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Garden Fresh

Tomato Crop Offers Abundance of Canning, Preserving Ingredients

Tomatoes are still worrying our readers, who are finding that their vines sending out oodles of bright red balls of goodness, just begging to be canned.

One request from a farmer's wife is for tomato paste, a wonderful way to use the vegetables. You start out with a wash-tub full of tomatoes and end up with two half pint jars of tomato paste. Then you use the concentrated tomato pulp to make sauce, you end up with a wash-tub of meat balls and spaghetti. That's measure for measure.

Tomato paste is the pulp of the tomatoes cooked down, and given very little seasoning. It is a staple food of Italians and can be purchased at better grocers. Excellent to give the tomato flavor to meat dishes, soups and macaroni and spaghetti dishes, tomato paste is also a wonderful way to utilize the tomatoes from the home garden. However, we recommend that if tomatoes are to be purchased, the tomato paste already canned is more economical.

HOT SAUCE

Hot sauce can be made from your home canned tomatoes if the regular tomato paste recipe is followed, but onion, celery, small hot red pepper and other desired seasonings must be added. The hot sauce should be cooked down less than the tomato paste.

TOMATO PASTE

Boil ripe, unpeeled tomatoes until soft, run through a strainer to remove seeds and skins. Boil quickly to consistency of thick ketchup, then place over low heat or in top of double boiler and cook down until as thick as peanut butter.

Pack in small hot jars or cans and process 1 hour in boiling water. If desired, you may add some garlic and red peppers and cayenne pepper during the initial cooking. Add olive oil just before sealing, after cooking is completed.

Tomato butter is a sweet, being spiced much like the fruit butters.

TOMATO BUTTER

5 pounds ripe tomatoes
4 cups sugar
1 lemon, sliced thin
Cook tomatoes, strain and add apples and sugar and let stand one hour. Add remaining ingredients and cook until thick, about 2 hours.

And finally

TOMATO PRESERVES

6 pound tomatoes
8 cups sugar
2 lemons
Few pieces ginger root
Peel tomatoes and slice. Combine with sliced lemons and let stand overnight with the sugar. Add ginger root (candied ginger if root not available) and cook slowly until clear and will jell. Seal hot.
