Damages Suit Blames Salem Auto Accident

Injuries allegedly sustained in an auto accident by an already-handicapped Salem woman are the subject of a \$20,000 damage suit filed Friday in Marion County Circuit Court.

Beth Sellwood, Salem Route 2, founder and former president of the Chin-Up Club for the physically handicapped, filed the suit against Wallace C. Wilson.

She asked for \$20,000 general and \$249.60 special damages for injuries in a collision last March 5 at Church and Market Streets between cars driven by her father and Wilson. The injuries allegedly included contusions, muscle strain and aggravation of existing muscular dystrophy.

Marketing Agency Vote Set Sept. 12

Production and Marketing Administration farmer - committee elections for Marion County will be held between September 3 and 12, William Tate, county committee chairman, reported Friday.

Ballots are being mailed to all Marion County farmers who are known to be eligible to vote in these elections. To be counted ballots must bear a postmark not later than September 12, 5 p.m.

A farmer is eligible to vote if he is an owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper of a farm and is participating in or carrying out practices in accord with the program administered by the PMA committee. Farmers who are eligible but who do not receive a ballot by September 5, should notify the county PMA committee.

County committeemen, a delegate to a county convention to name the 1953 county committee, and alternates will be named in this election.

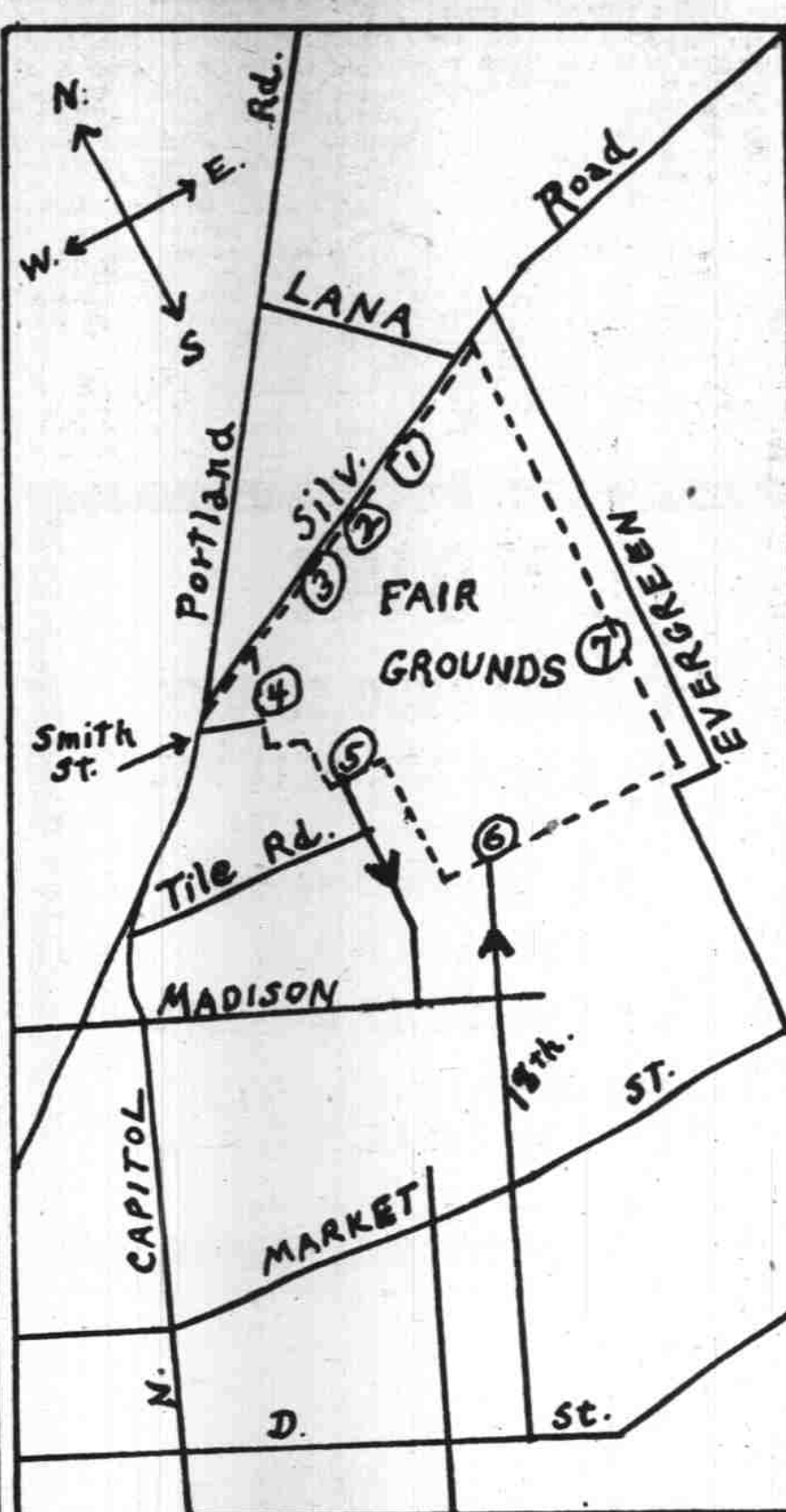

Fair Traffic Rules Set



1½ mile face 2-3-61—Fair — Traffic to and from the State Fair won't pose too many problems if a few pertinent regulations are remembered.

There are four gates for cars into the fairgrounds, 1, 2 and 3 on Silvertown Road and gate 4 entering from 18th Street.

The Silvertown gates, at peak hours, at times may be reachable only from the north, via Lana Avenue, if the Silvertown and Portland Roads junction becomes overcrowded.

Three lanes of traffic will go into the grounds from 18th Street—the left lane for exhibitors' and service vehicles.

The 18th Street route will be one-way from Madison Street,

into the fairgrounds, except after 9 p.m. when cars also may leave the grounds via this route. Cars leaving the fairgrounds prior to that hour will leave via the Silvertown Road gates or gate 5 leading into 16th Street, which will be one-way south to Madison Street.

Pedestrians may enter at car gates 2 (on Silvertown Road), 3 (at 16th Street) and 4 (at 18th Street), and also at gate 4, near Smith Street. Gate 4 is for pedestrians only.

Salem police will have a special traffic detail to assist the traffic movement.

Accused Man At Albany Had Prison Record

ALBANY—Norman Mickey, 56, Albany used car lot manager, will be arraigned Tuesday on a first degree murder charge, Deputy District Attorney Raymond Matthews reported Tuesday.

The murder charge stemmed from a purported altercation here Wednesday in which Cecil W. Wynn, 48, Albany auto salesman, was fatally wounded. Police said he was struck over the head with a board.

Meanwhile, Sheriff Mike Southard reported records show that Mickey has a record of two prior convictions in California. Southard said Mickey was released March 31, 1936, from Folsom Prison where he had been sentenced to serve up to 14 years on a felony charge. The sheriff said the other conviction was for grand larceny and that Mickey was paroled from San Quentin on Sept. 21, 1921.

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Guard Protest Over Food at Prison Heard

A complaint over the food for hired personnel at the Oregon State Penitentiary led several guards Friday to turn in their meal tickets in protest.

Warden Virgil J. O'Malley said that the complaint was lodged by "one or two guards."

"Background of the complaint," Warden O'Malley explained, "started some years ago when four or five choices in the main course were provided at each meal in the prison cafeteria. In order to cut the budget, when I first came to Salem I trimmed the varieties down to two choices."

"Friday at the noon meal one of the choices wasn't prepared in time to be served," the warden said, "so a couple of complainants turned in their cards."

The warden insisted that food sold to hired personnel is a "good reasonable meal for the price; not lavish as some think it should be." Cost of the tickets to personnel is \$8 for 30 meals.

There was no great absence of guards at the evening meal, O'Malley pointed out.
