Pamphlet Fund Sought For Mailing

Call for a meeting of the state emergency board to consider allocation of \$40,000 to pay the cost of printing and sending out voters' pamphlets for the November election, was urged by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry in a letter to the state finance department Thursday.

In a previous statement Newberry had warned he would send out only such pamphlets as could be printed and mailed with available funds, which are not expected to cover the entire cost this year.

Newberry advised Finance Department Director Harry Dorman he is unwilling to authorize any expenditure in his department in excess of the regularly appropriated funds.

Newberry advised Dorman that he went before the joint ways and means committee of the 1951 legislature where he advocated free distribution of the pamphlets in every area of the state instead of mailing them. The free delivery, Newberry said, could be made through county clerks, chambers of commerce and other agencies.

It also was pointed out that many thousands of these pamphlets are not delivered because of faulty addresses and other thousands of pamphlets are wasted by sending three or more copies to the same home.

Playgrounds Closing Today

Salem public playgrounds will close today for the summer and the two swimming pools will close at 6 p. m. Saturday.

Final activity under the supervised program for playgrounds at nine neighborhood centers will be a picnic at each place at noon Friday.

Closing announcement was made by Vernon Gilmore, director of the summertime program, financed jointly by the city and Salem school district.

Oregon grade schools will have 230 student-manned safety patrols at school crossings when classes resume next month, the State Traffic Safety Division said Thursday.

About 2,500 pupils serve in these patrols. The state gives them their uniform belts, helmets, badges and flags.
