

POW Riot Planned As Escape Attempt

CHEJU ISLAND, Korea (P)—A riot Wednesday in which 56 prisoners died was to have been the trigger for a mass break by 5,464 tough Chinese Red prisoners, U. S. officials said Thursday.
U. S. infantry moved in so swiftly and sternly on 500 rioting prisoners in one compound that Chinese Communists in nearby compounds called the whole thing off and even hauled down their defiant flags, officers reported.

Nursing Class Leads List in Adult Courses

Topped by the popular practical nursing courses the general division classes in the 33 course Salem public schools adult education program includes instruction in French, Spanish, mathematics, radio and other fields.

The French class, taught by Dr. Marion Morange, Willamette University instructor, and the Spanish course, instructed by Mrs. Elmer Berg, both use the conversational method of learning.

Myron C. Pogue instructing a class in advanced radio theory, designed for experienced radio operators. The English review class offers a refresher course in spelling, grammar and punctuation. Refresher or advanced work in mathematics is offered by a class in that category.

Also included in the general division are three new classes—band music instruction, creative writing and personal finance. All the classes are held at Salem High school.

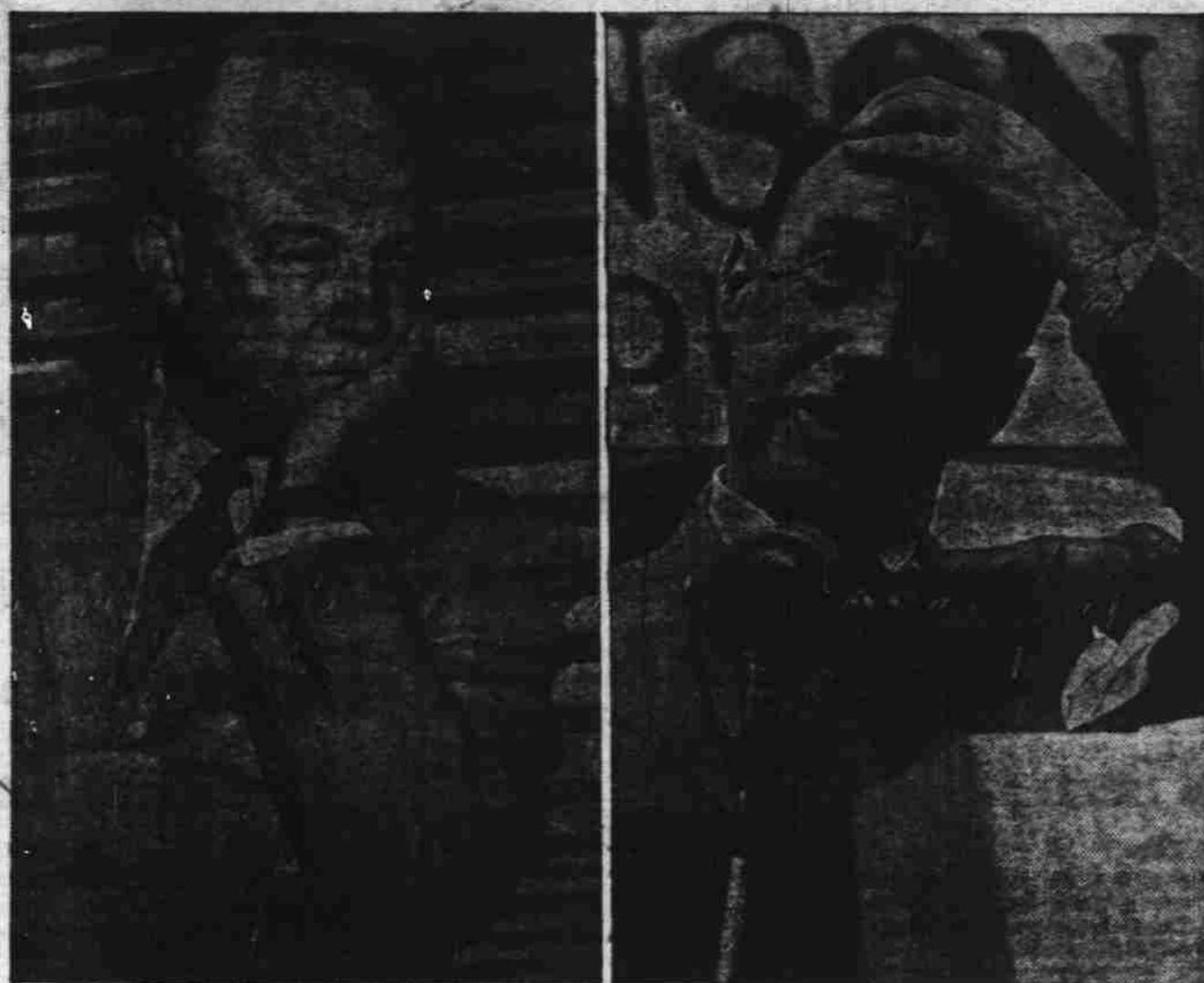

Prison Riots At Vancouver Halted by Gas

VANCOUVER, B. C. (P)—A secret signal, flashed from a prison compound, started a 2½ hour riot Thursday at suburban Oakalla prison.

No one was injured, but it left in its wake a wrecked cell block with all the windows of the three-story building smashed and furniture twisted and torn from the floor.

Two guards held hostage were released without injury. They were in the block when the riot started. Police and guards used tear gas bombs and firemen poured streams of water into the building before the rioters called it quits.

Unlike most prison riots, the cause was not food. Overcrowding in the cellblock was blamed. A second bunk was placed in all cells of the prison during the morning. The prisoners had protested, wanting a one-man-to-a-cell program.

"The trouble arose over an order I gave allotting two men to a cell," said youthful warden Ralph Christie. We have nearly 800 prisoners and only 400 cells, so there was no alternative.

Fewer than 100 of the 800 prisoners put on the riot. Amid the broken furniture, two mattresses were set afire, but the flames were quelled by firemen and prison guards.

Two hours after the start of the riot, Royal Canadian Mounted Police and guards tossed the tear gas into lower-floor cells.

The prisoners jeered and screamed as the first bomb exploded. More followed and a great cloud of smoke enveloped the prison.

A short time later, firemen opened a barrage of water, directing hoses to the upper floors, where corridors were flooded and broken furniture swept along by the powerful streams.

At 2 p.m. it was over. An appeal from Warden Christie who spoke over a loud-speaker system was heeded.

The two guards were freed, and the prisoners herded inside the damaged building.

Romeos Told To Hold Wheel, Not Lady Love

Highway Romeos were warned Thursday they might get their driver licenses suspended if they drive with one arm around their lady friends.

Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry said he already has suspended the license of one of these one-armed drivers.

Newbry said it is the first suspension for this purpose in many years.

A little-known section of the law says it is unlawful for a person to drive with anybody in his lap or with another person in his embrace.

Other suspensions last month included 298 for drunker driving, 35 for reckless driving, 22 for failure to report an accident, 13 for speeding, and 11 for having bad driving records.

There were 4,872 convictions for traffic violations during the month, highest so far this year.

World Series Keeps Stock Activity Low

NEW YORK (P)—It was another World Series stock market Thursday with quiet progress being made despite Wall Street's attention on baseball.

Traders put a lot of emphasis on individual issues, and at no time was there any mass movement either way. Price changes usually were in the smaller fractions with an occasional stock moving a point or so either way, generally on the upside.

A good showing was made in the railroads, steels, motors, radio-televisions issues, and in a few chemicals. Downside pressure was not concentrated.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained 10 cents at \$108.20. Each of the components of the average—industrials, rails, and utilities—gained 10 cents.

The list was composed of 1,084 individual issues, a bit more than Wednesday, of which 397 advanced and 370 declined with 18 new highs and 84 new lows for the year touched during the session.

Volume was restricted again to 1,040,000 shares as compared with 1,050,000 the day before. Both are below the daily average for the past month.

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GOP Prepares For Ike Visit

PORTLAND (U)—Plans for the visit here Tuesday of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower were announced Thursday by Portland Republicans.

The GOP presidential nominees is scheduled to arrive at noon from Vancouver, Wash. He will be met by city officials and other dignitaries.

A parade will be formed at the Union Station to take the General and his party, which includes his wife, to the civic auditorium when he is to speak at 1 p.m. The talk is expected to last about half an hour. Gov. Douglas McKay will introduce Eisenhower.

Seats at the auditorium are not reserved. The Eisenhower train is scheduled to leave at 2 p.m. Later in the day the general is to make brief platform appearances at Salem, Albany and Eugene.

Chairman of the committee making arrangements for the visit is Sig Unander, Republican candidate for state treasurer.

Bugle-Blowing Reds Seize Korean Hills

SEOUL (P)—Bugle-blowing Chinese Reds seized four hills near the western Korean truce conference town of Panmunjom Thursday night and early Friday in assaults mounted by more than 1,000 troops.

In the air, U. S. Sabre jet pilots reported shooting down two Communist MIG jets and damaging two others today over North Korea.

The leading U. S. jet ace in Korea, Maj. Frederick C. Blesse, Phoenix, Ariz., bagged one of them for his 10th MIG kill.

Bloody hand-to-hand fighting raged in the west as the Chinese launched a new series of hard-hitting assaults.

The U. S. Eighth Army said the Reds seized two forward positions south of Panmunjom and a third hill north of Korangpo. A front-line officer said Allied troops pulled off another hill in the Panmunjom sector.

On the central front, however, hard-hitting South Koreans drove Chinese troops off Wire Hill, scene of bitter fighting for days. The South Koreans had fought within 100 yards of the summit Wednesday. The height east of the Pakhan River is one of two hills the Communists seized Monday.

Allied infantrymen used flame throwers in an unsuccessful attempt to hold off the Reds in one of the western hill fights. The Chinese brought up reinforcements and won the height.

Eleven B-29 Superforts from Japan and Okinawa Thursday night dumped 100 tons of bombs on Pongchong, a hitherto untouched Red supply center on the important west coast rail line between Sinanju and Huichon. It is one of some 70 target areas where civilians have been warned of impending air raids.

300 TV Sets Now in Salem

Around 300 television sets already have been delivered in the Salem area and close to 400 more have been ordered, a Statesman survey indicated Thursday. It was estimated that on the basis of the present trend and availability at least 1000 sets will be in operation in and near Salem by Jan. 1.

Not all the 300 delivered thus far have been completely installed as yet for reception of Portland KPTV.

By far the greater majority delivered have gone to private residences. A rough estimate showed probably 75 per cent were 21-inch screen.

DISTRIBUTION PLAN OK'D

MANILA (P)—President Elpidio Quirino has approved a one million dollar loan to finance a land distribution program on Mindanao—second largest and least developed major island of the Philippines.
