Moon, Olinger Lose in Semis

Gwynn, Burrell Foes In 1st Flight Finals

It'll be Bob Sederstrom against Lebanon's Jack Owens next week in the Championship flight finals of the Salem Golf Club's annual Title Tournament.

Sederstrom cleared another hurdle Sunday as he nipped Dave Moon 2 and 1 in a 36-hole semi-final scrap. The steady Owens advanced by turning back Southpaw Harold Olinger 3 and 2.

Sederstrom and Owens will battle over 36 holes next Sunday, starting at 9 o'clock. Also playing with them will be the finalists in the first flight, Del Gwynn and Bob Burrell. Gwynn dispatched Glen Lengren 2 and 1 and Burrell got by Harvey Quistad 3 and 2 Sunday in semi-finals of the first flight.

Most Titles Decided
Crowns in all other flights but the third were decided Sunday. In the third Barney Filler took the title by stopping Bert Thomson 3 and 2. In the fourth Hans Nichols emerged as champ with a 1 up win over Bill Shattuck on the 19th, and Harry Gustafson won out in the fifth by topping Bud Kanis 3 and 2.

Dr. Guis took honors in the sixth flight with a 1 up win over Henry Hohweiser in a finals fray that went 19 holes. The champ in the seventh is Ralph Kietzing following his 5 and 3 victory over Hugh Ivis. Ralph Nohlgren beat Dick Chase for the eighth flight title and Bud Clark won from Bill Burrell for ninth flight honors.

Still to be played is a finals match in the second flight between Don Burch and Millard Pekar.

The desperate Spartans drove back to OSC's eight. There, with but time for one play, Gene Lakenta's try for a field goal was wide. But an eager Oregon State lineman was offside, and that gave Lakenta a second chance. This time he made it good and the gun cracked.

Southern California, again getting up steam for a second half attack, disposed of a stubborn but outgunned Army team, 22-0. It was the Trojans third win in a row and again they displayed a terrific defense. But fumbling cut down effectiveness of the offense. It finally rolled to two scores on the ground and one in the air in the final periods.

Congrats Victims
Washington State, already beaten in the conference by USC and Stanford, gave Baylor a battle under a blistering Texas sun for one half, trailing 12-7 at the intermission. But the Bears ran away for a 31-7 triumph by the finish.

The only conference game established UCLA as a tough challenger to the title hopes of California, USC and Stanford. The Bruins, unawed by the passing greatness of Washington's Don Heinrich, intercepted five of his tosses and turned the contest into a 22-7 rout.

Until UCLA proved it could be done, Heinrich hadn't had a single pass intercepted this season. Sophomore linebacker Terry DeWay was the sparkplug of an alert Bruin defense which capitalized on almost every Washington mistake.

Outside the conference, the West's top independent, Santa Clara, lost its third straight—this one to Tulane, 35-0.

McElhenny, Matson, Parilli Hot Cards, 49ers, Packers Win as Rookies Sparkle

Rookies stole the spotlight Sunday in a limited National Football League program that saw only six of the 12 teams in sprawling loop in action.

Freshman Ollie Matson sparked the Chicago Cardinals to an upset 21-10 victory over the Chicago Bears with 100 and 34 yard touchdowns runs.

Babe Parilli, the former pass master at Kentucky, led the Green Bay Packers to a 35-20 triumph over the Washington Redskins while newcomer Hugh McElhenny had a big hand in the San Francisco 49ers' 27-14 rout of the Dallas Texans.

Matson, a defensive All-American at San Francisco and an Olympic performer in the 440, staged his dazzling run with only two minutes remaining in the first half.

The Bears enjoyed a 10-0 lead at the time when Matson took George Blaisdell's kickoff on the goal line. He sifted through the Bears, streaked into the clear and passed Billy Stone, the sole remaining Bear defender, to score unopposed.

Matson brought the crowd to its feet again in the final period as he stole the ball on the Bear 34 and streaked across the goal line to put the Cards in the van for the first time.

Parilli tossed two touchdown passes, pitched out for a third and set up a fourth as the Packers breezed to victory before a small crowd of 9,657 fans. Green Bay, thanks to Parilli, enjoyed a 21-7 lead at half time.

Veteran quarterback Y. A. Tittle and Frank Albert shared the limelight with McElhenny in the Bears' triumph over Dallas. Tittle threw two touchdown passes and set up a third. Albert hurled one scoring pass and put the 49ers in position for a field goal by Gordy Soltau.

Mac' Runs 89 Yards
McElhenny, All-American last year with the University of Washington, dashed 89 yards for a touchdown, snared a pass for another and ran 36 yards to help put Soltau in position to make his field goal.

The victory enabled the 49ers to take undisputed possession of first place in the National conference with a 2-0 mark. The Bears, Detroit and Green Bay are tied for second with 1-1 records.

All 12 teams will see action next Sunday. The feature game finds New York at Cleveland. The Giants and Browns are tied for the American conference lead with 2-0 slates. The Browns nipped Pittsburgh, 21-20 and the Giants crushed Philadelphia, 31-7, Saturday.

Blackwell's toss to force Shuba at the plate after he fell flailing to field Erskine's play-it-safe squeeze bunt in the second saved his skin.

The Dodgers already had one run home on a walk to Jackie Robinson, Shuba's single off Billy Martin's glove, a stolen base and Pafko's ground single to right.

Hodges walked and the bases were full with only one out. Erskine worked the count to 3-1 and then bunted toward first base.

Shuba, standing on third, waited to be sure Erskine bunted the ball before he ran. He was forced on Blackwell's good play.

With Erskine rolling along on a one-hit shutout the Dodgers got him a 4-0 lead in the fifth. Hodges, still hitless in the series, walked and made second ahead of Blackwell's throw on Erskine's bunt. With men on first and second and none out, Cox sacrificed. Pee Wee Reese's fly to left drove in Hodges.

Snider Hits One
Then Snider smashed Blackwell's first pitch some 350 feet into the lower right field stands, scoring behind Erskine.

The big five in the fifth rocked Erskine and brought manager Chuck Dressen out for consultation. Dressen stuck with the tummy right-hander and Erskine settled down to justify his manager's faith.

The inning started innocently enough, Hank Bauer walking on a 3-2 pitch. Martin's little hopper rolled over second base into short center for the second hit. Still that 4-0 lead looked safe.

Stengel sent Irv Noren up to bat for Blackwell and he almost duplicated Martin's hit—a bouncer just out of Robinson's reach into center.

Bauer scored on the hit to break the shutout and Joe Black dashed from the bench toward the Dodger bullpen to start heating up.

Yanks Score Again
McDougald bounced to Reese who forced Noren but Robinson's relay to first was too late for the double play. While the tie for the double play, Martin had scored the second run.

Rizzuto's single to right field brought Dressen out to talk to Erskine on how to pitch to Mickey Mantle. Apparently he had the right answer for Mickey fouled to Co.

As Mize stepped up, this was the picture—McDougald on second, Rizzuto on first and two out. Big Jawn fouled off the first pitch and looked at a called strike. Out front of the hitter, Carl tried to make him go after a high outside pitch but no soap.

A low fast ball came singing up to the plate and Mize swung. High and away the ball roared, swinging gently into the stands near the Yank bullpen, probably a 400-foot wallop.

Dodgers Tie
Sain couldn't hold that 3-4 lead against the bounce-back Brooks. He escaped in the sixth when Furillo led off with a double and was stranded. He didn't quite make it in the seventh. Cox's single off McDougald's glove and Reese's sacrifice set the stage for Snider to live a tying single into center.

Erskine fanned to open the 11th but Cox ripped a single to left. Reese rolled a single over second base, moving Cox to third as Snider stroled up for his big moment.

The Duke dented the right field bullpen fence with his long belt that easily scored Cox with the run that meant the ball game.

Six of the Dodger hits came off Sain who thus was charged with his second world series loss. The other came with the Boston Braves in 1948.

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Injuries Fatal To Young Boxer

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Jimmy "Bad" Taylor, 21-year-old Miami, Fla., fighter, died here Sunday from injuries received in a boxing match Friday night.

The Orleans Parish County coroner's office said an autopsy revealed a subdural hemorrhage with cerebral lacerations.

Taylor was critically injured when he was knocked out by Charley Joseph of New Orleans in the sixth round of a scheduled ten-round bout.

Dr. Allen J. Ellender Jr., who attended the Negro fighter, said Taylor's brain was severely damaged, particularly on the right side.

Athletic promoter Heard Ragan said he would stage a boxing show Oct. 17 with the gate receipts going to Taylor's family.

Dressen re-emphasized his confidence in his pitcher when he let him bat first in the seventh, although the Dodgers were a run behind, and go to the plate again in the eighth and eleventh with the score tied.

"I told Carl we could get a run off Johnny Sain. I knew we could hit him. So I wanted to stick with Erskine," Dressen added.

Rightfielder Carl Furillo, who made a heart-stopping, leaping catch of Mize's last blow, which looked for a time like the big first baseman's fourth home run of the series, said he just "jumped and prayed."

"I didn't know anything," Furillo said. "I saw the ball sailing. I leaped and said under my breath: 'Get in there you son-of-a-gun. And what a beautiful sound when I heard the plop in the glove.'"

The Dodgers' dressing room hit its highest peak of frenzy of the series as the players swarmed around the day's outstanding athletes—Erskine, Furillo and Duke Snider, who knocked in four of his team's six runs with a homer, double and single.

"The law of averages finally caught up with me," Snider, a pug-faced husky who has been a disappointment in previous series, said. "It was the greatest thrill of my life."

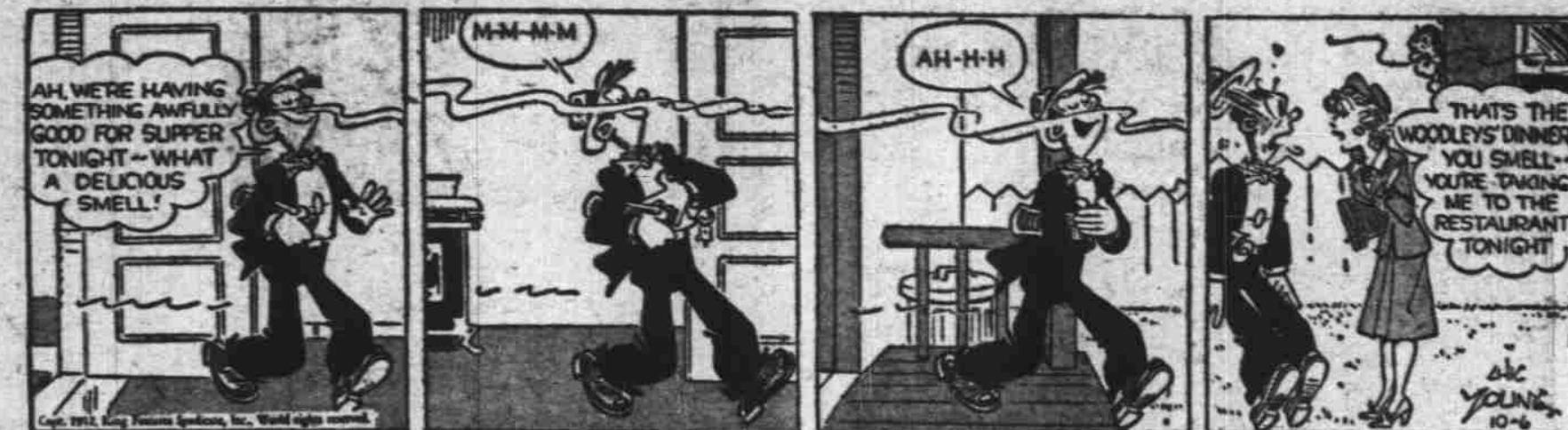
