Womanly Competition

Cakes, Cookies Compete at Fair; Woman's Department Has New Paint

"Now when I enter my hand crocheted curtains with the baby blue butterflies in the State Fair!" are sad and off-spoke words and you should smile when you say them, Sister. From the first state fair conceived away back when Oregon was rugged and knitting was a matter of necessity rather than recreation, women have firmly believed that their own handwork was better than the sweepstakes prizewinner.

Friday we had a sneak preview of the woman's department and saw all the cakes and breads, brightly wrapped in aluminum for freshness sake, awaiting the judging hour. The attractively decorated cooked foods department has given the competitive cook new importance. A few years ago her products were relegated to the far corner, away behind the pieced quilts and crocheted baby blankets.

NEW PAINT

Now the department is well arranged, display shelves are especially designed, and there's room to walk around and view the products. It's really quite a nice show.

Friday several women were carefully arranging their cookies and candies on plates, to give them the best advantages during the judging. The cakes looked good even through the aluminum foil wrappings.

Canning, freezing and cooking experts are giving demonstrations throughout the day at set intervals for the added interest of women fair-goers. This will be a fine opportunity to ask questions of the demonstrators, each an expert in her line, and representing some well known manufacturer.

UPS AND DOWNS

Years have not only changed the way of arranging, but the type of needlework entered in the textile division. Crocheted bedspreads have given way almost entirely to crocheted tablecloths and room-sized braided rugs are no longer a novelty but have improved in beauty and workmanship in the past few years.

It may be a matter only of the perspective, for some of the articles which failed to win as crocheted bedspreads one year, made another try as tablecloths, according to the amused attendant. After all, she said, who has a better right to decide what handwork is than it's creator.

Sixteen years ago we entered some weaving, and were the only entrant, winning all the prizes. This year the weaving display is large and effective.

ROOM SIZED

Several good looking room sized woven wool rugs are among the entries, another oldtime art that's being revived — and with modern improvements.

The exhibit of applied and pieced quilts no longer looks like the Monday wash, but has become a display of attractive examples of woman's handiwork.

While the afghan seems to have diminished in popularity, the baby clothes department has taken on new importance, due perhaps to the return of the large family and the accompanying interest in outfitting the children.

Volume in entries has stood up well, say the officials in the textile department, and the quality of work has greatly improved in the past years. Many new names are listed among the entrants too — so after all, some of the woman who last year wondered why they didn't enter, very probably did.

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Hamman Stage Line Seeks Fare Changes

Proposed changes in passenger fares between Salem, Bend and North Santiam Canyon points served by Hamman Stage Lines will be the subject of a public hearing at 10 a.m. Monday, Sept. 29, in room 210 of the State Public Service Building.

The hearing, ordered by Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel, follows a petition for rate changes which the stage line filed July 14.

The proposed fares, as listed by the commission, would increase fares between Salem and Bend from \$3.75 to \$4.20 for one-way and from \$6.25 to \$7.60 for a round trip.

Other proposed rates would increase one-way fares between Salem and other points as follows: Aumsville, 35 to 45 cents; Sublimity, 50 to 65 cents; Stayton, 55 to 75 cents; Mehama, 75 cents to \$1; Lyons, 80 cents to \$1.05; Mill City, \$1 to \$1.25; Detroit Dam, \$1.60 to \$1.70; Detroit, \$1.60 to \$1.90; Breitenbush, \$2 to \$2.65, and Idanha, \$1.80 to \$2.15.

Rate changes for round-trip tickets and between intermediate points also are proposed.
