

Favorites Capture First Matches, Gals Amateur

DeMoss Among Day's Victors

Kirby, Lenczyk Show Class in 1st Tests

PORTLAND (AP)—Dorothy Kirby and Grace Lenczyk, the only champions in the field, showed the less experienced players how it's done Tuesday as they breezed through their first round matches in the Women's National Amateur golf championship.

Miss Kirby, the defending champion and this year's medalist from Atlanta, whipped Mrs. Frank T. Fisk of Portland, 4 and 3, and Miss Lenczyk, 1948 winner from Newington, Conn., routed Mrs. Naomi Kidd of Portland, 7 and 6, to set the pace in a day remarkably free of first round upsets.

Although a couple of nationally-known golfers were eliminated by strong rivals and others had close calls, there was only one real upset recorded in 32 matches. That came when pretty 14-year-old Anne Quast of Everett, Wash., overcame a shaky spell to turn back Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Richmond, Calif., the Trans-Mississippi titleholder and former Oregon State champion, on the 19th hole.

Advancing along with the two champions were five members of the 1952 Curtis Cup international team and virtually all the other favorites. Only one of the Curtis Cuppers was eliminated. Pat O'Sullivan, the judge's daughter, from Orange, Conn., went down, 3 and 2, before Seattle's Pat Lesser, the pigtailed champion of the Pacific Northwest.

Grace DeMoss of Corvallis, Ore.; Polly Riley of Fort Worth, Tex.; Marjorie Lindsay of Decatur, Ill.; Mae Murray of Rutland, Vt.; and Claire Dorian of Cleveland, Ohio, were runner-up to Miss Kirby, made it almost a clean sweep for the Cup team. The closest margin was Miss Murray's 2 and 1 over Jacqueline Yates of Lanikai, Hawaii.

Setting up a series of red hot second and third round matches Wednesday, such favorites as Helen Sigel of Philadelphia, 1948 runner-up to Miss Lenczyk; Barbara Romack, 19-year-old California champion and co-medalist last year with Carol Diringer of Tiffin, O., the girl she beat Tuesday; Mary Ann Downey of Baltimore, runner-up in the past two Women's Western championships; Pat Garner of Midland, Tex., second in Monday's qualifying round, and Katharine McKinnon of Lake Worth, Fla., also won.

Only two players, Miss Sigel and Miss Lenczyk, offered any threat to the women's par of 36-37-73 for the tricky 6,323-yard Waverly Country Club course.

Truman Invited To Jones Fete

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman was invited Tuesday to attend the National Celebrities Golf Tournament next month and speak at a banquet honoring Bobby Jones.

The invitation was extended by Tom Webb, general chairman of the tournament to be held here Sept. 18-21, and Joe Lynch, chairman of the banquet on the night of Sept. 20.

The tournament is sponsored by the Washington Post and the Professional Golf Association for the benefit of underprivileged children.

The sponsors want Truman to present a plaque to Jones as the "top amateur golfer" of all time. The president was represented as saying that if he can make it he wants to attend the banquet.

Joey Stymied By Suspension

NEW YORK (AP)—The state athletic commission Tuesday suspended light heavyweight champion Joey Stymied until he goes through with a title defense against Britain's Randy Turpin in London.

The 30-year-old 175-pound king and his manager, Jack Kearns, both were suspended indefinitely for their present refusal to defend the crown against Turpin in London this September under the promotion of England's Jack Solomons.

New Bevo Park Not Likely Now

PORTLAND (AP)—Bill Mulligan, general manager of the Portland Beaver baseball club, said Tuesday he would not recommend construction of a new ball park now.

He gave high cost of materials and labor plus the general falling off of baseball attendance as his reasons.

He said that at present costs it would take 1 1/2 million dollars to erect the stadium.

The club had planned to build the new park but the plans were shelved by government restrictions after the Korean War broke out. The government recently announced that it planned to lift its ban on recreational construction next April.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Rogers Hornsby, new Cincinnati Reds manager and former pilot of the Pacific Coast League Seattle Rainiers, thinks right well of Cal Abrams, an outfielder the Reds purchased from Brooklyn June 8.

"Abrams is doing right well out there," Hornsby told a reporter Tuesday.

The southpaw outfielder generally plays in center field, but at times is shifted to left.

At bat 98 times in 49 games for Cincinnati, Abrams has made 30 hits, knocked in nine runs, and is batting .306. He has been used as the lead-off batter.

The new manager also is sold on Roy McMillan, 22-year-old shortstop.

NEW YORK (AP)—A couple of curve-balling southpaws, Bobby Shantz of the Philadelphia Athletics and Cincinnati's Ken Raffensberger shared top billing in major league earned run effectiveness Tuesday.

Statistics compiled by the Associated Press show that Shantz has permitted 46 earned runs in 229 innings for the lowest ERA in the American League, 1.81. Figures include Monday's games.

The Philadelphia phenom has compiled 22 victories, most in the majors, and has hurled four shutouts. He is seeking to become pitching's first triple crown winner since 1936 when Carl Hubbell of the Giants—also a left-hander—led in victories, won-lost percentage and earned run efficiency.

Raffensberger, a crafty veteran, is the National League's earned run leader with 2.51 average. The 35-year-old Redleg hurler has yielded 58 earned runs in 208 innings.

Now appearing with his fourth National League club, Raffy has posted an impressive 14-11 record, including five shutouts. A control artist, he has given up only 38 bases on balls with the sixth-place Reds.

Ontario Star Leads Tourney

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—Nick Weslock of Windsor, Ontario, chopped eight strokes off par 72 on the tumbled 6,804 yards of the Capilano Golf Course Tuesday and took over the role of favorite after Robert Roos of San Francisco knocked out defending champion Walt McElroy, 3 and 2, in the Canadian Amateur Tournament.

By a flock of United States Standouts still were very much in the running as the second round ended. Billy Campbell, the unsuccessful politician of Huntington, W. Va., bumped out Mel Galletta of St. Albans, N. Y., 2 and 1, and Sammy Urzetta of East Rochester, N. Y., advanced to third round by default.

Ed Johnston of Towson, Md., was nearly as torrid as Weslock, who whipped Mike Banks of Seattle, 9 and 8. Five under par for 10 holes, Johnson closed out R. W. Porter of Vancouver, 10 and 8.
