

Kefauver Says Eisenhower 'Inconsistent'

SEATTLE (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) paid tribute to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower Sunday as a great general, but said he was poor Presidential timber.

Kefauver, here for only a few hours on a flying campaign visit, told a small but enthusiastic audience "I don't want a man in the White House who is vacillating and inconsistent."

He said Eisenhower, Republican Presidential candidate, had switched his viewpoints on universal military training and a national farm plank since his nomination.

"The Republicans call for a change," the Tennessee Senator said. "Well, I think they are taking this thing too seriously. They change their thinking and their approach to specific problems every day."

Kefauver made his brief public appearance in a hall just off the University of Washington campus.

Before that, in a press conference, he was asked whether he thought President Truman's whistle-stop tour was helping or hurting the chances of Gov. Adlai Stevenson, Democratic nominee for the Presidency. Kefauver replied: "The over-all support of the President is helping Stevenson. Apparently, the Republicans think so, too, since they have gone to the trouble of sending out a so-called 'truth squad' of three GOP Senators to follow Truman around."

Kefauver, who lost out to Stevenson in his bid for the Presidential nomination, left by plane for Vancouver, Wash., to speak at a Democratic rally.

In his prepared address, he said at Vancouver the Pacific Northwest benefitted immeasurably the past 20 years under Democratic farm and power policies.

He also aimed a vote-getting appeal at Alaska, whose future he said lies with the Democratic Party.

Grange to Back Reapportion

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon State Grange will issue a statement Monday supporting the legislative reapportionment measure which is to appear on the November election ballot, Elmer McClure, state grange master, reported Sunday.

The reapportionment plan, opposed in the past by farm groups of Eastern Oregon, calls for a constitutional amendment which would require the legislature to reapportion itself, after each federal census, on the basis of population.

The reapportionment measure is sponsored by the League of Women Voters, the Young Republicans and Young Democrats.

Ex-Con Held In \$248,000 Robbery Case

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation disclosed Sunday that Orville L. Chambliss, 35-year-old Oklahoma ex-convict charged with a \$248,000 Ft. Worth robbery, was being held here.

"All I'm authorized to say is that Chambliss surrendered to me at 8 o'clock Saturday night," FBI Agent D. A. Bryce said.

Town Mourns As Elephant Dies

CANTERBURY, Eng. (AP)—Salt, a five-ton female elephant which lay ill for a week in a field near here, died Sunday and this old cathedral town is mourning.

For at least 40 years, old timers say, Salt was a beloved character in a little circus which moves about southern England.

Veterinary George Peyton's final diagnosis: Acute exhaustion and old age. The exact age was not known—but about 65 or 85, or thereabouts.

Dewey Amazes TV Viewers by Breaking Egg

NEW YORK (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey amazed television viewers Sunday by taking an egg out of his pocket and breaking it in an ashtray.

Dewey, appearing on a television program, broke the egg while commenting on President Truman's charge Saturday that Dwight D. Eisenhower was partly to blame for not getting "a clear-cut right of way" to Berlin for the Americans after the German surrender.

Dewey said Truman's charge against the Republican Presidential candidate was "the most shocking exhibition of hypocrisy and downright fraud" in history.

"The fact is that Gen. Eisenhower advised against the division of Germany in any circumstances," Dewey said.

"Then," he added, "the four ambassadors (U.S., British, Russian and French) met and agreed to the line drawn at Yalta and to the isolation of Berlin 200 miles from the American zone. Gen. Eisenhower protested this before the agreement was signed. But he was told: 'We've got to show the Russians that we trust them.'"

The New York Governor then took an egg out of his right hand coat pocket.

Breaking the egg into a glass ashtray, Dewey said: "It's like smashing an egg and then saying: 'Now, general, you put the yolk back into it.'"

Poking the smashed eggshell neatly into the ashtray, Dewey went on, an expression of disgust on his face, "We've made this kind of a mess. You clean it up."

Thunderjets Span Pacific

HONOLULU (AP)—The second mass flight of Republic F-84G Thunderjets across the Pacific started landing at Hickam Air Force Base Sunday five hours and 46 minutes after their departure from California.

Their time for the 2,400-mile flight was only 17 minutes slower than that of the first flight of jets last July. They were refueled in flight by Boeing aerial tankers between Travis Air Force Base, Calif., and Hickam.

Twenty Thunderjets of the 27th Fighter Escort Wing swept over Hickam in box formation at 1,500 feet.

McCarthy Asks U.S. 'Win or Get Out' of Korea

CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) declared Sunday "the United States should either win the war in Korea quickly or get out."

McCarthy, answering questions of some 50 teen-agers in an NBC television show was asked "what do the Republicans plan to do about Korea. If the party is returned to power will they continue the stalemate or bomb Manchuria?"

The Wisconsin lawmaker replied: "I hope when the Republicans take over after the November election they will set out to win. The Republicans have never been in a war of stalemate. It has been a tremendous mistake to follow that policy. The United States should win the war or get out."

Campaign mud-slinging, McCarthy replied to another question, can be most effective but sometimes it backfires "as it did against my opponent in the recent Wisconsin primary. Mud-slinging is not effective when it's distorted, but it is when it's well-documented."

Ike's Former Teacher to Greet General

BELLINGHAM, Wash. (AP)—Pelagius Williams, 73, was the most excited man in town Sunday night. Monday night he's going to shake the hand of the man he remembers as a student in his Abilene, Kan., high school American history class 45 years ago.

The elderly retired teacher will be on the official greeting committee when his former pupil, Dwight D. Eisenhower, arrives in Seattle on his Western campaign tour.

"I never dreamed Dwight would make American history someday when I was teaching him back in '07 and '08," Williams said.

One of his most prized possessions is a letter the five-star general wrote him in 1947 in reply to a query on the factors that Eisenhower felt led to his success in life.

The man who is the Republican hope for the presidency wrote in part: "I regard it as one of the most fortunate things in my life that I spent my boyhood in a region and in a situation that provided both a healthy outdoor existence and a need to work. . . . I shall always believe that any youngster, boy or girl, who has the opportunity to spend his early youth in an enlightened rural area has been favored by fortune."

Opposition to Egypt Reform Brings Prison

EL MINYA, Egypt (AP)—Sayed Adel Saleh Lamum, 23-year-old scion of one of Egypt's wealthiest families, was sent to prison for life Sunday for opposing Egyptian land reform by force. The government had demanded the death penalty before a special military court set up to try him.

He strode into a police station at nearby Maghagha Sept. 14 brandishing a tommygun and shouting that land reform would be enforced only "over my dead body." He wounded one policeman before he was subdued. He was accompanied by eight friends in his sortie.

Land reform legislation, enacted in mid-September by the government of Prime Minister Maj. Gen. Mohamed Naguib, limits ownership of agricultural land in Egypt to 200 acres per person.

College Papers Split Between Adlai, General

PRINCETON, N. J. (AP)—Princeton University's student newspaper is endorsing Dwight D. Eisenhower for President, and bypassing the paper's former managing editor, Adlai E. Stevenson, Princeton class of 1932.

The Daily Princetonian, in a front-page editorial to be published in Monday's edition, called Eisenhower a "true internationalist."

Last week, the student newspaper of Columbia University endorsed Stevenson in preference to the University's president—Gen. Eisenhower.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—The Crimson, Harvard University undergraduate daily paper, Sunday editorially endorsed Illinois Gov. Adlai Stevenson, Democratic candidate for President.

President Truman in 1948 was the only other Democrat endorsed by the Crimson in its 80-year history. The late Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt edited the paper while a Harvard student.

The Crimson said Stevenson, who attended Harvard Law School but did not receive his degree there, had shown a "profound analytical approach to national problems."

The Crimson said the general has "contributed nothing to American politics in the campaign, but rather has added to its staleness."

Long Canyon On Bottom of Atlantic Ocean

NEW YORK (AP)—Scientists have discovered a 300-foot deep canyon at least 800 miles long on the floor of the Atlantic Ocean.

They believe it may be the main stream of a giant system of deep rivers on the bottom of the sea.

The discovery was announced by Dr. W. Maurice Ewing, an oceanographer and professor of geology at Columbia University.

He and a party of scientists returned from a 10,000-mile trip in the sea going tug, Kevin Moran. The tug was especially fitted for exploring the sea floor.

"I think we have discovered ourselves a piece of geograph similar to the Mississippi River in size," Ewing told newsmen who met him when the tug docked.

The canyon was discovered by echo sounder, a device which measures depth, about 800 miles off and a little north of Boston.

One of the student members of the expedition was Jon Lindbergh, son of Charles A. Lindbergh. Lindbergh is studying biology at Stanford University.

The expedition was sponsored by Columbia University, the Office of Naval Research, the Navy's Bureau of Ships, and the Woods Hole Oceanographic Society.

Walters to Take Job with Braves

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Bill "Bucky" Walters, who took over the Milwaukee Brewers in May and guided them to the American Association baseball title, has resigned as manager of the pennant winners.

Richard Smith, Brewer general manager, said Walters made his decision after a talk in New York with Lou Perini, president of the Boston Braves, Brewer parent club. Smith said Perini agreed to give Walters back his job as pitching coach with the Braves.

NEW YORK (AP)—There is a possibility of rain for the sixth game of the World Series at Ebbets Field Monday.

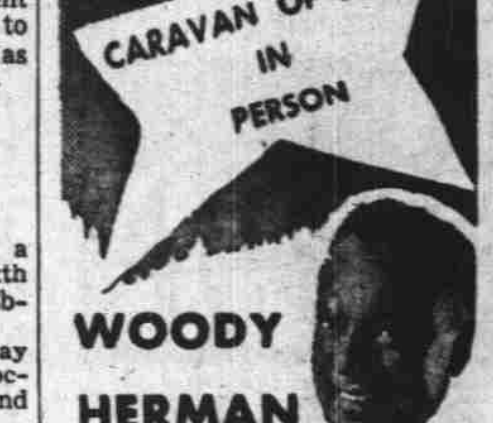
The weather man said Monday will be cloudy and cool with occasional rain in the afternoon and temperatures in the 30s.

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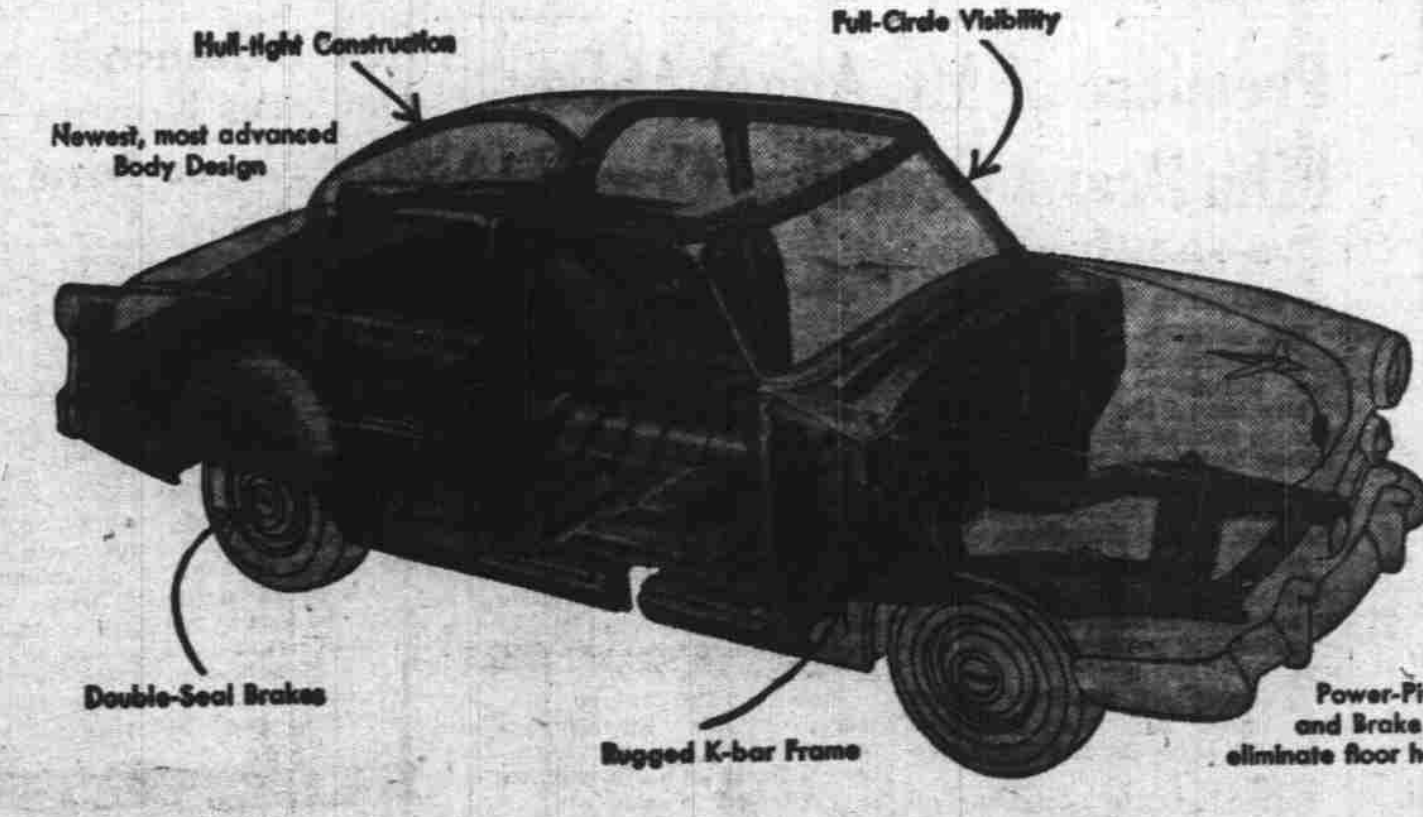
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
