

Progressive Party Gains Spot on Ballot

The U.S. Progressive party's presidential ticket will figure on Oregon's general election ballot in November.

But Vincent Hallinan, Ross, Calif., for president, and Charlotte Bass, New York City, for vice president, will be listed as independent candidates, under the method of official filing with the State Elections Division employed Friday.

Hallinan was released from federal prison a few days ago after serving time for contempt of court in connection with the Harry Bridges deportation trial. Hallinan was Bridges' attorney.

He and Mrs. Bass filed in Oregon as independents, following a recent nominating assembly in Portland where the legally required number of voters (250) nominated them. To have re-established

ed the Progressive Party in Oregon so candidates could be listed under the party's name would have required voters' petitions signed by 24,976, under the election law.

Nominated for presidential electors at the Progressives' assembly were A. M. Church, Salem; Donald W. Brown, Coos Bay; Helen M. Neuenchwander and W. K. Patrick, Portland; M. H. Black, Milwaukie, and Roy Stauffer, Eugene.

Activities of another proposed minor political party came to the attention of the elections bureau this week, but no filings are expected to result before the Monday deadline.

This is the Constitution Party, with headquarters in Portland, according to articles of incorporation filed with the state corporation commissioner's office by Louise Gronnert, Gladys Whelen and Virgil Holland. Stated purpose of the party is to advocate and promote interest in the U.S. constitution in the schools and elsewhere.

Encephalitis Case Reported

MEDFORD (P)—A case of encephalitis, or sleeping sickness, was reported here Friday. It was the first evidence that the California sleeping sickness epidemic has spread to Southern Oregon.

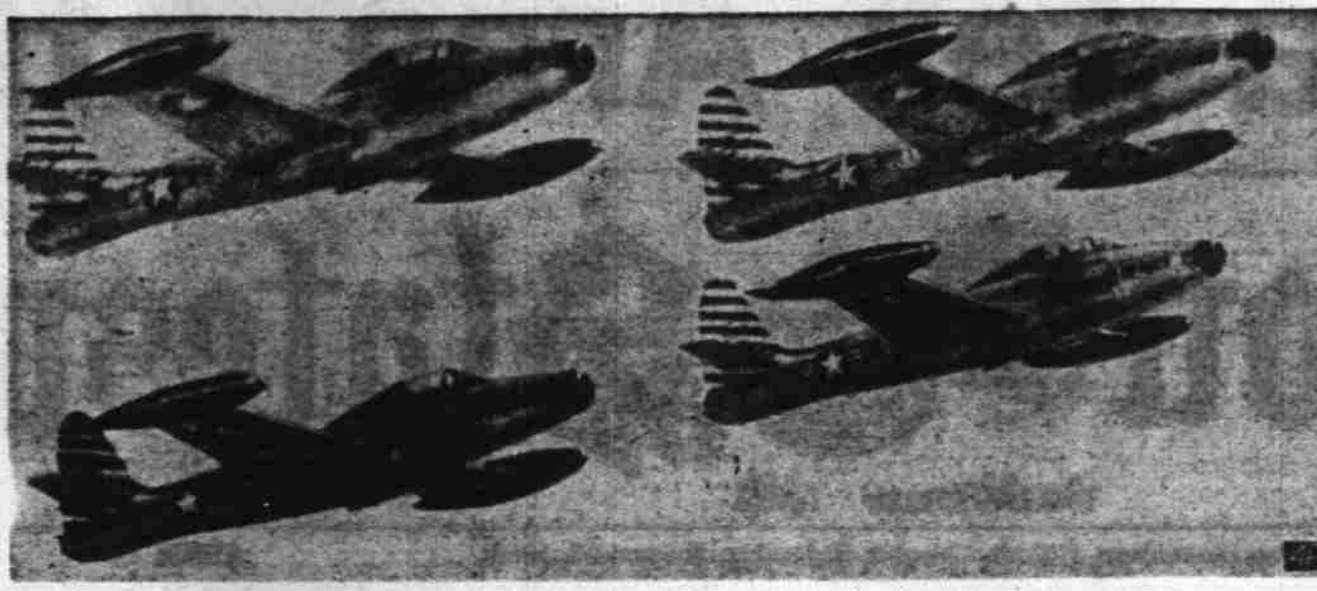

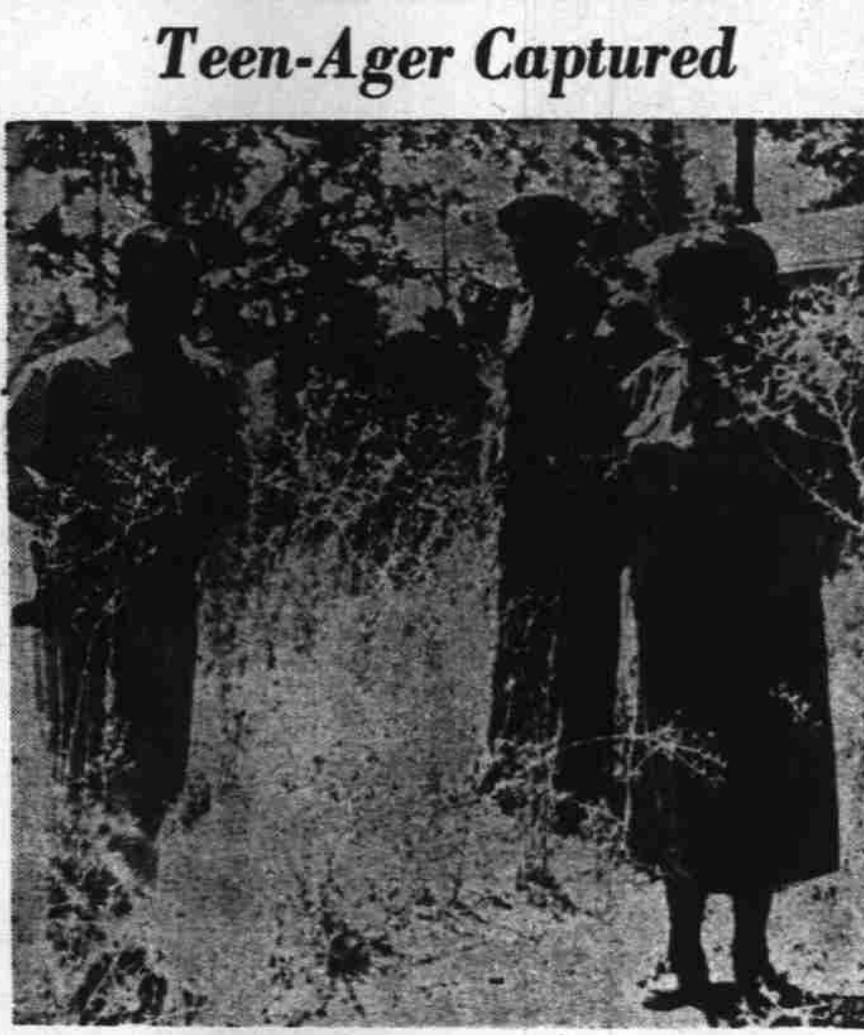

Spokane Man Predicted Earthquake

SPOKANE (P)—Clarence V. Hall, an amateur seismologist who claims he can predict earthquakes, had a "near miss" on Friday's shock at Bakesfield, Calif.

Hall, 66-year-old mechanic who has submitted many predictions and come close on only a few, came to the Associated Press bureau here last Monday and left this written statement:

"California comes in earthquake pattern Aug. 19, Aug. 21 and Aug. 23 with the epicenter in the vicinity of Los Angeles and Bakesfield in the Bear Mountain fault, which will place the epicenter in the same general area as the July 21 earthquake."

There have been scores of shocks in the region since July 21. Hall has an intense interest in his hobby and has brought many predictions to newspaper offices. Seismologists generally agree it's impossible to predict an earthquake.

Hall bases his predictions on known faults in the earth and the moon's "pulling power." A farmer's Almanac, a globe, and a book on the planets are his principal instruments.

Checking of signatures on petitions for collective bargaining for Salem firemen probably will require up to the Monday deadline, it was indicated Friday.

Greeks Back Government Despite Advice

ATHENS, Greece —Greece's Parliament, acting little more than 48 hours after U. S. Ambassador John E. Peurifoy suggested a new government might help the nation, voted confidence in Premier Nicholas Plastiras' coalition cabinet Friday, 127-118.

The margin of the government's victory was narrow, but adequate to prolong its life. Defeat would have meant the resignation of Plastiras and his ministers, representing his own leftist National Progressive Union and Deputy Premier Sophocles Venizelos' Liberals.

The vote came after days of bickering debate over a wide field of economic, political and military problems reflecting varying views in the single-house Parliament.

Peurifoy suggested a new national election in a talk with Greek newsmen Wednesday on the ground a new government would be better equipped than the old to deal with these problems. A storm of protest developed. The liberal newspaper Elliniki Imera Friday demanded the envoy's recall.

Accusing the envoy of interference in Greek political affairs, the newspaper declared he had adopted the role of super-governor and reminded it of German and Italian high commissioners who operated here in World War II. It said he "must withdraw from Greece."

Elliniki Imera and other pro-government publications sought to make an issue of remarks by Peurifoy to Greek newsmen Wednesday, in which he urged an election on the ground a new government would be in a better position to meet Greek economic problems.

Opposition newspapers generally backed his views.

Washington backed Peurifoy. The ambassador, who weathered a somewhat similar storm last March, was not available for comment. He was on the Greek island of Rhodes, where the voice of America's ship courier is inaugurating relay broadcasts through the Iron Curtain.

The State Department, in an almost unprecedented move sought last spring to end government by coalition in Greece for the avowed purpose of getting better use from American economic and military aid. That aid now totals 2½ billion dollars.
