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## Tossed Around

### Salad of Greens and Herbs Good For Autumn Meals; Vary Lettuce

If you're a home gardener, or if the grocer can supply you with the makings, you may be serving tossed green salads these days.

This is the time of year when the herb garden really comes into use, for we realize that soon the best of the herbs will be gone and it will be necessary to use the dried ones. The maker of tossed green salads is one who has a touch of imagination and a sense of taste. And (and very often he) is proud of the talent for tossing together crisp greenery and adding just the right amount of this and that to bring forth requests for the recipe, of which there is none.

Most home gardens have chives or mint, whether or not the herb fever has infected the gardener. Then as the urge to look into herb growing has struck the one who gardens plants of dill, rosemary sage, thyme, anise, fennel, basil and a host of others have appeared in the garden.

**LIMIT THE NUMBER**  
Luckily the rule is, use no more than three herbs, which saves the face of the gardener. Fortunately the fancy grocery stores now offer dried herbs which may be used if the fresh ones are unavailable.

The grocer usually has several greens to offer for the tossed salad, varying according to the time of year, lettuce, escarole, endive, dandelions, spinach, cress, several kinds of cabbage and romaine.

Use only the tender end of herbs and bruise them with the fingers. Discard the larger leaves. The general rule for dressing is three parts olive or other good oil, one part tarragon or wine vinegar and salt and pepper to taste.

One writer on foods suggests combining mint and chives on a lettuce salad. She heaps a broken head of lettuce in a large bowl then mixes an ample amount of chives and sprigs of spearmint and adds them to the dressing. She pours it over the lettuce and garnishes with hard cooked egg slices.

Here's another salad using herbs:

**TOMATO-AND-THYME SALAD**  
Heap romaine that has been pulled apart in the salad bowl. Add a garlicked chapon of bread. Slice in two peeled tomatoes, add several paper-thin slices of onion separated into rings. Sprinkle 10 thyme tips, cut them up and add. Dress with basic dressing.

These are the American versions of tossed salads, but looking in the French cookbooks one finds how far away we have gone from the continental idea of tossed greens. The French cook works hard on the salad, and turns out a subtly flavored affair. The American salad maker goes at it with abandon and makes fun of it. Perhaps ours is more to the liking of the American lass or perhaps we could produce a better salad if more careful planning was done. Anyway, we'll discuss the French salad in a story later.
