School Board Rules on Bus Boundaries

New boundaries for bus transportation zones affecting junior high students of Salem School District were set Tuesday night by the school board at a meeting in the Public School Administration Building.

Principal change is in the south where the bus routes will serve pupils south from Madrona Avenue on both sides of the Pacific Highway, a boundary several blocks farther south than the present Hansen Avenue boundary. The new boundary extends east of 12th Street along Bruce Avenue.

To the north and east the buses will serve junior high and high school pupils living east of the new bypass highway from State Street to within 600 feet of Silverton Road and northeast of a line from there to the nearest corner of the State Fairgrounds.

School Sketches
Preliminary sketches of a proposed new elementary school south of city limits between South 12th and the Pacific Highway will be shown by Architect W. I. Williams at the board's Sept. 8 meeting, it was announced.

Tuition was set at \$250 per child, including bus transportation, for the 12 school children of Spring Valley district who this year will enter Salem schools. Elementary pupils will go to Zena or Lincoln (Polk County) Schools and seventh and eighth graders to West Salem Junior High.

Bids Rejected
Bids on auto and truck tires were rejected on recommendation of the supplies committee that market prices had declined since the bids arrived. The committee advised that tires be bought as needed.

The board hired two elementary teachers, Mrs. Hilda Fox Prince for Pringle and Mrs. Lorraine J. Rowe for McKinley. Both are Salem women. Mrs. Prince having taught last year at Lincoln school at Four Corners, and Mrs. Rowe at Tigard.

A committee study of a suitable water line for irrigation of the Baker Street Playground was ordered. The area will be seeded this fall.

The board authorized acceptance of a new intercommunication system at McKinley School, offered as a gift from a parents' organization. The school district would provide necessary wiring.

School Opens Bids On 2,000 Gallons Of Ice Cream

Two thousand gallons of ice cream and 180,000 ice cream cups were the subject of bidding Tuesday night before the board of Salem School District. The ice cream would be used in the various school cafeterias during the coming school year.

Arden Farms was low bidder in the overall bid, at \$8,170. De-Luxe Ice Cream Co., with a total bid of \$8,280, entered the low bid on bulk ice cream, at \$1.14 per gallon. The First Congressional District's For Dixie Sups Arden bid 39 cents a dozen and De-Luxe 40 cents.

Dairy Co-operative, only other bidder, totaled \$9,160. The bids were referred to the board's supplies committee.

Outbreak of Encephalitis Held Unlikely

PORTLAND (P)—Disease bearing mosquitoes, responsible for an outbreak of sleeping sickness in Northern California, have been controlled in the Portland area, Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee reported Tuesday.

This year's control program has been a success despite an almost unprecedented hatch of larvae, she said.

Dr. S. B. Osgood, epidemiologist for the State Board of Health, said that it was unlikely that the sleeping sickness — encephalitis — epidemic of California would develop in Oregon this year.

"August is the month for disease-carrying mosquitoes and it now is close to the end of the season. We could have a few cases but I doubt any wide-spread epidemic," he said.

Balloon Freed At Tillamook

TILLAMOOK, Ore. (P)—A huge plastic balloon was cruising across country at 35,000 feet Tuesday after being launched at this Oregon coastal town.

A group of scientists employed by General Mills launched the balloon despite foul weather. The balloon carries special instruments designed to study high-altitude radio wave characteristics.

This is the first balloon to be released during the current experiment. In the past similar balloons have been blamed for many flying saucer reports in the Pacific Northwest. Five more balloons will be released in the next few weeks in these tests being conducted for the Navy.

In defeating Rankin in their merged congressional districts, Abernethy said, "we have for 10 years been a close friend to our distinguished and honorable opponent... I regret we found ourselves in the same district, thus making our opposition unavoidable."

TV Hearing In Portland Asked of FCC

WASHINGTON (P)—The communications commission will be asked to hold hearings in Portland, Ore., on applications to operate four proposed television stations there, an attorney said Tuesday.

Attorney Abe Stein told FCC Examiner Elizabeth C. Smith he would file a petition with the commission asking that non-technical testimony be heard in Portland.

This followed a pre-hearing conference, called by Mrs. Smith to iron out as many problems as possible before hearings in the scramble for TV channels begins here October 1.

More than 40 attorneys, representing nine companies, attended the conference. At least three more applicants are expected to enter the case.

Lt. Sullivan Plagued With Ship Trouble

First Lt. Robert B. Sullivan may get home to Salem soon, if the ships hold out. He's been involved with two or three so far in getting back from a year's Army duty in Korea.

Associated Press dispatches Tuesday said he would arrive in Seattle today aboard the Navy transport Marine Lynx.

But Sullivan had called his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Sullivan, 635 N. Summer St., Saturday night that he was on the transport Pvt. Joe Martinez, which then was laid up at Honolulu for repairs and expected to get under way again this week.

He also said he have been aboard another ship in a Japanese harbor, bound for the U.S., but the ship developed trouble and never left port, causing a six-day delay. Whether that was the Marine Lynx or another craft wasn't known here.

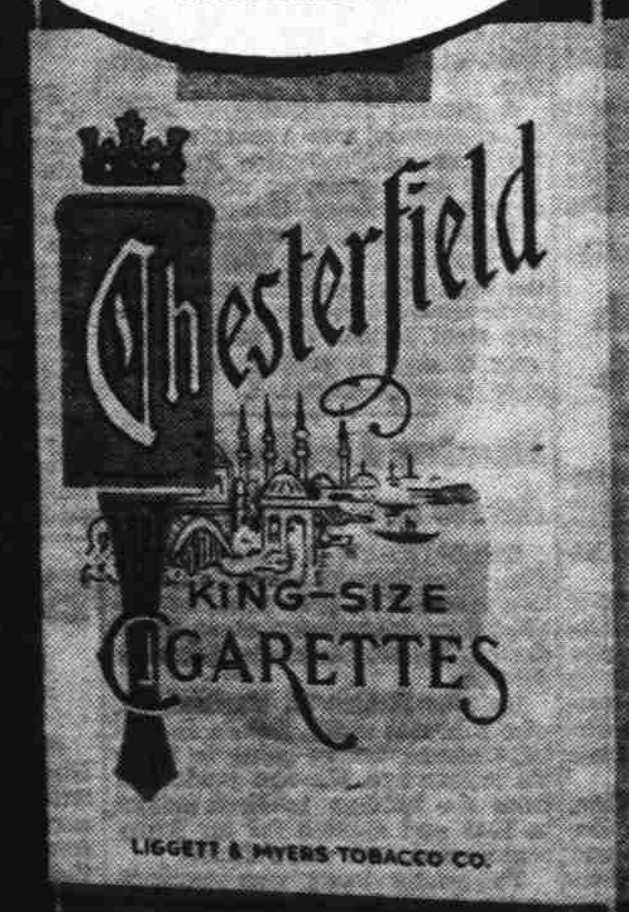
