalls in Mrs. Sheaffer's mailbox? Whoever it was, the Salem Planning and Zoning Commission promised Tuesday to investigate protests that someone has changed the name of part of Pringle Road to Battle Creek Road. Many a street naming argument has gone by the zoning boards, but it's been some time since anyone like Mrs. C. L. Sheaffer came in to report a new road name that property owners knew nothing about—and that the zoners themselves knew nothing about.

To hear it from Mrs. Sheaffer, her husband, and Henry Myers and D. M. Partridge, as the zoners did last night at City Hall, it would seem many of the Route 4 residents southeast of Salem were ready to accept just about any substitute for the frequent postal route address changes inflicted on them in recent years.

But when they had regular street numbers assigned and found their section of Pringle Road was to be called Battle Creek Road, according to the Post-office, that was a different matter.

Mrs. Sheaffer went to the Post-office over it, was referred to the city engineer who also disclaimed knowledge of any such change. Next, she explained, she went back to the Postoffice where someone suggested the Salem Long Range Planning Commission (now defunct) and Milton L. Myers (a zoning commissioner now in the hospital). She took a new tack and called on the county court before getting wind of the zoning commission meeting. Meanwhile 22 names were collected on a protest petition.

The road in question is out of the city, going south from Hoyt Street to Pringle School, but it's within the radius covered by the zoning commission in matters like street names and plats. The Sheaffers made the point that the entire road has long been known as Pringle Road and should continue by that name at least as far as the schoolhouse. It's at the school crossroads that Battle Creek Road begins, or did, they said.

Seeks \$800,000 Libel Damages

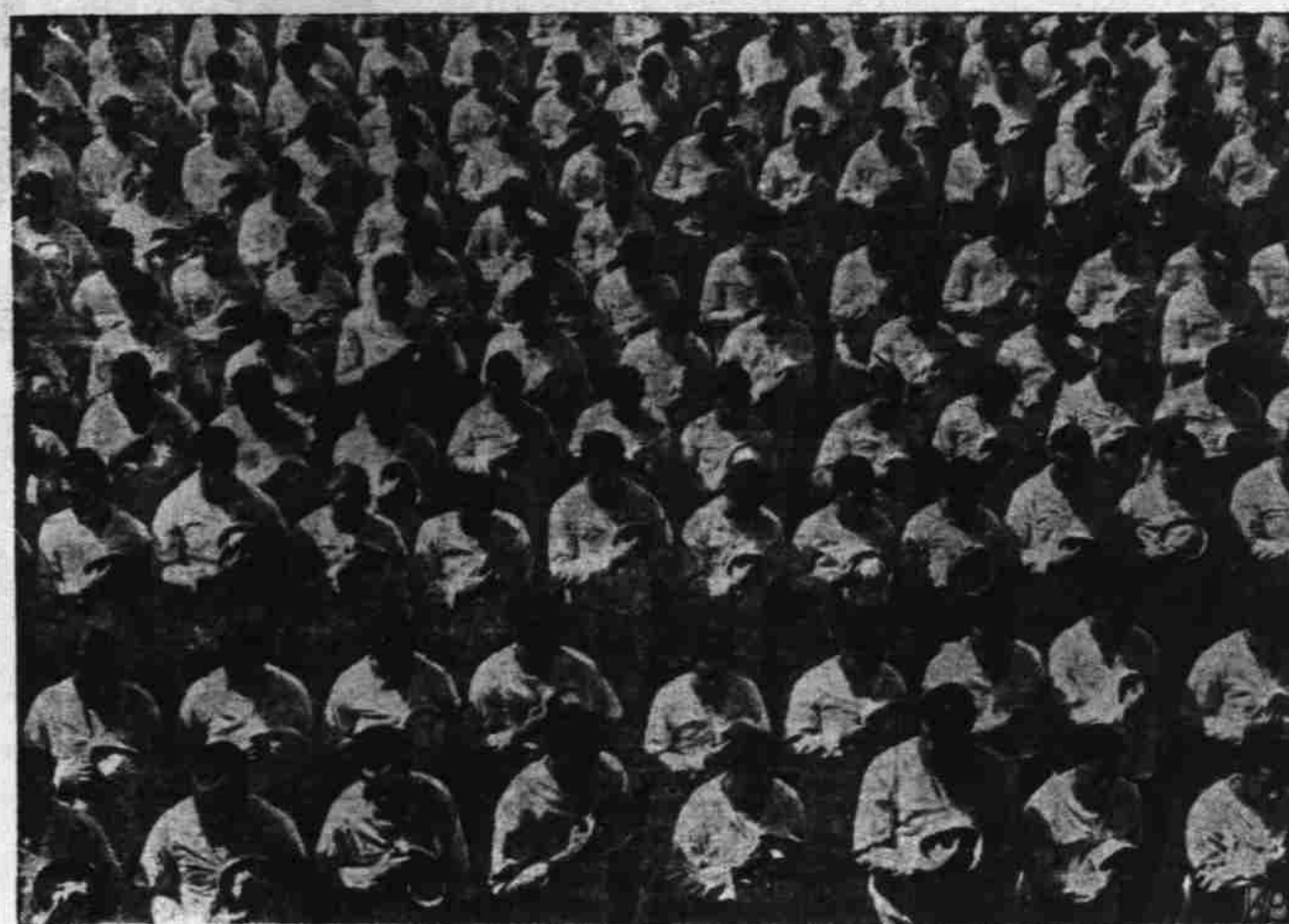

Sailors Lose Jobs for Failure To Fight Fire

PORTLAND (AP)—Four crewmen of the freighter Augustine Day were suspended by a Coast Guard trial examiner Monday on charges of leaving the vessel when a fire broke out.

Robert J. Garrison, 25, Yakima, Wash., radio officer, had his license revoked by Trial Examiner James M. Donahue. Garrison's seaman's papers also were suspended for six months.

Similar six-month suspensions were given to John Redfern, Santa Cruz, Calif., an oiler, and Richard Paddock, New York, fireman. Fitzgerald C. Smith, New York, received a nine-month suspension.

The four were accused of going over the side when the ship caught fire while moored off Korea. The vessel was loaded with 22,000 drums of gasoline. The fire started when four drums of gasoline dropped from a loading sling on to the deck.

The seamen testified at the hearing they thought the abandon ship alarm had been sounded, so they jumped.

Hoffman Blasts McCarthy for 'False Charges'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Paul G. Hoffman, a top Eisenhower-for-President adviser, Tuesday assailed as "fantastically false" the accusations Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) has hurled at Gen. George C. Marshall.

McCarthy on June 14, 1951, devoted a 60,000-word Senate speech linking Marshall—wartime chief of staff and postwar secretary of state—with what McCarthy termed "a conspiracy of infamy" to make this country the prey of world Communism.

"I consider the charge fantastically false," Hoffman said Tuesday in sworn testimony for possible use in the trial of a two million dollar libel-slander suit McCarthy has filed against Sen. Benton (D-Conn.).

McCarthy in the suit accuses Benton of defaming him with unfounded charges of fraud, perjury and calculated deceit. Benton among other things has charged publicly that McCarthy's speech about Marshall was "a towering lie."

Benton has said his main defense will be an effort to prove his charges are true. His lawyers called Hoffman to back this move and to preserve Hoffman's testimony in the form of a deposition for use in the trial if Hoffman is not available to testify in person.

Hoffman was the first head of the Economic Cooperation Administration ECA, through which the Marshall Plan of aid to Europe was handled. He now heads the Ford Foundation, a philanthropic-educational body.

DETROIT (AP)—King Faisal II of Iraq exhibited boyish enthusiasm for mechanics Tuesday as he rode a newly-built Patton medium tank, drove a new car off the assembly line and chatted with Ford Motor Co., President Henry Ford II.

The 17-year-old monarch watched the tanks being made at Ford's nearby Livonia tank plant, then took a ride in one on the test track. Then he moved on to the Ford Rouge plant in Dearborn, where he drove the car off the line. Ford talked with him in his office far more than the scheduled five minutes.

King Faisal appeared reluctant to leave the automotive center to come into Detroit for a reception before his plane left for Chicago.
