

Auto Insurance Rates To Increase in Oregon

NEW YORK (AP)—New and higher automobile liability insurance rates go into effect in Oregon this week.

Starting Monday, owners of private passenger cars will pay from \$3 to \$20 a year more for standard liability protection.

The rate changes apply to "basic limits" coverage. This means a combined insurance policy which pays up to \$5,000 for bodily injury to one person, up to \$10,000 for injuries to two or more persons in one accident, and up to \$5,000 property damage.

For most commercial vehicles affected by the higher rates, the increases for bodily injury and property damage protection combined range from \$7 to \$16.

Costs Increase

In announcing the higher Oregon rates, which are part of a nationwide pattern of rate increases, the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters emphasized that costs of settling accident claims, as reflected in repair and medical bills, have soared in recent years and that accident rates are climbing. The bureau noted that 15,116 men, women and children were killed or injured in traffic accidents in Oregon last year as against 13,759 the previous year—an increase of 10 per cent.

Rates Vary

Rates vary in different parts of the state. Here's how they'll affect the owner of a private passenger car who does not use his car for business and does not have a driver under 25 years of age in his family:

In the third of Portland and parts of Multnomah and Clackamas counties, the rate goes up from \$49 to \$54.

In suburban Portland, the rates are boosted from \$34 to \$44.

In the cities of Astoria, Eugene, Klamath Falls and Salem, and in all territory within five miles of their city limits, the old rate of \$39 is increased to \$44.

Atlantis Said Under Ocean In North Sea

HAMBURG, Germany (AP)—A German clergyman-scientist said Saturday he has found what he believes to be a king's castle and a temple of legendary Atlantis on the bottom of the North Sea off Helgoland.

The Rev. Juergen Spanuth of Bordelum, said a diver of his expedition, closely following directions contained in the writings of the ancient Greek philosopher Plato, descended 30 feet and stood on a man-made wall. Spanuth said this wall apparently encircled the fabled kingdom.

He plans to publish a book about his findings.

Plato, who drew largely on Egyptian legends, said Atlantis was larger than Asia Minor and Libya put together. Spanuth doesn't agree. He thinks Atlantis was only a small island.

The Encyclopaedia Britannica says Atlantis was a legendary island in the Atlantic Ocean. It adds that Plato describes in his writings how Egyptian priests represented the island as being situated just beyond the Pillars of Hercules. These are two promontories at the Strait of Gibraltar.

Aussie Stars Reach Semis

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP)—The luck of the draw prevented another all-Australian final in the men's division of the national doubles tennis championship Saturday but the Aussies will have three representatives in Sunday's final round.

Defending Champions Frank Sedgman and Ken McGregor drew their 17-year-old Australian countrymen, Lewis Hoad and Ken Rosewall, as their semi-final rivals and the former had little trouble stroking to a 5-7, 6-2, 6-4, 6-2 decision.

Mervyn Rose, the third Australian finalist, paired with Vic Seixas of Philadelphia for a crushing 6-2, 6-2, 6-2 victory over four-times winners Gardnar Mulloy of Miami, and Bill Talbert of New York.

Last year's winning combine of Doris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., and Shirley Fry of Akron, O., joined Maureen Connolly of San Diego, Calif., and Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., in the final round by defeating Britishers Helen Fletcher and Angela Mortimer, 6-3, 6-1.

Sackett Hits at Branch Banks, Title Insurance

COOS BAY — The Coos Bay Times, in an open letter to Gov. McKay, said Saturday it was launching an "analytical and scholarly investigation" into the status of branch banking and title insurance in Oregon.

Over the signature of Publisher Sheldon F. Sackett, the letter termed branch banking "amoral" and said "the dangers of monopoly are becoming... increasingly apparent."

The letter also said, in regard to title insurance, that "the very word 'insurance' is a misnomer since the title companies only insure risks which to their best information... are free from loss. In this regard the theory of insurance is repudiated as no insurance company rightfully could seek moneys from the public for a non-existent risk."

"The purpose of this letter," Sackett wrote, "is to ask the full cooperation of your good offices... in providing us with the necessary facts, figures, data, etc., which are public knowledge."

Police Escort Workers by Picket Line

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP)—Highway patrolmen Saturday escorted 40 supervisory workers from the B. F. Goodrich tire plant after an all-night blockade by angry pickets, but a payroll dispute remained unsettled.

Striking United Rubber Workers CIO members catcalled and jeered as eight patrolmen cleared away lumber barricades barring exits from the plant.

There was no violence, and A. G. Trammell, local union vice president, said only 12 to 14 pickets later remained on duty where 350 to 400 had massed last night.

The strikers refused to permit plant manager Phil Zeiderhook, the 40 supervisory workers and 16 women employees to leave the plant when they were not paid at the usual time Friday.

Zeiderhook said clerical employees who prepared the payrolls had refused to cross the production workers' picket lines.

Trammell said Saturday, "We believe the B. F. Goodrich Co. could have met this week's payroll if they had been so willing."

He said he would meet with the payroll workers, members of his union, at 3 p.m., CST Sunday in an effort to persuade them to enter the plant. Trammell said they had refused this request three times previously.

The Goodrich operation here employs about 1,200 workers, most of whom left their jobs Monday in a strike.

Zeiderhook and the force inside the plant sat out the siege in comparative comfort. They ate a ham supper from the plant cafeteria Friday night, and breakfast again Saturday morning.

The pickets finally allowed the women employees to be taken through the gates at 2 a.m. (CST).

HELD ON DRIVING CHARGE

Arcaro Mount Nabs Futurity

CHICAGO (AP)—Mr. Paradise, with Eddie Arcaro aboard, won the \$107,120 Washington Park Futurity Saturday, beating his Arlington Futurity conqueror, Mr. Good, by a length and a half. Arcaro recorded his 31st stakes victory of the season and raised to \$994,722.50 the amount of money his stakes triumphs have earned.

Mr. Paradise was followed by Mr. Good, with King Pin, owned by Hal Price Headley of Lexington, Ky., in third place.

In all, this year, Arcaro has ridden 659 horses and has finished first 153 times, his total earnings being \$1,866,516.

42 Jailed for Spreading Red Dogma in Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Forty-two persons are being held on charges of spreading Communist propaganda in Egypt, a police official said Saturday.

Sixteen were arrested this week and their cases are being investigated by a new "office of general investigations," set up earlier this month by Premier Ali Maher's reform government, to determine whether they should be brought to trial.

Officials declined to comment on the extent of Communist activity in the Nile kingdom in recent months, but one source said there had been no increase such as he said had been noted in other countries.

This source said the Red activity here has been generally limited to the distribution of Communist pamphlets in which the word "Democracy" is stressed, distribution of foreign Communist newspapers and magazines, and translation of Communist literature.

Strong Man

Maj. Gen. Mohammed Naguib, the strong man whose coup a month ago dethroned King Farouk I, has stressed that Egypt's army is free of Communism.

A group of 11 persons was arrested Wednesday in the Northern Egyptian village of Faraskour while attending what police called a Communist meeting.

Among them was Roger Vailland, French Communist newsman and playwright. Under Egyptian law, foreigners convicted of spreading Communist propaganda may be imprisoned.

An Egyptian was arrested Thursday after he had arrived by plane from Tehran, Iran. Police said they found on him documents proving he was connected with the Iranian Communist Tudeh Party, recently openly belligerent against the government of Premier Mohammed Mossadegh.

Taken in Raid

Three Egyptians and a Sudanese were taken in a raid on a house in a Cairo suburb Friday by police who accused them of Red activity. Police said they found a quantity of Communist pamphlets.

The others among the 42 suspects held were picked up in July and the early part of August. Most of these persons, officials said, are students, teachers or lawyers. Increasing quantities of Red literature were reported coming from Iran. Previously most of the material came from France.

French sources here said Vailland was more of a writer than a newsman and that it was possible he wanted to collect first hand material from the "man in the street" rather than engage in active Red propaganda.

Slavs May Join Greeks, Turks In Maneuvers

ATHENS, Greece (AP)—Communist Yugoslav troops may join Greek and Turkish troops in small-scale military maneuvers this fall, well-placed Greek authorities said Saturday.

Possibly such exercises will be held in October.

The informants have been in close touch with current attempts to get the three nations on more friendly terms, especially militarily.

However, there is nothing official on these joint maneuvers and the idea may be overly optimistic, since a projected informal defense agreement between Premier Marshal Tito's independent Communist government and the two North Atlantic Treaty members is still in the talk stage.

A 15-man parliamentary delegation from Belgrade, headed by Pijade of the Yugoslav Politburo, arrived here Thursday night.

A Yugoslav military mission is expected here near the end of the month. A Greek mission will return the visit in Belgrade shortly afterward. The Turks are expected to get the act very soon, with a similar exchange of missions.

Aluminum Plant Slated for Alaska

MT. MCKINLEY NATIONAL PARK, Alaska (AP)—The Aluminum Company of America said Saturday it will build a 400-million dollar aluminum smelting plant in Alaska.

The company said the project hinges on the purchase of land and government approval.

Leon E. Hickman, vice president and general counsel for ALCOA, said the plant initially will be capable of producing 200,000 tons of aluminum annually.

Hickman said the plant will be built in the Talkeetna Valley district, near Skagway. It will be financed entirely with private capital.

Switchhitting Golfer Gets Aces Both Ways

ABILENE, Tex. (AP)—Ever hear of a golfer getting a hole-in-one right-handed and another left-handed?

Foy Fanning, professional at Abilene Municipal Course, has just done it.

In January, 1950, he shot the right-handed hole-in-one. This week he registered one left-handed, using a nine iron for a 128-yard shot on hole No. 16.

Fanning has a theory that if a man is right-handed he should play golf left-handed. He says the right arm is the master arm.

Head-on Crash Kills 2 North of Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (AP)—A man and two women were killed and two persons injured in a head-on car crash 41 miles north of here on U. S. Highway 91 Saturday.

Two of the dead were identified as John W. Wilbur, 67, Richmond, Va., driver of one car, and Mrs. Ralph Howard, Klamath Falls.

Dr. George Adler, Klamath County coroner, identified the other victim as Wilbur's wife. A passenger in the Wilbur car, identified as Dr. Florence Owens, Richmond, was in critical condition in a hospital here with arm and leg fractures and serious face cuts.

Seriously hurt was Ralph Howard, driver of the other car.

The crash occurred on a straight stretch of road.

U.S. Jets Hold 26-1 Edge on Reds in August

SEOUL (AP)—U.S. Sabre jet pilots claimed probably "the most clean-cut victory" of the Korean War Sunday for shooting down 26 MIGs and damaging 29 at a cost of one Sabre in only 22 days of August.

The Fifth Air Force spokesman said the nearest comparable performance to the blazing air battles of August was last June. In that month, 22 Sabres were shot down and one U.S. Sabre was lost.

How high the Sabres might boost their August total was in doubt. MIG jets which offered battle at great cost to themselves early in August have been shy lately. And rains now are hampering operations.

For example, the total for the 22 days include but three MIGs shot down in the seven-day period ended Friday. Daily totals often exceeded three when the going was hot and heavy earlier in the month.

The Air Force said that six Allied planes failed to return to base last week. Two were shot down by Red ground fire. Four others, including two Sabres, were lost to "other causes," presumably bad weather. A typhoon hampered air operations during the period.

Rains whipped across the Korean front most of Saturday, holding back both air and ground operations.

On the Western front, a small Chinese force tested the bristling defenses of Bunker Hill but was chased away.

Church Youth Meet Debates Military Issue

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP)—Hot debate on the right attitude toward military service broke out in the National Conference of Methodist Youth at Purdue University Saturday.

It was set off by a committee report recommending ways for local youth groups to serve Methodist and opportunities to participate in Methodist services.

The report proposed something like the Methodist Church's Wesley Foundation, which serves college students with fellowships, recreation and opportunities to participate in Methodist services.

Kenneth Thompson Jr. of Evanston, Ill., a Yale student, led the opposition which objected to any assumption that military life is a permanent part of American society.

He proposed that the conference set up a project "to help Methodist youth who are eligible for the draft to make a conscientious decision about entering armed services."

The conference approved the committee report, 53-31, and also approved Thompson's suggestion.

Among those elected to the council was George Goodman, Medford, Ore.

Those elected to the Methodist General Board of Education included Augusta Irause, Portland, Ore.

Plane Dives Into Yard, Airmen Die

TORONTO (AP)—A small Tiger Moth biplane nose-dived into a Toronto Saturday. Its two occupants waved and screamed for help but burned to death while a housewife watched, unable to rescue them.

The victims were identified as Charles McKay and John Bretner, both of Toronto. No one on the ground was hurt.

Mrs. Steve Babik was in the house with her two teen-age daughters, Ann and Olga.

"I tried to figure what to do, but things happened too fast," she said. "I watched the men burn to death before I could do anything to help. It was awful."
