## Artesian Water Spurts From Eola Hills Well

Artesian water, a rarity in the Willamette Valley, has been struck in a well on the Roscoe Clark farm in Eola Hills by E. J. Studebaker, local well driller.

The water, flowing at the rate of nearly 70 gallons a minute, is in a basal formation at a depth of 225 feet, Studebaker reported. He said water was first struck at the 185 foot level and the artesian flow five feet deeper.

The Clark place is about five miles west of Salem at an elevation about 800 feet or higher. Clark said he may develop the area as a scenic sub-division.

## Cars Prowled In South End

Prowling of two cars along South Commercial Street Wednesday night were reported to city police.

Donald Adkins of 675 N. Church St., reported the loss of a leather brief case, valued at \$250, which he said was taken from his unlocked car near Leslie Street.

Placed in nomination for the two vacancies on the council for two-year terms were Cecil Omans, Edward Studder and Alvin Roberds. Seeking vacancies on the council for the two four-year terms are Chris Rais and Emil Romner. Rais and Omans are presently members of the council.
