## It's Strawberry Time Again



Most Marshall strawberries are much too early for a State Fair exhibit, but these were too late. The big, red berries are some of the unusual late crop grown by Anna Wiener shown holding the carrier, near Gervais.

## Berry Fields North of Salem In Production

Pickers for strawberries which aren't supposed to be there at this time of year, but are heavier and sweeter than during the regular season, are being sought now by a Gervais woman.

Anna Wiener never grew berries before this year, but the plants, also new, surprised her and swamped her with work. She has an estimated two tons to the acre. The variety is Marshalls, which ordinarily bear during the early summer.

The U-pick berries are on the farm of John Zeller, Miss Wiener's brother, on Gervais Route 1, a mile east of the Checkerboard service station.

She planted six acres, hoed and watered them herself, lost more than a ton of berries to the frost last spring, then harvested five tons. Then she cut back the runners and irrigated them. Late in August blossoms appeared on the plants, then berries right after State Fair. There are still enough green berries to keep the crop coming.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Oldenburg, residents of Clear Lake district, also reported a second crop of Marshall strawberries Tuesday. Mrs. Oldenburg said their crop was "heavy enough to take to market."

## Shortage of Trusties Slows Prison Harvest

Picking of fruit and vegetables by penitentiary crews has been slowed by a shortage of trusty convicts, James B. Schaller, superintendent of the prison cannery, reported to the State Board of Control Tuesday.

Schaller said this situation would reduce materially the cannery output for this year. It has been the practice of the penitentiary to pick fruits and vegetables on shares which officials said has proven satisfactory to the prison management and growers.

Warden Virgil O'Malley was to be called before the board to discuss the problem.

Board of control members expressed concern over the situation with the peak of the cannery season already reached.

The board was informed that approximately 60 per cent of the most trusted convicts are now at the forest camp maintained by the penitentiary management and State Forestry Department in the Tillamook Burn area. Many other trusted prisoners are engaged in prison farming operations which officials said could not be neglected at this time of the year.

The penitentiary population now exceeds 1,500.

Most of the prison cannery output, other than that used at the penitentiary, is sold to other state institutions and the state board of higher education.

## Prof. Lomax to Address County Historical Society

Alfred L. Lomax, professor of business administration at the University of Oregon, will address the Marion County Historical Society in the Fireplace Room of the City Library at 8 p.m. Monday, Oct. 6, it was announced Tuesday. He will talk on pioneer woolen mills in Oregon, covering the period from 1811 to 1875. Joseph Dodd also is to speak.

Officers for next year are to be elected at the session. Murray Wade, president, has named Miss Merle E. Dimick chairman of the nominating committee.

## \$1 Billion Per Inch Ribbon Symbol of Debt

A red ribbon stretched the length of the speaker's platform, at \$1 billion per inch, symbolized the U. S. government debt Tuesday to Salem Kiwanis Club.

Marshall Swearingen, Salem, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation and chairman of Oregonians to Fight Inflation, unveiled the ribbon to show the debt of \$270 billion, compared to debts of past years shown on a chart.

In meeting inflation and the threat of its continuance, Swearingen declared the American people "must decide whether the government should guarantee a living or an opportunity."

He blamed the problem on government fiscal policies, with the war contributing. Federal taxes have gone up from 6 per cent of the national income in 1931 to 30 per cent now, and Swearingen recalled, economic texts have held that when a government uses more than 25 per cent of the national income it is dominating the people and headed for socialism or fascism.

Swearingen said Congress had not accepted one chance to cut expenditures when the Farm Bureau, the Granges and other farm organizations asked for an end to crop subsidies.

## Salem Blood Day Thursday

Salem, which hasn't met its blood donor quota since last spring, will be asked again Thursday to meet the need of blood for both battle casualties and U. S. hospitals.

The regular blood day for the city will be from noon to 5 p.m. at the downtown Armory, with a quota of 250 pints. Persons who can give may come to the Armory without advance scheduling.

Officials said the lack of supplies in the area's blood bank had resulted in the use of five walk-in donors for Salem hospital needs during September.

## Gasoline Sales in State Set Record

Oregon gasoline sales in the first eight months of 1952 totaled 374,602,570 gallons, an all-time record. The total was 14,790,000 gallons greater than for the similar period of last year.

State gas tax collections during the first eight months of this year totaled \$22,541,488.

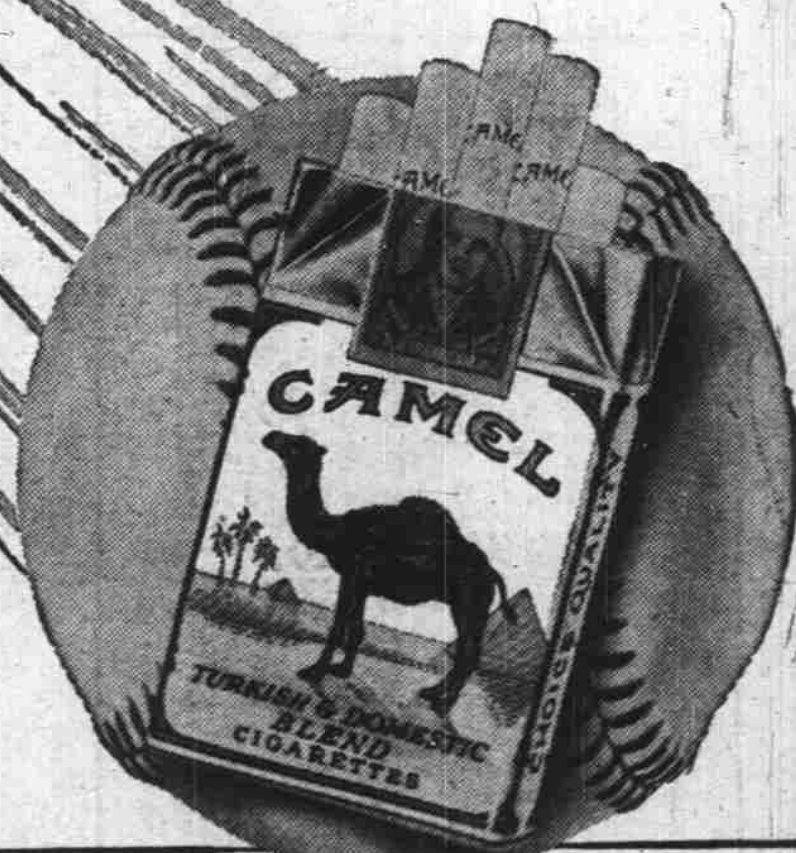
