

Cain Reveals Speaking Fees Aids Income

SEATTLE (AP) — A Seattle newspaper said Saturday Sen. Harry P. Cain had disclosed he supplements his official income by accepting fees, totaling about \$5,000 a year, for speaking engagements. Unless he did so, the Times quoted the Republican Senator as saying, he would not be able to carry on the minimum obligations of a Senator.

The Times said it had questioned other members of the Washington Congressional delegation about Sen. Warren G. Magnuson and asserted he had no special account to draw on Magnuson, in a Los Angeles speech Friday, joined the attack on Republican vice presidential nominee Richard Nixon for his use of an \$18,235 expense fund contributed by wealthy constituents, saying it was "not right."

The newspaper said Cain commented on Magnuson's statement as follows: "Mr. Magnuson's statement will be enjoyed thoroughly by many others as it is by me," he said. "Mr. Magnuson has given me reason to chuckle and remain amused for a long time to come."

Cain also defended Nixon's use of the controversial expense fund, the Times said. "Because I know how honest Dick Nixon is, I believe anyone who criticizes him simply doesn't understand the realities of life," the Senator quoted.

"I have never asked for, nor been given any additional money or expense account by any of my constituents. Were such money offered, however, from responsible people, and with no strings attached, I would accept it with the speed of light."

Corn Market Prices Ease

CHICAGO (AP)—Trading in grains this week was featured by closing out of September contracts and persistent weakness in corn. The September contracts wound up on a rather sour note. Compared with a week ago, all of them were down and corn was down the most. September corn sank to new seasonal lows practically every day as the country shipped in the yellow grain in substantial quantities.

For the week wheat ended 1 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher, corn 2 1/4-6 1/2 lower, oats 1/2-1 1/4 lower, rye 1 1/4 to 5 cents lower, soybeans 1 cent lower to 1 1/2 higher, and lard 15 to 40 cents a hundred pounds higher.

BUY FEWER CARS

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Australians are buying fewer motor cars and trucks than a year ago. The present level of new motor vehicle registrations is about 135,000 a year, says the Department of National Development. The 1951 record high of registrations was 205,604. At the end of 1951 Australia had one vehicle for 5.53 persons. This compared with 2.89 persons per vehicle in the United States.

Spirited Rally Spurs Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market ended its week with a spirited rally that erased earlier losses and pointed the list ahead.

This is the second time since the peak of the year was reached Aug. 7 that the market has turned upward after a steep slide. There is no doubt that the sell-off since early August has been a full-fledged reaction ending the summer rally.

And now there are many in Wall Street who are willing to bet that the reaction has ended and the market is ready for a new try at a fall recovery. The market turned ahead Friday with a fine demonstration of spirited buying at the close to bring average up 10 cents on the day to 116.00. That is \$1.10 above the lowest point of the present reaction reached last Monday.

The week's volume was not outstanding—less than five and a half billion shares. The previous week it was a little above six billion.
