

Hard Tops Set Elimination Event for Title Saturday

Whoever wins the 1952 Hollywood Bowl hard top racing championship here Saturday night will earn the title. Of that you may be certain.

Sponsoring Valley Sports officials announced Wednesday that the souped up "tops" would be put through a grueling program Saturday in order to determine the champion. The field, which is expected to number between 30 and 40 cars, and perhaps even more, is to be divided equally right after the time trials and two trophy dashes are over. Then will follow two 50-lap events for the divided field.

After the drivers have battled it out in the twin fifties, the top eight finishers in each event will go into a grand finale of 20 laps for the championship.

Because of the length of the races, the usual heat romps and Class B main event will not be held Saturday night. Valley Sports officials feel that all entries will have an equal chance in the two 50-lappers, and that the length of those races will flush the top 16 cars for the championship run.

Time trials will start at 7:30. The first of the two 50-lappers will start just as soon as they are finished. Never before in Hollywood Bowl history has a race card been held here with so many laps of racing on it.

3 Top Names Eliminated In Amateur Links Meet

SEATTLE (P)—A Navy seaman, a crooner and a college boy knocked three of the biggest names in golf out of the National Amateur championship in the fourth round Wednesday.

Twenty-two year old Gene Litter of La Jolla, Calif., who is about halfway through a four-year hitch in the Navy, handed the British Amateur Champion, Harvie Ward of Tarboro, N. C., a 4 and 2 beating.

Don Cherry of Garden City, N. Y., a singer with a sultry voice and a red hot putter, whipped Frank Stranahan, twice British champion, 3 and 1.

And Paul Johanson, who played for the University of Washington this spring, eliminated Ray Billows of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., three-time runner-up for the amateur title, 5 and 3.

Walcott, Rocky May Lure 'Million' Gate

PHILADELPHIA (P)—World heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott and challenger Rocky Marciano formally signed contracts Wednesday for their 15-round title bout at Municipal Stadium Sept. 23.

Walcott, who will be making his second defense of the title he won from Ezzard Charles in July, 1951, is guaranteed 40 per cent of the gate. Marciano will get 20 per cent.

Promoter Herman Taylor, who is staging the bout in collaboration with the International Boxing Club of New York, said he expects a million-dollar gate including television and other rights.

The agreement also calls for a return match within 90 days should the undefeated Brockton, Mass., battler beat Walcott.

Andersen Gets Russ Challenge

OSLO (P)—Hjalmar Andersen, Norway's speed skating king, said Wednesday he would welcome a challenge to meet Russia's best skaters on the Soviets' "home ground."

Andersen's statement came after a Russian challenge was printed in a Pravda story Tuesday, directing Red skaters to better the Norwegian's world record for 10,000 meters—16 minutes, 32.6 seconds. "I should love a chance to compete against the Russians," said Andersen, who won three gold medals in the last winter Olympics.

Hunt Openers Set Saturday

PORTLAND (P)—Oregon's antelope and sage grouse seasons open in some areas Saturday.

Sage grouse shooting will start in Harney and Malheur Counties and in Lake County east of Warner Bailey road and Highway 395. Bag limit is four daily and not more than eight in the season ending Sept. 4.

The antelope season in South-eastern Oregon also closes Sept. 4. Special antelope seasons in Malheur and Harney Counties also open Saturday for one week.

Also starting Saturday is a special Elk season in the Troy section of Northeastern Oregon. This will end on Aug. 28th.

Judge Says Saigh Must Face Trial

ST. LOUIS (P)—A federal judge Wednesday denied a motion by Fred Saigh, owner of the St. Louis Cardinal baseball club, for dismissal of a federal grand jury indictment charging him with income tax evasion.

Saigh was ordered to appear for arraignment Monday, when the date for his trial is expected to be set.

Judge Roy W. Harper did grant, in part, Saigh's request for a bill of particulars on the indictment accusing him of evading \$48,620 in taxes on unreported income of \$108,824 for the period of 1946 through 1948.

British Driver Topples Marks

WENDOVER, Utah (P)—Lt. Col. Goldie Gardner wheeled his tiny sports car over the Bonneville Salt Flats east of here for two more unofficial national and international speed marks Wednesday.

The lanky Briton piled up the new speeds in the Class F division from a flying start. The marks were in the five mile and 10 kilometer divisions. The official marks will be somewhat lower than the highest speeds of 193.36 MPH for the former and 186.48 MPH for the latter, since they are averaged times on two runs for each division.

Gardner plans to attempt three more new records Thursday.
