

# Roberts, Shantz Eye Flag Aspirants

## Top Pitchers Face Leaders In Big Drive

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball's two top pitchers—Philadelphia's Robin Roberts and Bobby Shantz—figure to be the key men in the twin battles for the major league pennants in a position to be the guys who can decide who will.

A look at the tense pennant races, together with a scrutiny of the balance of the schedules explains why. Three games separate the pace-setting Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants in the National League race. Each team has nine games left to play. The Giants must face the Phillies more times, three in Philadelphia and three in New York. That means they will see Roberts twice.

**Brooks Get Him Too**  
The Dodgers have three games with the Phillies, all in Brooklyn. Undoubtedly, Roberts will oppose them in one of the games.

In the American League, the front-running New York Yankees lead the Cleveland Indians by 2½ games with nine left to play. Six of these are against the tough Athletics. Barring illness or injury, Shantz will be firing at them twice, once in Philadelphia and once in New York.

Roberts, probably the No. 1 pitcher in the game, figures to be tougher than ever to beat. With 25 games already in the bag, baseball's biggest winner is eager to pick up three more victories. That would make him the biggest winner in the National League since Dizzy Dean hung up 30 for the St. Louis Cardinals in 1934. Bucky Walters copied 27 for the Cincinnati Reds in 1939.

Five Out  
The big pitcher has been practically invincible against Brooklyn this year. He's already whipped the Brooks five for five, thrice at Ebbets Field.

The Yankees have no illusions about their two meetings with Shantz. They are the little southpaw is going to be as tough as ever to beat.

Then, too, like Roberts, we Bobby also has an incentive. He wants to be the first Philadelphia pitcher since Lefty Grove to win 25 games. Grove won that many in 1932. Shantz, with 23, needs two more. Should he get them, the Yankees may not be in the World Series.

Grants Pass, defending A-1 titlist and a member of District 6, is considered a possible repeater, although it will have rugged competition from Medford and Klamath Falls.

Marshfield, a 76-0 winner over Myrtle Point last week, also seems to have plenty of class. The Coast team begins District 5 play this week against Cottage Grove.

In District 1 and 2, including Portland public high schools, the annual jamboree is on tap Friday night. Central Catholic, Portland, meets Milwaukie in District 3 and Gresham plays Parkrose.

Hillsboro, favorite in District 4, meets Beaverton; while Baker plays La Grande and The Dalles meets Milton-Freewater in the top games in District 7.
