

Farm Produce Drop Sends Costs Upward

Some of the increased cost of food was charged to decreasing farm produce said a report sent to the state emergency board which is meeting here Friday in which handling of food at the Oregon State Penitentiary was criticized.

The report said that produce from the prison farm decreased in value from \$175,032 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1951, to \$151,883 for the year ended June 30, 1952.

The report said produce from farm inmates have always been favorably treated insofar as food was concerned. The main line mess, the report said, shows the greatest increase in dollar volume.

"The Guard's Kitchen with food costs as high as \$1.699 per man per day for a six months average appears excessive," the report said.

The report said the women's ward, which takes its own meals, appears to be well operated from a culinary standpoint. Food costs in the women's quarters show only a slight fluctuation.

The report recommended:

1. A dietary standard for the various kitchens of the Penitentiary should be established by the board of control.
2. More effective internal budget control is necessary.
3. Farm operations should be placed on a separate fund basis, preferably under the prison industries.
4. More effective stores control should be exercised.
5. Appointment of a competent food manager should be of immediate concern to the institution.
6. The present root house and receiving warehouse should be cleaned out and used for their original purpose.

Emergency Board Members said they wanted to read the report carefully before taking any action.

Funeral Set For Victim Of Accident

Funeral services for 17-year-old Charles Ross Hughes, Salem High School student who died Thursday evening in a California Packing Co. steam cooker, were set for 11 a.m. Monday in the Virgil T. Golden Chapel.

The youth's family has requested friends to send contributions to St. Mark's Lutheran Church youth program in lieu of flowers. The Rev. John L. Cauble will officiate at the services and interment will be in City View Cemetery.

Neither police nor company officials have yet learned how the youth allowed himself to get trapped in the cooker, known as a retort. He died when 260-degree steam was fed into the cylindrical room.

A coroner's report Friday indicated that there was no evidence of a fall which might have caused the youth temporarily to lose consciousness. Company officials said that when the retort is closed, all light is shut off and the youth would have known that the heavy metal doors were closed.

Eric Nelson, head cook on the shift, was in a state of collapse most of Friday and was unable to be questioned by officers.

Plant Superintendent Percy Blundell said that it was such an unusual and unheard type of accident as to be almost impossible. He said he could not recall another of that nature in his nearly 40 years of cannery experience.

Besides his mother, Mrs. Verda McKinney of Salt Lake City, Utah, and his father, Ross J. Hughes of 1884 Evergreen Ave., Salem, the youth is survived by a sister, Suzanne Hughes, 9, of Salem; grandmothers, Mrs. M. M. Hughes of Gillette, Wyo., and Mrs. C. C. Wallick of Laramie, Wyo.

Owners Agree To Slaughter Diseased Hogs

Settlement of the controversy, involving indemnity for vesicular exanthema infected hogs ordered slaughtered by E. L. Peterson, state agricultural director, was announced following a conference in Governor Douglas McKay's office here late Friday.

Governor McKay said he would recommend to the legislature in his biennial message legislation authorizing the state to join with the federal government in indemnifying owners of hogs or other livestock condemned because of disease.

Peterson said he was in full accord with the principle of the state reimbursing its citizens whenever the state used its police powers to condemn animals.

Following the conference, James Bigelow, owner of the B. and B. hog ranch in North Portland, said he would comply to the condemnation order.

Peterson had brought legal action to enforce the slaughter order while Bigelow had promised a legal battle to resist the condemnation suit.

The federal government will pay half of the indemnity. Approximately 480 infected hogs are in the state at the present time.

There will be considerable salvage from the hogs ordered slaughtered by Peterson.

Attorney General George Neundel held that state funds could not be used to indemnify hog owners without further legislation.

Bigelow owns all but 100 of the hogs infected with the disease and included in Peterson's order.

Registration Hints Record School Count

Registration of Salem public school elementary pupils Friday indicated enrollment would be as expected, nearly 300 more than last year.

This was the report from Superintendent Frank B. Bennett after some 4,000 boys and girls reported to their schools Friday morning to be signed up officially for the school year starting Monday at 9 a.m.

The registration-day figure, was 292 above last year's. School officials estimate that registration represents about 76 per cent of actual enrollment to come.

Last year Salem public schools enrolled well over 8,000 students, including 4,500 elementary pupils, in the first month of classes. To meet expected enrollment in-rush this year, the Salem district hired 12 additional teachers.

Superintendent Bennett said no serious overload problems were apparent, but first grades at several schools are being watched closely for possible adjustment.

At the new Hoover School east of Salem 184 registered. Another 40 pupils are expected to enroll at the nine-teacher school. At new Rosedale School, just being completed, registration was deferred to Monday.

The teaching staff as planned should be sufficient for the enrollment. Bennett predicted on the basis of the registration.

Junior and senior high pupils were not required to register this week, but they report for class-work at the same time as elementary students, 9 a.m. Monday.

Fines Handed Out To Campy, Jackie

BOSTON (P) — Roy Campanella and Jackie Robinson, the Brooklyn Dodgers' Negro stars, were fined \$100 and \$75 respectively by National League president Warren Giles Friday for arguing with umpires. Campanella's fine resulted from his ejection by umpire Frank Secora here Thursday night.

Robinson drew punishment for a post-game argument with umpire Larry Goetz. Robinson's immediate reaction indicated he would refuse to pay the fine until Giles gave him a hearing.

Austria Peace Draft Session Set in London

WASHINGTON (P) — The United States, Britain and France Friday proposed to meet with Russia in London Sept. 29 to discuss a new draft of a peace treaty for Austria.

To meet Russia's demands, the Big Three Western powers reluctantly agreed to limit Austria's armed forces to 53,000 troops and police once a four-power treaty is signed.

The three Western governments also bowed to Russia's insistence that specific guarantees be included in any treaty providing for basic freedoms, free elections and dissolving of any Nazi-like organizations.

The American - British - French proposals were delivered in formal notes to the Russian foreign office in Moscow. The Western move represented a joint effort to prod Russia into agreeing to an Austrian pact.
