Death Claims Mrs. Steenhout

Mrs. Celine Steenhout, a native of Belgium and a former resident of Detroit and Cornelius, Ore., died Friday in a local hospital where she had been ill for a year and a half.

Mrs. Steenhout, born in Belgium Dec. 20, 1878, came to the United States in 1914, just before the outbreak of World War I. She had married Frank Steenhout in Belgium in 1900.

They lived first in Korona, Kans., and came to Oregon in 1920, settling first in Beaverton. Mrs. Steenhout came to Salem when she became ill a year and a half ago, and had been in the hospital since that time.

Besides the widower, she is survived by her son, Frank Steenhout Jr., of Cascadia; five grandchildren and a brother, Maurice Danan in Belgium.

Funeral services will be held in the Virgil T. Golden Chapel at 2:30 p.m. Monday, with Dr. Brooks H. Moore officiating. Interment will be in City View Cemetery.

Hirsch Draws Fine, Term in Jail for Fraud

A sentence of 120 days in jail and \$240 fine was issued Friday to Carl F. Hirsch, Portland, for making a false claim for the Oregon veterans' bonus.

District Judge Val D. Sloper of Marion County told Hirsch the fine was set at the amount he had tried fraudulently to get as a bonus.

Hirsch served four days after the Oregon National Guard entered federal service in 1940, then was discharged for an injury. He claimed two years and four days of duty in his bonus application. The fraud was discovered by the bonus division, and Hirsch surrendered himself and pleaded guilty when he learned a criminal complaint had been filed.

Investigation by the court showed that Hirsch was with the Portland police department before his Army service and again from 1942 to 1950, when he was pensioned because of disability. His six children by a divorced wife are in two children's homes, with part of his pension going to their support. He is separated from his second wife.

The bonus division said other cases of suspected fraud in applications are under investigation. Hirsch's was the first to get to court.

Realtors Hear Officer From Broker Group

The worth that men can make out of a chunk of iron, or out of themselves, was portrayed to Salem Board of Realtors at the first fall luncheon Friday by Charles L. Paine of Portland.

He said the metal can be a worthless doorstop, or be made into horseshoes worth \$10, needles worth \$50,000 or watch springs worth \$50,000. Similar gains can be made by men, he urged.

Paine, vice president of the National Institute of Real Estate Brokers, called real estate men the "planners and fertilizers" of trade. It was announced that Coburn Grabenhorst, board president, will lead a delegation of six or seven Salem realtors to the state convention at Bend, beginning Sunday.

Train Hits Car, Couple Injured

An elderly couple escaped serious injury late Thursday when their car stalled in the path of a train at the Rosemont Street crossing of the Southern Pacific railroad in West Salem.

Mrs. Adolph Staab escaped from the car before it was hit by a slow-moving northbound freight, but her husband stayed in while the car was pushed about 150 feet. Mrs. Staab said she saw the train approaching and was able to get out but that her husband didn't have time. They reside at 1735 D St.

Both were treated for slight shock. The car was damaged on the left side and was towed away.

Voter Registration Week Set Sept. 26

Gov. Douglas McKay Friday designated the week of Sept. 26 as registration week throughout Oregon.

"I consider it a sad commentary on our evaluation of our freedoms that more than one-third of all Oregonians entitled to vote are too lethargic or too lazy to exercise their franchise at the polls," Gov. McKay said. He said Oregon ranks 38th in the nation in voter participation, and is lowest of all Western states.

Linn Officials Take Charge Of 2 Inmates

Both State Penitentiary inmates released this week by court order for new hearings have been taken over by Linn County authorities, the prison said Friday.

But it appeared that Helen Smith and Louis Theodore Hirschi will have to wait until October to gain hearings on whether they will be returned to the penitentiary. Circuit Judge Victor Olliver of Albany is on vacation.

Both were released on habeas corpus proceedings in Marion County Circuit Court as being imprisoned illegally since they were not granted court hearings when their probations were revoked.

Hirschi was doing time for forgery, to which he had pleaded guilty June 26, 1951, and the Smith woman was doing two years for issuing a check without sufficient funds, to which she pleaded guilty Aug. 10, 1951.

August Highway Toll Greatest For Year

Fifty persons died in traffic accidents in Oregon during August, making it the worst month so far this year. Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry said Friday.

There were 276 persons killed in the first eight months this year, or five more than in the similar period of last year.

Tenant Hurt In Apartment House Blaze

One man sustained slight burns and an apartment house was slightly damaged in an early morning fire Friday at 240 D St.

The injured man was Peter Higgins, resident of a first floor apartment who was burned slightly about the shoulder as he fled from the burning apartment.

He told firemen he awoke to see flames shooting up the wall and along the ceiling.

The fire started in a davenport and apparently had been smoldering for some time. Higgins said a lighted cigarette may have fallen from an ash tray.

An apartment above was also badly damaged, with other parts of the building sustaining water damage. Loss was not estimated.

The property is owned by George Meier, 334 N. Capitol St., believed to be vacationing in Canada.

Telephone Stock Sale Authorized By Commissioner

Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel authorized the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. to sell 105 million dollars worth of stocks and bonds to expand the company's property.

Similar permission has been given by the California public utilities commission. The company has to get the approval from each state in which it operates.

The order allows sale of \$70-\$75,000 worth of common stock to the company's stockholders, and 35 millions in 27-year bonds at competitive bidding.

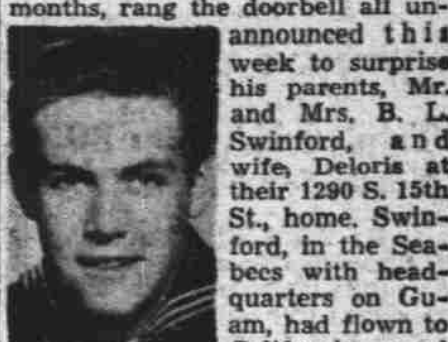
Richard C. Stillwell, district manager, said that Pogge also will confer with local officials on his visit here from Baltimore, Md.
