

Truman Voices Contempt for Ike

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN (P)—President Truman accused Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower Tuesday of betraying his life-long principles and his best friend by embracing "moral pigmies" such as Republican Sens. Joseph R. McCarthy and William E. Jenner.

Fearing open contempt for Eisenhower's support of the Wisconsin and Indiana senators who have bitterly assailed former Secretary of State George C. Marshall.

The President acknowledged he once qualified Eisenhower for the presidency. But he said the GOP presidential nominee has brought about "a great disenchantment" and "I am now convinced that I was absolutely wrong."

Specifically Truman charged that Eisenhower has betrayed his principles and his supporters by adopting "reactionary" views on foreign policy and national defense.

Backs 'Secunder' "I am not at all," Truman said in a speech to a train-bound crowd at Colorado Springs, "the general's declared support for every Republican candidate, whether that man is the blackest of reactionaries, a die-hard isolationist or even a moral scoundrel."

It was at this point that he lit into Eisenhower for failing, the President said, to defend his friend and benefactor, Marshall, against the attacks of McCarthy and Jenner.

Early in the campaign, Eisenhower told a news conference he had no sympathy with anybody who questioned Marshall's integrity or patriotism. At the same time the general said he would support all Republican candidates in the interests of party solidarity.

Offered to Aid Ike The growing bitterness of Truman's assaults on Eisenhower whom he once offered to help get a presidential nomination in 1948 hit a new high as the chief executive's campaign special rolled through Colorado toward the Middle West.

Truman's coast-to-coast tour for Gov. Adlai Stevenson reaches Nebraska and Iowa Wednesday, with a major speech scheduled at the Shenandoah Iowa, county fair.

At Colorado Springs, where the police chief estimated the turnout at 10,000, Truman charged that Eisenhower is trying to win votes "by playing upon the casualties and sacrifices in Korea."

He said the general "joined in the decision to pull our troops out of Korea in the first place."

In saying he had changed his mind about Eisenhower's qualifications for the White House, Truman said:

Politics 'More Reserved' in Switzerland, Newsman Says

One of the most interested spectators in the horde of well-wishers which crowded around Dwight D. Eisenhower's train when he visited Salem Tuesday was Luigi Caglio, a visiting Swiss newspaperman. Caglio (pronounced Calyo) is a talkative, effervescent, passionately democratic (with a small "D") chap now touring the country.

Fascinated by the hoopla connected with an American presidential election Caglio says things are done a little differently in his native Switzerland.

"This contact of a candidate with the public in a railway station is exclusively American," he said after fighting his way back to his Marion Hotel room from the Ike reception.

Subdued Contact "Magistrates" have contact with the common people in Switzerland too, only, he hinted, on a somewhat more subdued scale. Like workers rubbing elbows with members of the Swiss parliament aboard crowded streetcars in Bern.

Caglio, who has been a Swiss journalist for the past 24 years, also noted that, unlike Americans, the Swiss are more "cautious" in dealing with communism. It is not often a subject of election debates. The Swiss operate quietly but firmly on the theory that "the neutrality of the state must protect the neutrality of the citizens."

How about candidates' financial activities? "In my country we discuss government finances but," he added, "we seldom go into a candidate's personal income taxes."

Swiss Interested in Politics "The Swiss," said Caglio, "are more interested in their local canton elections than in their national politics. Each political party holds discussion meetings in each village prior to an election and most villagers attend. So the Swiss are well informed on all issues in an election."

In Switzerland candidates don't have to strain for the women's vote because Swiss women are barred from the polls. Caglio admitted that this was "very strange, but soon the women will have the vote, too."

Much Interest in U. S. The interest of his countrymen in the United States election is very strong, he stated. In fact Switzerland is beginning to take a more personal interest in all things American. This may be due to the fact that more than 50 per cent of the motion pictures shown in Swiss theatres are American made. And 80 per cent of those

Adlai Doubts Ike's Intent to Oust Commies

DETROIT (P)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson questioned Tuesday night whether Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is seriously interested in rooting Reds out of government—or only in "scaring the American people to get votes."

The Democrat Presidential nominee said in an address at a rally in Masonic Temple that his GOP rival "has offered only thundering silence about a cure" for the disease of Communism.

The Democrats, he said, have a record of fighting Communism for 20 years with programs that were "ridiculed and sabotaged" by the Republican Old Guard.

In a prelude to a campaign swing into Wisconsin Wednesday, Stevenson also bitterly scolded Wisconsin GOP Sen. Joseph McCarthy as a noisy child who has produced little but loud talk in a controversial campaign against Red penetration of government.

But it was mainly at Eisenhower that the Illinois governor threw a stepped-up, day-long attack. He started in at Saginaw shortly after noon, accusing the general of giving comfort to the Soviets by calling American prosperity a war prosperity.

Talk that U. S. economic strength is founded on war prosperity, Stevenson said, is a great "diservice" to the country, dismaying to our allies, and not to be expected of a former world leader. Rather, he said, it is the kind of talk expected from "irresponsible and isolationist."

Saginaw was the first stop in a one-day campaign drive into Michigan's industrial belt. From Saginaw, Stevenson moved in on Detroit by way of Ypsilanti, Wayne, Wyandotte, Ecorse and River Rouge.

Then, in the motor car capital, the Democratic candidate tackled again what he has labelled one of the top issues of the whole campaign.

"I think we are entitled to ask," he said, "is the Republican candidate seriously interested in trying to root Communists out of the government or is he only interested in scaring the American people to get votes?"

"Does the general really want to purge Communists from the government, or has he simply joined the men who use this as a smoke-screen for their real purpose of taking over for their political ends a government which has stood for the people through thick and thin and against some of his new political friends?"

Ottinger, Salem; one brother, Roy Ottinger, Seattle, Wash., and six grandchildren.

Ike Campaign Train Combines Hotel, Convention Hall, Offices

ABOARD THE EISENHOWER CAMPAIGN TRAIN—A hotel, convention hall and offices combined, with more politics per square foot than a governor's reception room on a busy day—that's the Eisenhower campaign train.

It was Oregon Day aboard Tuesday after the 18-car special carried the Republican presidential candidate, Dwight D. Eisenhower, from Washington State into Portland, then on through the state with brief stops at Salem, Albany and Eugene.

Gov. Douglas McKay and top Republican political candidates in the Oregon election were on the train. Local delegations of Republican leaders boarded for between-stops rides and the opportunity to meet the GOP candidate.

Oregon newspapers and radio stations were represented in the special train's elaborate "pressrooms" which in ordinary travel would have been Southern Pacific fancy lounge cars.

Typewriters and desks lined the train windows in these cars and the clicking of typewriters came from many of the compartments occupied by the 80 reporters and photographers from the nation's metropolitan press and news services.

Talks Mimeographed Each Eisenhower talk is mimeographed within a few minutes of his speaking and copies circulated among the newsmen. The Eisenhower press staff of three estimated 400 copies of paper are needed for this operation during a campaign trip like the current one.

U. S. Rep. Walter Norblad of Salem and the Oregon governor seemed to be all over the train at once as they greeted fellow Oregon Republicans and Eisenhower party members on the Portland-Salem run.

Brief Greetings When Candidate Eisenhower came through the reception car to shake hands with the Oregon group out of Portland, he projected his broad smile and had brief greetings for everyone down through the car.

Near the end he stuck out his big hand, then did a double take and roared, "Why, it's Mickey and I almost didn't recognize you. You must come to see me just before supper time."

The five-star general was talking to an ex-soldier who had served on his personal staff through all the African and European campaigns—"Mickey" McKeough.

Mickey was orderly and chauffeur to the general. He had flown from Santa Barbara to get on the Eisenhower train at Portland. He's now with a Santa Barbara radio station owned by Harry Butcher, who was Eisenhower's naval aide and confidante during World War II.

Hatfield Gives Talk At Portland Auditorium where Eisenhower spoke just before entering for Salem, Mark Hatfield of Salem was one of the few politicians to win a choice speaking opportunity as the crowd of 5,000 awaited arrival of Ike. Hatfield was introduced by State Sen. Howard Belton with recognition of his part in helping start the early Ike movement in Oregon in 1951.

The public address system over which Eisenhower makes his train talks is special equipment carried in the Eisenhower personal car at the end of the train. It is wired to speakers in the last seven cars of the train. (Some of Salem's huge crowd was disappointed that the system's volume didn't reach far enough.)
