

Portland Hosts Gals Amateur Classic

Star-Studded Field Starts Action Today

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland's first rain in 56 days helped put the picturesque Waverly Country Club course in top condition Sunday for the start of the 52nd Women's National Amateur Golf Championship Monday.

With virtually all the top-rank stars of women's golf on hand, the course as much as the competition was expected to be a deciding factor in the week-long match play tournament.

Waverly isn't an overly long course, but it is one which puts a premium on accuracy and putting. And the two finishing holes along the Willamette River can be brutally long for the girl golfers if the wind happens to be blowing from the south and checking their shots.

Many Hazards
The 17th hole is 510 yards and the 18th 566 and the river bank marks out of bounds along the right side of each. In all, there are out-of-bounds hazards on more than half the 18 holes and thick woods parallel a couple of others. Even though it was kept well watered and green during the near-record drought, the course is hard and the rolling greens are lightning fast.

Nevertheless the stars managed to post some notable scores in an informal team match Saturday. With the aid of a hole-in-one on the 130 yard 14th hole, Carol Dinger of Tiffin, O., shot an individual round of 71 and teamed with Mary Agnes Wall of Menominee, Mich., for a best-ball score of 66. Grace De Moss of Corvallis, and Edean Anderson of Helena, recent winner of the Canadian women's amateur title, had a best ball of 71.

Women's par for the 6,323-yard Waverly course is 36-73.

Kirby Defending Champ
The entire field, even including Defending Champion Dorothy Kirby of Atlanta, will play in an 18-hole qualifying round Monday. The 64 low scorers will start match play Tuesday. All matches are at 18 holes except Saturday's 36-hole final.

Originally there were 162 entries, the lowest total since 1949, and more than 150 are expected to start Monday.

Challenging Miss Kirby for the title are such notable golfing gals as Claire Poran of Cleveland, runner-up last year; Mae Murray of Rutland, Vt., who outlasted all her Curtis Cup teammates in going to the semi-finals of the British women's championship last spring; Former Champion Grace Lenzky of Newington, Conn., and little Polly Riley of Fort Worth, Tex., and Mary Ann Downey of Baltimore, winner and runner-up in the Women's Western Amateur a few weeks ago.

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Extortionist Fails to Keep Date

FBI Trap Futile After Kiner Gets Death Threat

PITTSBURGH (AP) — FBI agents Sunday sought an extortionist who used a death threat in an effort to chisel \$3,200 from Ralph Kiner, home-run hitting left fielder for the Pittsburgh Pirates.

More than 20 FBI agents laid a trap for the extortionist at a rendezvous point at nearby Ambridge Saturday morning. One agent, who closely resembles Kiner, passed as the ball player.

But the trap was not sprung. Either the man who wrote Kiner, demanding "money or your life," got cold feet or never did intend to show up.

Kiner said he received the letter last Wednesday while going over his fan mail. It was marked "very important."

Down on Luck
The writer said he was idled by the recent steel strike, lost money gambling and wrote bad checks. He demanded Kiner take \$3,200 in small bills in a taxicab to a spot near Ambridge. Then Kiner was to leave the cab. The extortionist apparently planned to be on the watch, hail the cab and make off with the money.

The letter told Kiner: "I'll shoot you and you'll make a good target in left field."

Agents are considering the possibility the letter was the work of a crank. Kiner, who admitted he was nervous when he played Saturday—and banged out his 27th homer—was quoted as saying: "If anybody had shot off a firecracker in left field all you probably would have seen out there was a pair of shoes."
