Charles Maxey, Portland Negro leader and former member of the executive board of the Oregon Young Republicans, said disclosure of the \$18,000 expense fund for Sen. Nixon, GOP vice presidential nominee, led him to change his mind.

He added that he was uneasy in his mind earlier about the advice apparently being given Gen. Eisenhower on national affairs and civil rights.

Maxey said he would remain registered as a Republican, but would work and vote for Stevenson.

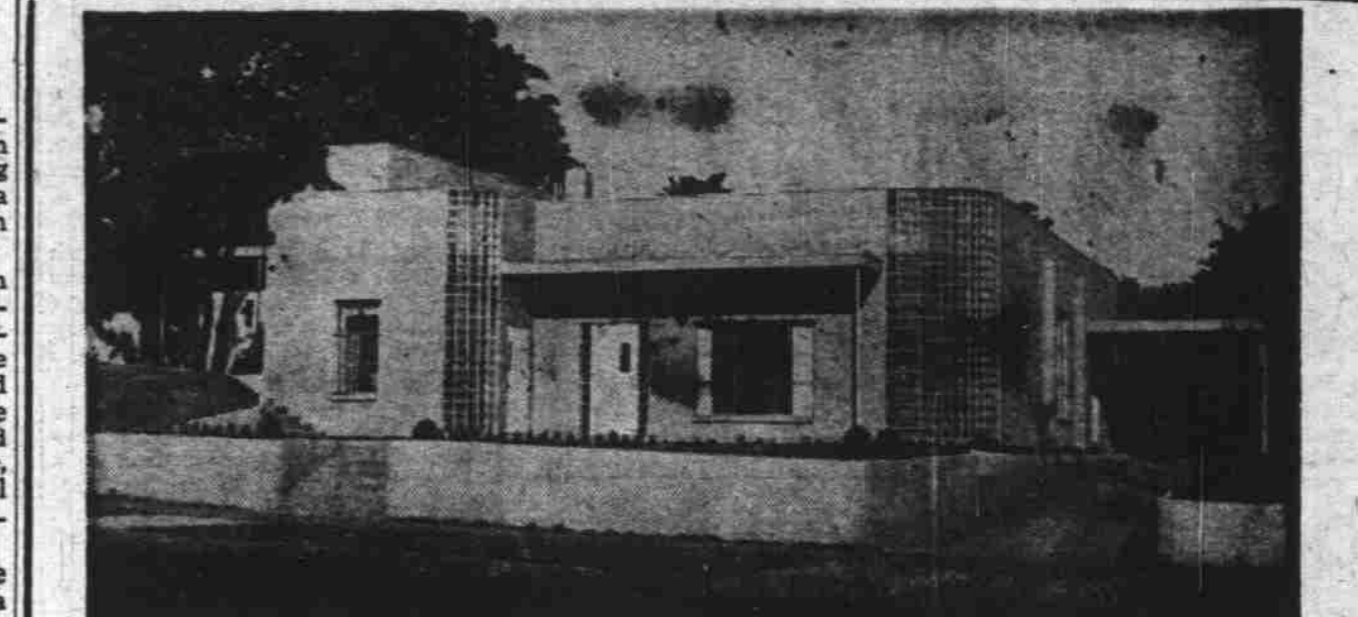
# Townsend Clubs to Hold District Meeting

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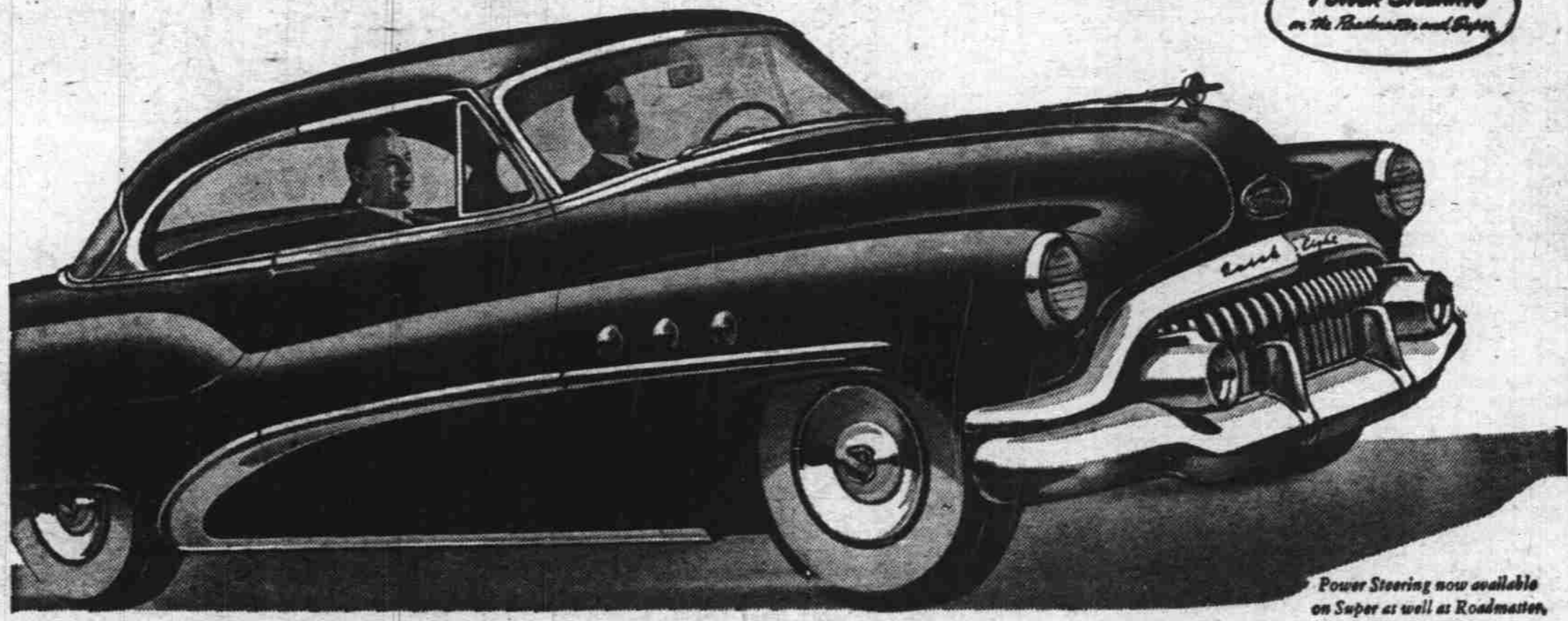
